# WEDNESDAY IS VITAL DAY FOR **AUTO DRIVERS**

Car Plates, Drivers' Licenses Cannot Be Obtained After Midnight Of April 1.

Wednesday, April 1, is a vital date for Texas car owners and drivers. After midnight of that date it will be impossible to obtain license tags or drivers' licenses, except un-

der special cases cited by the law. Bernard Longbotham, county tax ssessor - collector, says the lastminute rush for both car plates and drivers' licenses promises to assume landslide proportions. He urges ar owners and drivers to apply for their tags and licenses at once.

A new law provides that every driver of any car must have a drivers' license. The state has given notice that those who drive without licenses are subject to ar-

The county office has a full force to care for car owners and drivers who apply at once, but space and time will make it necessary for latecomers to stand in line for a long period of time.

Special attention is called by Herman Darby, assistant collector, to chauffeurs' license provisions. A chauffeur's license must be obtained who operates a truck for hire cr wages, each school bus driver, and each full-time deliveryman for local merchants. These licenses cost \$3 Drivers' licenses are issued without charge.
