HEALTH NEWS

From Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer

"High up on every health officer's list of 'Disease Prevention Duties' at this time of the year, is the reminder, 'Typhoid Fever Immunization,' stated Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer.

"Through the protection of public water supplies from contamination, the pasteurization of milk supplies, vaccination against the disease, improved sanitation of homes not served by protected water supplies, sanitary supervision of sources of food supplies and other protective measures, typhoid fever can be controlled.

Pedestrians on Streets. "Snow at Port Elgin was piled high in all directions. The snow plow kept main pavements open for traffic, and even though some of the sidewalks had been shoveled off, most pedestrians traveled on the streets.

"In spite of all the disadvantages of being shut in by the snow we have all agreed that it has been a very healthy winter for us, and we look forward with happy anticipation the coming of the robin, the harbinger of spring.

"This winter has marked quite a contrast to the winter of 1933-34, which we spent in Snyder. All during the winter that year the warm sunny days caused lovely violets to bloom all winter long, trees were in bud by this time, and not a snow flake to be seen.
