Clear Weather Returns After Siege Of Wetness, Murky Skies and Low Temperatures.

The first killing frost of the year hit Scurry County Sunday, November 10. Although most folks are of the opinion that the average frost comes later in the year. recent records reveal November 10 to be about the average date.

Over a long period of years, November 8 is the date of the average killing frost. October 8 is the date of the earliest killing frost on rec-

Clear weather late Tuesday took the place f wet, cold weather that had prevailed for several days. Gins started purring regularly again, after a week's irregular running due to bad weather.

Snyder gins had turned out 4,500 bales-this morning, and the county total is estimated to be 8,200 bales. Sleet, drizzles, rain, heavy dew and frost have come at varying

times during the past week. Monday night's frost, which painted the county almost white, was even harder than Sunday night's, and left practically all vegetation droop-

Total precipitation during the past week has been about one inch. The temperature dropped Sunday

night to 28 degrees, eight degrees lower than the bottom point previously this year. It went two degrees lower Monday night, and just about repeated the performance Tuesday night.


match into a bottle. Place your hand on top of the bottle and you will note that the match stick will NOT continue to burn after the oxygen inside the bottle has been used up by the burning fuel. Likewise, the oxygen content of the air inside your home is gradually reduced by the occupants of the household through the processes of breathing and by the fuel burning in your heating equipment.

> Without proper ventilation the air becomes stale. Sooner or later the tender air passages of the body become inflamed, leaving them an easy prey to vicious attacks of "colds" and serious respiratory diseases. Guard your health this winter with proper ventilation as well as adequate heat in every room in your home.
