Callahan County Hospital Inspected By Tennessee Firm

County officials met Monday afternoon with Roy Hand, regional consultant for United Hospitals, and gave him approval to start his inspection of the hospital.

United Hospital operates 15 hospitals in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and Tennessee. Mr. Hand said that hospitals are a business and must be run as a business. Most facilities bought or leased by the firm are losing money when they take it over. Each one has been put back in the black.

The commissioners were told by Hand that he didn't anticipate subsidies from the county and other hospitals operated

by United Hospitals.

Hendrick, who terminated their lease June 15, said \$10,000 to \$12,000 a month in subsidies would be needed to keep the hospital operating.

Commissioners will know within two weeks if the Memphis based firm is interested in managing the hospital.

Judge Mack Kniffen said it looked very promising.

Because of the number, interested people wishing to express their support for continued operation of the hospital, had to be moved to the County Courtroom to accommodate them. About 50 were in attendance.

Cross Plains Takes Over Gas System From Bankrupt Firm

Cross Plains City Council voted Thursday night to assume operation of the town's natural gas system after Flame Gas filed for bankruptcy Tuesday in federal court.

Residents and businesses were facing possible shut-down of the system at noon Tuesday if City Council could not keep it operational.

The distribution system has been hampered with leaky lines for years. The system leaks 40-plus percent of the natural gas piped through it. TRC guidelines limit leakage to 5 percent.

Mayor O.B. Edmundson said the take over was only temporary. An engineer will be hired to take a survey and give an estimate to what the cost will be to finish repairing the leaky lines.

The cities main concern was for the homes and businesses not to be interrupted by the gas cut-off.

Mayor Edmundson spoke with members of the Railroad Commission Monday Morning and they were very cooperative and willing to work with the city concerning the problem.

Increase In Highway Funding, \$130 Million

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will receive an

estimated \$130 million in additional funding for highway construction and maintenance through 1983, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby announced Friday.

The Highway Cost Committee provided the additional funds by updating its method of calculating the effects of inflation on the costs of highway construction and maintenance. The committee, comprised of Gov. Bill Clements, Hobby and State Comptroller Bob Bullock, adjusted its calculations to in-

clude a change in the process by which contractors bid on highway jobs and to give more stress to highway maintenance.

During the committee meeting, Hobby pinpointed a flaw in the Highway Department's method of calculating the Highway Cost Index and suggested an alternative that will provide an additional \$12 million for 1982-83.

"I am pleased that the committee saw fit to make these changes," Hobby said. "For various reasons, the Highway Cost Index

needed updating to provide a more accurate picture of the effects of inflation on highway programs.

Hobby said the additional \$130 million is severely needed to help upgrade the state's highway system.

"Several states have actually suspended bidding for highway construction due to lack of funds," Hobby said. "That is not going to happen in Texas because we have made long range guarantees of funding for this essential public service."

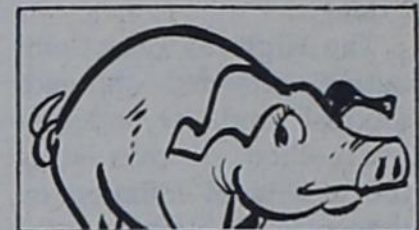

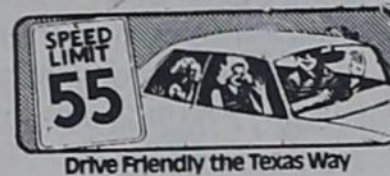



Two-Day Clinic Held For Swine Exhibitors And Breeders

4-H and FFA swine exhibitors along with their parents and leaders as well as swine breeders are invited to a Swine Evaluation Clinic July 19-20 at the Gillespie County Fairgrounds, according to Greg Gerngross.

The opening session begins at 9 a.m. The 2-day clinic will feature discussions in all areas relating to a successful barrow project for 4-H and FFA members. It is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M's Department of Animal Science and the Texas Pork Producers Association.

Discussions will center on swine selection, facilities, nutrition and feeding management, health, training and showing plus planning more educational swine shows.

Three prominent swine judges will headline the program. They are Dan Hoge; Dr. Lauren Christian; and Jim

Rucker.

