COUNTY READY TO CELEBRATE 1935 YULETIDE

Church Programs to Feature Local Observance; Sane Christmas Season Urged.

Scurry County is preparing for one of the happiest and heartiest Christmas seasons of recent years. Practically all local churches are arranging special Yuletide programs for Sunday morning and evening services. Christmas sermons, plays and singing of Christmas carols will feature these observances.

The spirit of "Peace on earth, good will toward men," first taught by the Christ whose birthday will be celebrated next Wednesday, will prevail, according to local pastors.

SANE CHRISTMAS URGED. Parents are urged by City Marshal J. A. Woodfin to caution their children to be careful with fire works during the holiday season. Particularly does this warning apply in the up-town fire zone, where danger from accidents and fire is even greater.

Fire Chief N. W. Autry and Fire Marshal P. M. Bolin urge folks to be extremely careful with Christmas decorations, toys and smoking materials. Snyder will have one of the best fire records in its recent history if the holiday season is passed without a serious fire, they say.

All major stores of the town will be closed all day, of course.

Postmaster Warren Dodson announces that the post office will be closed all day Christmas. Daily papers and letters will be put in boxes, as usual on most holidays, but there will be no deliveries except of Christmas packages.

The postmaster says that parcel post packages that are undelivered Christmas Eve will be delivered in Snyder Christmas morning.

Fluvanna Takes Her Own Girls' Basket Tourney

Fluvanna won her own girls' invitation basket ball tournament Saturday by downing Justiceburg, Graham and Post teams.

The host team won the silver trophy that was at stake for the top team, and Dunn won the consolation title, which entitled it to a bronze trophy.

Fluvanna found its toughest assignment in the third game, when the Graham team was nosed out, 25 to 24. Justiceburg was whipped, 32 to 16, and Post was downed, 33 to 19.

In other games of the tourney, Post won from Dunn, 25 to 18; Dunn from Justiceburg, 22 to 17; Graham from Dunn, 36 to 11.

An all-star tournament team was picked as follows: Gatzel of Post, M. Tatum of Fluvanna and Pruitt of Graham, forwards; Hill of Graham, McPadden of Post, Edmondson of Fluvanna, guards.

A county-wide round robin tournament for boys' and girls' teams, to be run off gradually before the regular interscholastic league tilts, was scheduled to begin between the larger schools Tuesday, but the Times has not received any of the results.

Joseph Neelinger vs. A. E. Snowden, suit on note and foreclosure, resulted in a judgment by default.

Free Show to Be Given for Kiddies

Manager P. W. Cloud of the Palace Theatre announced this morning that a free show will be given between 1:00 and 2:00 o'clock on the afternoon of Christmas Day for all kiddies under 12 years of age. Adults will be admitted for 10 cents each.

CHANGE MADE IN EXEMPTIONS

The state comptroller's department has notified County Tax-Assessor-Collector Bernard Longobian that voters who are beyond the poll tax limit are not required to secure exemption receipts. This is a new ruling from the department, and this county and other counties of the state have been notifying persons over 60 that an exemption receipt was necessary before a vote could be cast next year.

Persons becoming 21 after January 1, 1935, may vote next year without poll tax payment, but they must secure exemption receipt in order to do so. Over-age persons who are exempt must have become 60 on January 1, 1935.

More than 300 poll taxes have been paid in the county, but less than 200 under-age persons have secured exemption certificates.

R. C. Vaught of Dunn Dies After A Short Illness

R. C. Vaught, Dunn groceryman and cotton buyer for seven years, died Tuesday, December 10, at the age of 53 years.

Funeral rites were held Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock at Dunn Baptist Church, with Rev. R. R. Cumble, pastor, and Rev. Grady Anderson officiating. Odom Funeral Home of Snyder was in charge and burial was in Dunn cemetery.

He was married to Minnie Johnson January 18, 1904. Mrs. Vaught and the only child born to the couple, Mrs. Edith Linecum of Dunn, survive. Two grandchildren, Billie Jean and Robbie Linecum, also survive.

Mr. Vaught professed faith in Christ 16 years ago.

Right-of-way proceedings for the overpass two miles southeast of town were begun last Thursday, when the Commissioners Court interviewed property owners.

Members of the Commissioners Court indicated early this week that immediate opening of work on Highway No. 101, toward Colorado, is being urged on highway officials.

\$46,000.00 IN PARITY MONEY TO PRODUCERS

More Than \$15,000 in the Second Rental Checks Also Received At Agent's Office.

Parity checks totaling \$45,998.48, received Monday, are being distributed under direction of V. G. Young, assistant county agent. The checks are 1,735 in number, and lack only about 200 of being the county's full parity quota.

Farmers are rejecting over early arrival of the checks. They did not arrive last year until after Christmas.

The county was given another financial boost Thursday of last week, when 607 second rental checks for a total of \$15,775.96 were received.

Adding the two figures, one finds that a total of \$61,774.44 in government cotton payments has been received here in less than a week.

Last Thursday's batch of second rentals was the second big batch to be received in the county. About 800 checks were received in the first batch.

Only about 100 contract signers in Scurry County have not received either first or second rental checks.

Officers Capture Still and Arrest County Resident

Capture of a 15-gallon still and five gallons of whiskey, destruction of 100 gallons of mash, and arrest of H. Pitts was reported Wednesday afternoon by Constable Albert Smith, who was assisted by John Lynch and Ray Hardin, deputy marshals.

Pitts was placed in the county jail. He was arrested at his home place, 10 miles northeast of Snyder, where the officers report finding five gallons of corn whiskey in the barn. The whiskey, said Smith, was in a 25-gallon wooden keg with siphon attached.

Two miles north of the home place, on another place Smith said was owned by Pitts, the 15-gallon still was captured, along with two 50-gallon barrels filled with mash. The barrels and mash were destroyed, and the still was brought to Snyder.

