Napkin Substitute Handy for Parties

For little children too young to manage the elusive paper napkin at the birthday party, try this plan.

Use a well fitting bib pattern and cut bibs of crepe paper in a color to harmonize with the other decorations, or paper napkins may be used. Reinforce with adhesive tape at top corners and punch small holes for ribbon ties. If the heavier grade of crepe paper is used, stretch and press with a warm iron before cutting bibs. They delight the children and protect the party clothes.

Olive Oil Handy for Many Home Uses

Olive oil may be used in more ways that salad dressing. As a toilet accessory it is extremely useful. The oil should be of pure Italian sort.

OUESTIONS TO BE ANSWERED LAST LECTURE

Attendance took a sharp upward jump Tuesday, as more rural and Snyder women took advantage of the second annual Times Free Cooking School.

Miss Jessie Hogue, nationally known lecturer and home economics expert, said she is highly pleased with success of the school, and her sentiment was echoed by the hundreds of women and a few men who attended.

The final session Wednesday will feature not only some of Miss Hogue's most wanted recipes, but answers to many questions asked by attendants, and a number of useable household hints.

Recipes Given Tuesday.

Following are the recipes that were given in the Tuesday lecture and demonstration:

Shrimp Creole. Coffee ice cream. Peanut bread.

Refrigerator cake. Streamline cake.

Baked cabbage with tomatoes and Carrot timballs.

Tray of molded salads (cheese ring for salad, individual fruit salad, banana salad, frozen salad).

Roast Pork.

Shrimp Creole. Probably the featured dish of the day was shrimp Creole. Its ingredients are: 3 cups hot boiled rice, 2 tbsp. Mrs. Tucker's shortening, 2 onions sliced, 4 stalks chopped celery, 1 thsp. Gold Chain flour, 1 thsp. salt, 2 cups tomatoes, 2 cups peas, 1 thsp. vinegar, 1 tspn. sugar,


11/2 cups cooked shrimp, 2 tbsp.

chili powder. Cook onions and celery until brown in shortening, add flour, seasonings and slowly the water. Cook 15 minutes. Add tomatoes, peas, vinegar, sugar and shrimp, continue cooking 10 minutes or until shrimp are thoroughly heated. Mold ice either in cones or ring and surround with shrimp Creole

With the approach of summer, women everywhere begin their annual search for something cool, yet something that can be worn for any number of occasions. To meet this need, manufacturers present

clever short sleeved dresses that can to be used for sports, for spectator wear, and still go to town in the gloves and other white accessories.

The shops are already assembling the prize assortments. Gay, onepiece, unusually designed summer dresses show different details in their make-up. They feature stitched bands, necklines with front fullness contrived by experts, buttons used for decoration as well as a purpose, and pockets cut in curves, in points, with and without flaps.

The colors are new and exciting. We found aqua, a knockout blue for blondes or redheads, shades of pink from blush to dusty coral, pale lemon yellow, and strawberry reds. White dresses are used with blazing color effects, and they are tops for summer wear, according to girls at Texas State College for Women (CIA).

Linen textures are the most interesting fabrics, and dull weaves fashion the smartest dresses. Plaits are flat, tailored with precision, and placed where they do the most good. Short sleeves are either cut with the bodice top or cleverly inset to assure freedom even for strenuous games. Cotton mesh yokes are used for contrast as well as coolness, and gently rolled collars hug the neckline and are slit down the front so that the muffled ascot scarf shows.

White is tops for summer wear. You see it taking first place in all ranks of the fashion world, and particularly among women of the South. We especially point out the new white silk crepe ensembles that are being unpacked daily by fashion

Dresses are mostly of the onepiece style with very short sleeves or a tiny shoulder cape effect. Skirts are pleated and the pleats stitched down to the kneeline. Color contrast is achieved with belts, pocket flaps, or trick lacings down the center of the chest. The jackets are either hip length or belted swagger type, with fairly wide loose sleeves.

Huge wild blazing checks in as many as four colors make stunning

jackets, and you can also wear them with cotton or linen dresses as well as the more dressy frocks. Solid afternoon with a big hat, white bright colors in grass green, scarlet, old gold, and even violet contrast other dresses that use the same colors for bows and neck bands.

All white ensembles use chiffon ascots, scallops or pointed edgings of the white silk as trim. Some three piece white crepe outfits feature printed silk blouse tops with short sleeves, and use the printed silk for cuff facing and color bands on the jacket.

