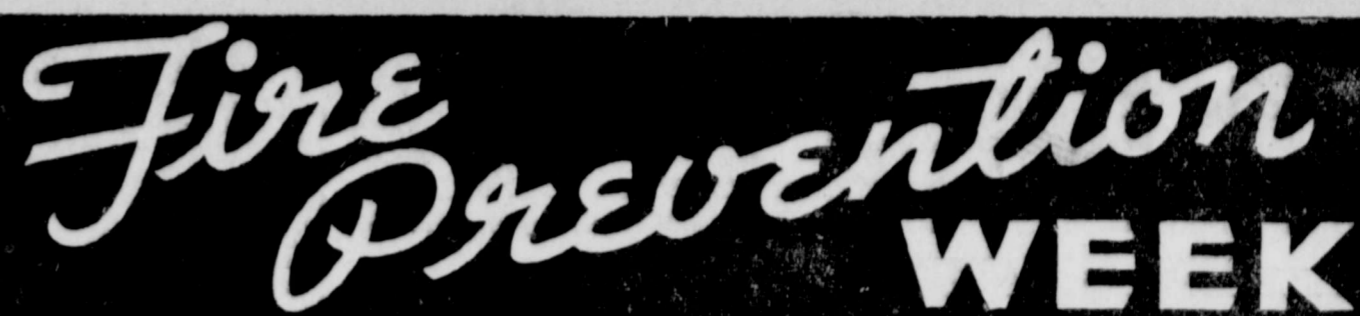

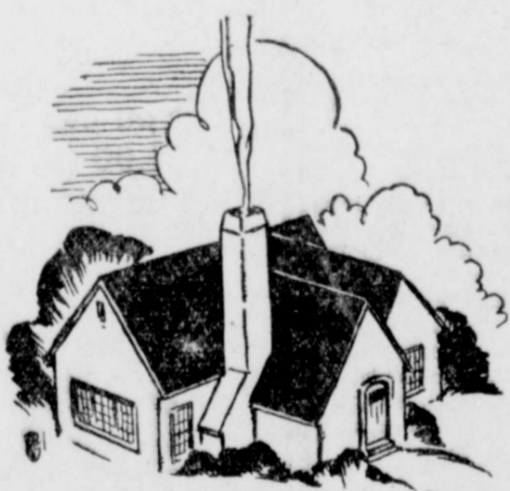

460 PATIENTS FOR HOSPITAL

Snyder General Hospital checked up on its first year at 7:00 o'clock Friday morning, September 25, and discovered that it had played host to 460 patients during 365 days of operation.

Figures compiled by Secretary A. C. Prentiss show that 134 major operations and 81 minor operations were performed during the year. An average of 38 1-3 patients have entered the hospital monthly, and the daily average in the hospital has been 6. Twenty-six new babies have been greeted at the institution.

Directors as well as more than 100 other county citizens who own stock in the \$35,000 hospital, have expressed surprise and pleasure at the first-year success of the locally financed institution.

Sadler Circus Will Offer Huge Animal Here Next Monday

What would the reader do if he were brought face to face with a man who had an arm reach of 14 feet, whose fingers were 10 inches long with a hook at the end of each finger, whose face is flat and resembles an aged man; and whose body weighing 300 pounds is covered with a coat of brown fur? Most any one would be scared stiff, to use slang, to meet such a human-animal—but all who attend the Harley Sadler circus when it exhibits in Snyder Monday, October 5, can be face to face with just such a beast.



John Rindling, acknowledged circus king, paid over \$20,000 for an animal such as described above about 20 years ago, and after exhibiting it in this country for six months, the beast died. Since then there has not been another such freak animal in America, not even in the metropolitan zoos or parks.

The owners of Harley Sadler circus sent their own agents abroad in search of an animal that could be featured. A posse of 15 men surrounded and captured this unusual animal in the island of Sumatra, but not before there was a fierce struggle in which one man lost an arm and afterwards died of blood poisoning. The technical name for this unusual animal is Maues Kut. This beast is worth a small fortune but the Harley Sadler circus prefers to keep it, knowing it to be the only one of its kind on American soil.

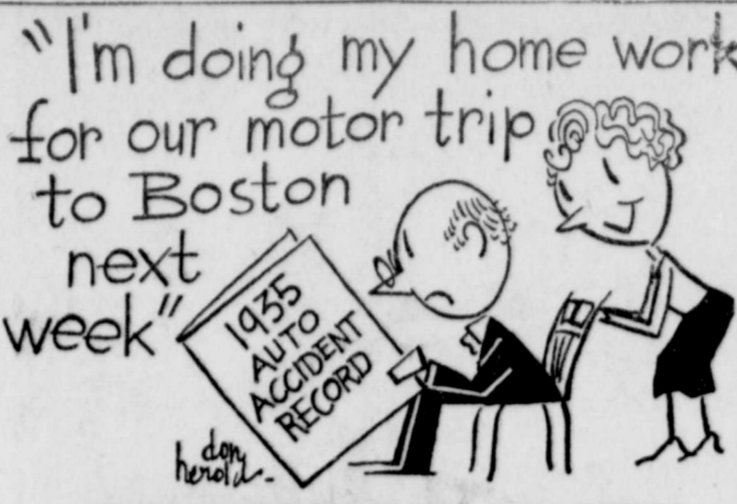
