OFFICIALS SAY SNYDER QUIET AT CHRISTMAS

Merchants Report Best Holiday Business Since 1929; Colder Weather Prevails.

County and city officers reported this morning that most folks observed Christmas with gusto but with little law breaking.

Three drunks were placed in jail Christmas Eve night, but none were found rowdy enough to be locked up Christmas, reports Sheriff S. H. Newman. No serious ac-

cidents occurred in the county. A number of Christmas parties and dances were held in Snyder. The Palace Theatre presented a free Santa Claus picture at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon, and presented a triple-threat feature beginning at 2:00 o'clock.

Best Holiday Business.

Practically all local merchants reported the best holiday buying from Friday through Tuesday that they have seen since 1929. Several show windows were completely emptied of merchandise before alive. Christmas Eve night.

A change in the attitude of buyers was noted, better merchandise and more of it being the general

Few merchants were able to give an exact accounting this morning, due to the fact that the rush completely swamped them Monday and Tuesday, but they are agreed that last-minute buying indicated a definite return of more spending money for non-essentials.

Cold Weather Visits.

Cold weather came to town Tueslowest points of winter. A stiff vantage of the pool. wind blew until Christmas night. Light snow visited all the trade territory Saturday, but none of it remained on the ground. It turned to a light drizzle before the day was out, but the weather seemed

to have little effect on shoppers. Cotton gins were closed Tuesday and Wednesday. When they reopened this morning, they reported light ginning. The Times estimates that slightly more than 19,000 bales have been ginned in the county.