White palm beach is a smart material for the new summer suits, and silk linen ranks high with its non-wrinkle qualities. Good Ice Cream Contains Needed Health Minerals

With the mercury shooting around in the 90s again, thoughts turn to cooling drinks and foods. Ice cream is turning in the score of a favorite dish again this season, and that is just as it should be, believes J. I. Keith of the dairy out. staff at the Oklahoma A. & M. College.

"Ice cream has long been recognized as a valuable food for its high fat, protein and carbohydrate content, but few persons have realized the value of the food for its mineral content," the dairy specialist points out. "Minerals such as calcium, phosphorous and chlorine are essential in the building of bones and teeth, and necessary for keeping tissue in repair.

"Minerals are absolutely essential to the maintenance of good health and ice cream contains all the minerals necessary for existence. About the best assortment of minerals found in any one natural food is found in milk, and ice cream contains them in greater quantities than milk because ice cream is a concentration form of milk," Keith

A score of different elements have

been definitely identified among the minerals contained in milk. Potassium, sodium, chlorine, calcium, magnesium, copper, zinc, manganese, aluminum, silicon, titanium, lithium, strontium, phosphorus, sulphur, iodine and iron are all found in milk. Regardless of the fact that the body uses only small amounts of some of these minerals, their importance, even in most minute quantities, is beyond measurement in dollar value, Keith says.

A growing child requires comparatively large amounts of mineral of different kinds to build bones and teeth, for body fluids, and to aid proper functioning of the vital or-



Mrs Tucker's Shortening

Easy Way to Hang Pan Covers Is Given

A convenient and easy arrangement for pan covers is this: Place on the cupboard doors where kitchen utensils are kept, two tacks spanning the width of the largest kettle

From one tack to the other stretch heavy string. About six inches below, screw securely two clothes hooks about five inches apart with the prongs upward. In this way the covers are supported while the string holds them against the door at the

Never Chip Ice in Your Refrigerator

Never chip ice into small pieces in the refrigerator. Instead, knock off a piece of the proper size, close the refrigerator at once, and putinto a bag.

Lime Removed From Kettle Saves Time


Hard water is responsible for the lime deposit which forms on the inside of teakettles. It is not harmful, but the more lime on the inside of the kettle the slower will water in the kettle heat.

If the kettle is aluminum or fron it may be heated cautiously when kettle expands, the lime deposit will crack and can then be removed.

Treating with acid is another method. If the deposit is light, a dilute acid, such as vinegar, allowed to stand in the kettle will dissolve it. The addition of a little common salt will hasten the process. Little bubbles indicate that the deposit is dissolving in the acid.

Dreamland -- A Magic City Has Arisen

DALLAS SHOW ALREADY SEEN BY THOUSANDS

Several dozen Scurry County folks are among those who have already seen the central Texas Centennial Exposition at Dallas-called by Boyd Gatewood, writing in "Texas Parade" for June, "the Magic City of the Twentieth Century.'

They return to their homes with a feeling almost akin to awe. It is hardly conceivable that such an enterprise should have arisen in a paltry eight months. But it has risen. The Times believes that its readers, many of whom are saving these cooking school issues, will be glad to have the following description of the Exposition by Mr. Gate-

Maxfield Parrish, in his bright fancy, might have painted it as one of his dream cities suspended in the azure sky. Frank Lloyd Wright, the architect, might have designed it as the masterpiece of his strange genius. Neither did. Yet is surpasses in reality the dreams of either of these artists-this city of magic, yet of stone and steel, fashioned for the Texas Centennial Exposition, which opened June 6, and closes November 29.

Eight months ago it was no more than a set of blue prints. Not a spade had touched dirt toward its realization, and the chronic scoffers were wagging their tongues: "It can never be built on time. It's humanly impossible." Yet when the president of the United States enters its grand portal for the official opening on June 13, the magic city will stand before him-complete.

It seems, and is, so short a time since Texans, proudly mindful of a hundred years of rich history and the Exposition itself. It is the

high achievement, began to plan for bright gateway to the wonders withcommemorate the winning of Tex- State. as' independence. The central celebration was to focus on Dallas in major exposition.

Longer Life for Old **Purses Easily Solved**

An inexpensive and pretty purse may seem useless because the snap that closes it is broken before the purse is worn out. If the purse has a flap, envelope style, that fastens with a snap fastener, a precaution can be taken that will insure long wear for the snap.

A piece of leather cut from a grove can be glued around the snap that protrudes, forming a little collar that will prevent the silk or leather that holds it in place from becoming worn and thus allows the snap to pull out and loosen. The leather or kid should be chosen to match the purse as nearly as possible in color and should be cut in one piece with a hole big enough to slip over the neck of the snap. Cement that is used for mending china is good for this kind of work, and the thinner the leather used the nicer the job will be when finished.

