Planting Season Everywhere, Many Crops Already Looking To Good 1936 Yield.

Snyder and her trade territory came out of the doldrums late last week, for the most general rainfall of the year came to bless a land that had seen only spotted showers for several months

Probably no part of the county has failed to receive enough moisture for planting, and most farmers report that the new season, with rains received earlier, gives them an outlook above average for this

time of year. Most ranchers have not received all the rain they need, but these late-May showers have given the few pastures that were not in fatr

condition a new lease on life. Mostly in Showers.

Most of the rainfall has come in howers, although spots in the county have received washout falls. Snyder and most of the territory for a few miles around continue to be one of the driest spots in the county, but Mrs. Wesley Evans reports a total of 1.60 inches Friday through Wednesday.

This total, with .84 of an inch previously recorded, brings the May precipitation here to almost 2.50 nches. Recordings here within the past few days are: Friday night, .25; Saturday, .60; Sunday, .49; Monday, .16; Wednesday, .10.

Rainfall has been registered here 11 days in May, with the heaviest fall in any 24-hour period being .60 Rainfall Everywhere.



New Mexico are visiting relatives Vegetable, Fruit **Growers Benefit** From Soil Plan

"Texas fruit growers, truck farmers and other vegetable growers will be able to earn payments under the Soil Conservation program," A. L. Smith, state agent assigned to conservation work in Texas, announces from College Station.

Smith pointed out that land that has been in vegetable crops will be counted in acreage used in determining the soil-building allowance if planted to winter cover and green manure crops, provided that such crops are turned under as green nanure. However, the crops must have been growing at least two

nonths, before being turned under. "This classification of acreage," Smith said, "will be used only for the purpose of determining soilbuilding allowances. The number of dollars for soil-building payments cannot exceed the number of acres in soil-conserving crops on the farm

"In regard to fruit growers," he said, "land devoted to orchards vineyards, small fruits and nut trees s included as crop land under the

"If such land is clean cultivated, it is classified as neutral. If it was used in 1935 to produce an interplanted soil-depleting crop, the actual acreage so used is classified as soil-depleting. If it is interplanted with a soil-conserving crop, the actual acreage is classified as soilconserving.'

The provisions governing rates of payments and qualifications are the ame on the interplanted part of all land devoted to orchards, small fruits and nut trees as on other
