





Bullock Explains His School Fund Position Monday

From Tuesday's Fort Worth Star-

His platform that include an increase from \$17.50 to \$20 in the state's per capita apportionment for support of schools was explained at the Westbrook Hotel yesterday noon by Pat Bullock of San Antonio, a candidate for state superintendent of public instruction.

There is plenty of money in the available school funds now to pay the \$20 apportionment, Bullock said, adding that if he is elected he will seek to remove the \$17.50 statutory

limitation. Bullock said he favored a system of bringing high schools to the rural pupils instead of transporting the pupils 30 or 40 miles to school. He asserted that many rural high school pupils, who have completed the grades taught in their home districts, are remaining at home rather than attend school in cities where pupils are better dressed. Bullock declares that the rural high school pupils are not getting equal advantages, explaining that in many cases the state has not paid their tuition in districts to which they are transferred.

He declared he favored abolishing the system of deputy state superintendents, asserting that the deputies spend their time traveling from one side of the district to the other to build up political fences of the state superintendent. Money paid out for the deputies' salaries is a pork barrel proposition, the speaker

"I am opposed to bringing in outside agencies to revise our school curriculum," Bullock stated. "I believe we have people in Texas with enough gumption to write a course