Sears, Roebuck Coldspot Will Be In School Today

To improve the construction of the 1936 Coldspot refrigerator it was necessary for Sears, Roebuck & Company's merchandise development division to show the aluminum industry a manufacturing process that they deemed impossible, said V. R. Neblett, manager of the Sears store at Sweetwater.

The Coldspot will be featured in the third and final day of the cooking school-Wednesday.

"In planning the Golden Jubilee Coldspot," Neblett declared, "our merchandise development men decided that the old type of wire shelf was obsolete and should be replaced with a shelf that was of light weight, strong, rustless, tarnishless, corrosionless and with flat bars.

"This meant that each shelf had to be constructed from one single sheet of aluminum and no welding could be used. Despite their splendid facilities for evolving new manufacturing processes the aluminum people could not fill our needs, and so our men tackled the problem. Finally, after months of work they were able to tell representatives of the aluminum industry, 'Here, gentlemen, is the way to construct the type of shelf that we require'."

Aside from this exclusive aluminum shelf feature the new Coldspot has other striking innovations such as the touch-a-bar door opener, which opens quickly at the slight touch of the finger-tip or elbow and a "handibar" in which to store surplus foods of the less perishable nature.

Operating quietly and efficiently the concealed "Rotorite" freezing unit has only five moving parts sealed in a bath of oil. This unit is super-powered and it has shown in laboratory tests lasting for months on end that it will give plenty of fast refrigeration at temperatures of 110 to 120 degrees. To facilitate the work of this unit dry zero installation, three inches thick, has been built in on all sides of the storage department.

The Sweetwater Sears' store is featuring Coldspot sizes in four, six and eight foot size.

Tray Saves Steps if Icebox Is on Porch

For a household where the icebox has to be kept on the back porch. some steps from the kitchen work table, much time and effort may be saved by the use of a tray.

When beginning to prepare a meal the articles such as eggs, milk, salad ingredients, etc., are put on the tray and brought into the kitchen. Or just before a meal is to be served the butter, cream, salad, cracked ice, etc., are brought in on a tray. When the meal is finished the tray is again used to perform the duty of returning the leftovers to the icebox. It is then wiped off and left near the icebox, ready for the next meal.



Meals Planned For Seasons Are More Practical

Although canned foods constitute an important part of the diet and the highest quality is available, perhaps we would have a better appreciation of them later if at this time of the year we look to the fresh foods more in planning our meals Menus.

Breakfast - Blackberries, cream,

plain muffins, bacon, milk, Lunch - Chipped beef on toast fresh spinach, Waldorf salad, cherries and cream, cookies.

Dinner-Stuffed pork chops, ascalloped potatoes, cucumber lettuce salad, orange charlotte.

Breakfast-Fresh pineapple, bran walfle, coffee.

Lunch-Sandwich (cream cheese, olives, bacon, toast), potato chips, ginger ale salad, cookies, tea.

Dinner-Brolled steak, baked potatoes, creamed onions, fresh peacelery salad, peach shortcake.

Recipes.

Stuffed Pork Chops-Slit thick pork chop and fill with bread dressing. Put edges together with toothpick. Place in baking dish, and bake in oven. Baste with water or seasoned meat juice

Orange Charlotte-1 1-3 T gelatin, 1-3 c cold water, 1-3 c boiling water, 1 c sugar, 2 T lemon juice 1 c orange juice, whites 3 eggs, 1-2 pt. cream. Soak gelatin in cold water, dissolve in boiling water, strain, and add sugar, lemon juice, orange juice, chill in pan of ice water, when quite thick, beat with wire spoon until frothy. Then add whites of eggs beaten stiff and fold in whipped cream. Line a mold with sections of oranges, turn moisture, smooth evenly and chill.

Cream Cheese Sandwich-Spread evenly on toasted or plain bread cream cheese that has been worked to a smooth consistency (milk may be added), add chopped olives and crisp bacon.

Short Cake-1-4 c butter, 1-2 c sugar, 1 egg, 1-4 c milk, 1 c flour, 1-4 t salt, 2 t baking powder. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, and egg well beaten. Mix and sift flour, baking powder, and salt, adding alternately with milk to first mixture. Beat thoroughly, and bake in buttered round tin. - Cool, spreading thickly with sweetened peaches. Cover with whipped cream if de-

Tomatoes stuffed with crab meat or shrimp make a delicious salad. Peel tomatoes, place on lettuce and serve with your favorite salad dress-