No one was found at or near the still, according to Smith.

Several Injured In Car Accidents On New Highway

Three car accidents on the new stretch of Highway No. 7 that leads from East Snyder left a toll of injured persons and wrecked automobiles during the past week.

L. A. Stephenson, Lubbock gasoline truck driver, was painfully injured Thursday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock when his loaded truck careened and overturned twice when he attempted to avoid a car driven by S. E. McCowan, Scurry County resident, who was reported to have been coming into the highway from a side road. McCowan's car was crushed, but the driver was only bruised. The accident occurred two and one-half miles southeast of town.

Stephenson received emergency treatment in Snyder General Hospital, and was taken to West Texas Sanatorium, Lubbock, in a Maple ambulance, early Thursday night. His right arm was broken, his left hip was dislocated, and he sustained several minor injuries.

Paynell Spears, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Spears, suffered deep head wounds and minor body injuries when the heavy car she was driving crashed on the side of the highway near the east city limits late Sunday afternoon. Eye witnesses said the car swerved and crashed in avoiding another automobile, driven by Coy Watkins.

Mavis Jenkins and Mary Jane Carnes, who were in the car with the Spears girl, were painfully bruised. Paynell was treated in Snyder General Hospital, and was moved to her home Tuesday.

An unidentified transient narrowly escaped serious injury when his car crashed Wednesday morning near the site of the Spears smash-up.

Wink's Wildcats carried the big and gold of their school to the Reylon 2 Class B football championship for the third time in the last four years Friday afternoon by defeating Roscoe Plowboys, 24 to 7, before 3,400 fans gathered from many parts of West Texas.

One of Wink's former victories was achieved in 1932, when the Wildcats won from the local Plowboys, 7 to 6.

Two hundred twenty-five stars roared a Sweetwater-Roscoe special to Midland, neutral battle site, to see the Plowboys go down to unexpectedly stunning defeat, their first in 11 starts this season, according to Bob Cooke in the Abilene Morning News.

Winning the regional championship gave the Wildcats a trip to the Rose Bowl game, promised by Wink merchants if they won the Roscoe game.

Wink used straight running, forwards and laterals to score five touchdowns. Roscoe, a little off form anyway, was further weakened by injuries to Gray and Emerson and the illness of Fullback Jones.

Wink led in first downs, 15 to 8, and completed four of 12 passes for 110 yards, with none intercepted. Roscoe threw 10 forwards, connecting with two for 41 yards, but had three intercepted.

Cafe Proprietor Succumbs After Saturday Attack

Vick Montgomery, 55, local cafe operator most of the time during the past 15 years, died at a hospital here Monday morning at 7:00 o'clock. He became ill Saturday night.

DISTRICT 13-B RELIEF OFFICE CLOSES JAN. 1

Only Unemployables to Be Retained On Relief Rolls of Seven-County Organization.

The District 13-B relief office, composed of Scurry, Coke, Fisher, Kent, Mitchell, Nolan and Sterling Counties, will be closed January 1, according to Roy P. Formway, district administrator, in a formal statement issued Tuesday from his office at Sweetwater.

Only unemployables, about 300 or 400 in the seven counties, will be retained on the relief rolls, and they will receive directly from the state office at Austin only enough for subsistent commodities. Fifty-three families are on this list in Scurry County, according to Mrs. L. R. Bailey of the local relief office.

Skeleton Organization. A skeleton organization, with Miss Nellie M. Henderson, at present district case supervisor, as district administrator, will be set up, to be known as District 19. Three additional counties will be added to those now in District 13-B, making 10 counties in the new setup.

The three additional counties are to be Runnels, Jones and Taylor. This new organization will not likely last more than three months at the most, possibly closing April 1. There will be a few case workers retained in each of these 10 counties under the direction of Miss Henderson.

As a result of orders to close the relief office, merchants holding disbursing orders are instructed to have these orders in the hands of the district relief office not later than January 8.

Rush Disbursing Orders. The district relief office positively will not pay the disbursing orders after January 13, but merchants failing to turn them in will have to await payment from state headquarters, which will mean delay, Formway said.

Merchants are reminded that the disbursing orders will be valid after the close of the district relief office, but payment will be delayed because of the necessary wait in handling in the state office.

All unemployables will be kept on the rolls in the counties over the state. Several hundred employables will be lopped off entirely from the rolls. These will have to be absorbed by industry, or else each local police! sub-division will have to work out a program to take care of them.

Canning Equipment Left. Canning equipment under the old set-up will be left in each of the counties, to be used in any program these political sub-divisions see fit to inaugurate.

That these several hundred persons who will be cut off the relief rolls without any form of aid must not be blamed on the WPA, the administrator said.

Many of them are not accessible to WPA projects now underway. These persons cut off will have to work out their own problems, since no program has been announced either by the national or state administrations to take care of them.

Office Employees Out. In closing the district relief office at Sweetwater, 30 employees within the organization will be left without jobs. Each county unit will release a number of office workers.

Miss Henderson will retain headquarters in Sweetwater. Unemployables are reminded that their aid, after the closing of local agencies, will come directly from the state office, the checks to be mailed out twice each month.

No disbursing orders will be issued after December 31, to those now on direct relief.

Rattan's Mother Dies. Heart trouble brought death last Friday to Mrs. W. H. Rattan of Matador, mother of Fred P. Rattan, teacher in the local school and director of the Tiger Band. Mr. and Mrs. Rattan were in Matador for funeral rites Saturday morning at 10:30 o'clock and during the remainder of the week-end.

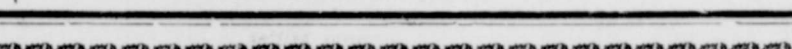


