SALES SHEETS REQUIRED SAYS **COUNTY AGENT**

Local Office Wants to Be Ready To Make Subsidy Payments When Authorized.

Cotton producers of Scurry County are reminded that it will be necessary for them to get all their cotton sales sheets into the county agent's office as soon as convenientpossible for cotton sold since their last sales sheets were turned

It is understood that the money ecessary to make this subsidy payment was appropriated by Congress in the deficiency bill that also appropriated the money necessary to complete the payment of all old

AAA contracts. While the county agent's office does not have definite information about the conditions and time of sign-up, every effort is being made to have all sales sheets filed and everything else in readiness, as far as possible, in order that producers may get their subsidy payments as quickly as possible after payment

It will be necessary, says the agent, W. R. Lace, to have the fullest cooperation of all producers in getting their sales sheets turned in except on a voluntary basis, since





Dangers of Kite Flying Explained By Electric Firm

vicinity of electric wires was explained this week by officials of the Texas Electric Service Company, who are appealing to parents to warn youthful kite-flyers to keep away from wires.

"Several fatal accidents already have occurred this spring as a result of boys flying kites too near electric wires," according to L. J. Geer, district manager of the electric company, "and we want to impress on parents and children the dangers of letting kites and kite strings come in contact with wires. Above all, children should be cautioned never to use metal wire in the place of string when flying kites, for if the wire should fall across an electric line, the current would flash to the person hold-

Whenever kites become entangled in electric wires, don't climb poles or use long sticks to remove it. Call the company and a lineman will be sent to get it down, if possible. Another wise precaution is not to fly kites during a rain, as a wet string is almost as dangerous as a wire should it come in contact with an electric line. Kites with metal PWA Director Says frames, or wood frames braced with wires, should not be used.

"Employees of the company will visit local schools within the next few days and make a further explanation of the dangers of flying kites near electric wires.

25 per cent in Borden County between April 1, 1930, and January 1 1935, while horses declined 9 per cent and mules 35 per cent. So reveals the preliminary report of the farm census, completed last year by the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census.

Hogs increased 10 per cent, the eport continues. The 1935 inventory of livestock showed 1,493 horses, 516 mules, 15,617 cattle, 568 hogs and 8,774 sheep.

Out of a total of approximately 44.500 acres of land intended for harvest in 1934, over 37,000 acres failed to produce a crop in Borden County, according to the bureau's Crops were harvested in 1934 from only 7,109 acres, as compared with 28,060 acres in 1929.

Compared with 1929, individual crop acreages were much smaller the production considerably Grain sorghums were harvested from 1,286 acres in 1934, with production of 5,332 bushels, compared with 3,234 acres and 15,725 bushels in 1929. Hay, and sorghums for forage acreage fell from 5,000 to 846 acres.