According to Tanksley, one of the clinic highlights will be an exhibition and evaluation of 37 self-fed barrows that will represent wide differences in skeletal makeup, looseness of structure, muscle breeders, have been on test since April 9.

These test barrows will be slaughtered and their carcasses evaluated so that clinic participants will be able to see what self-fed barrows look like and what differences exist in the carcasses of various kinds and shapes of pigs.

Household Advice And Hints

Jointly financed weddings are becoming more popular—with bride's and groom's families sharing the costs more than in the past, says Cindy Wilson, a family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Most falls for older adults occur between the

bed and bath, so "think safety" in these areas, advises Dr. Peggy Owens, a housing and home furnishings specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Safety features that help avoid falls include grab bars and non-skid surfaces in the tub or shower. Also a seat in the shower aids disabled persons.

Shoppers, for the best "per pound" buys, select fruits and vegetables that have only a small amount of waste, advises Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a food and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

For example, broccoli has less waste than artichokes, so "per pound", broccoli is a much better buy, the specialist explains.

Eliminate grime and mildew from your refrigerator door gasket with solutions you can make at home, says Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Use one of these scouring solutions: mild, hot, soapy water or baking soda and water or a mild scouring powder, she says. Rinse thoroughly and dry.

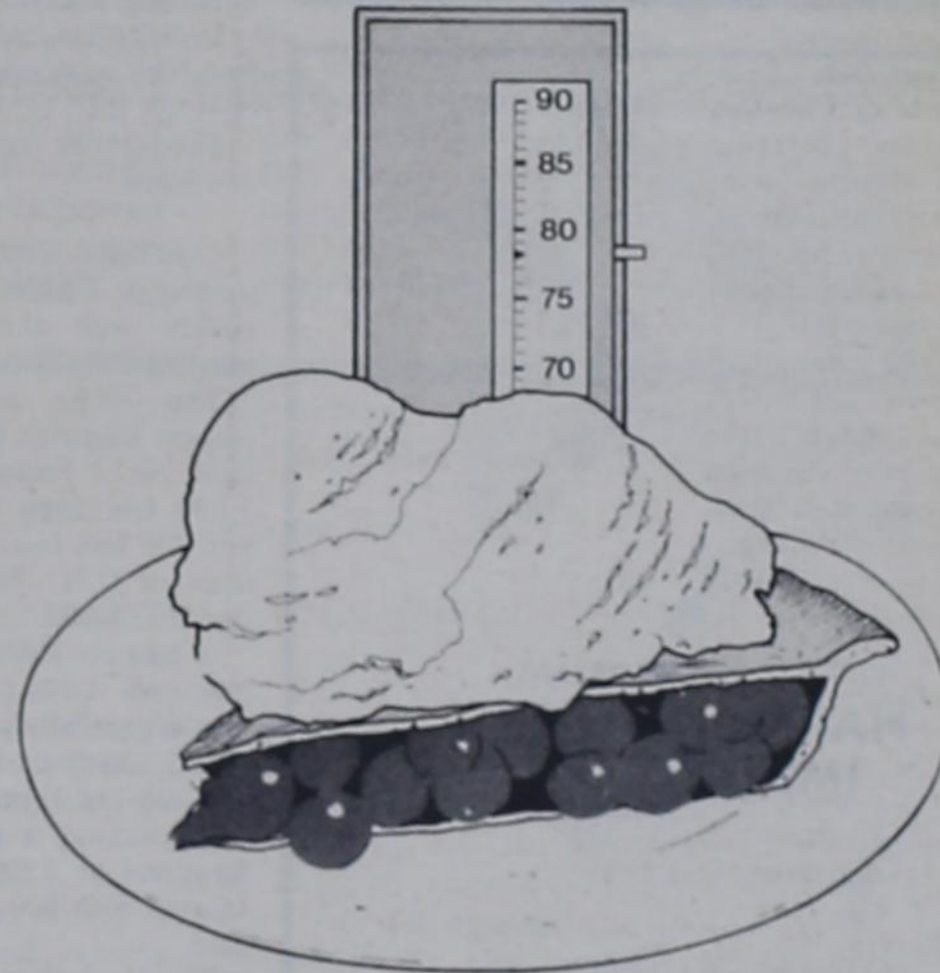
