Pension at Sixty-five.

This money and the interest i has drawn begins coming back to him when he is 65 in the form of a monthly security benefit from the government fund, to which both worker and employer have contributed.

Monthly retirement payments will range from \$10 to \$85 a month based on the total work in the United States which the employe has done since the beginning of 1937. To qualify on January 1, 1942, for payments, the worker 65 years old or older must have earned a total wage of at least \$2,000 in the intervening five-year period and earned wages for at least one day in each of the five different calendar years. A final demand will be made on the employe: When he is 65, he will have to quit his job. Death benefits will be paid to

the estates of individuals who reach the age of 65 but do not qualify

King Cotton Slumps.

All Scurry County citizens should read the following paragraph with deep concern:

"The world supply of cotton is the largest in three years. Texas farmers, as the principal cottonraising group in the world, are vitally affected by that fact, since the price of cotton is governed to a large extent by world conditions. The increase in world supply is due to marked increase of cotton in Russia, Brazil and China. . . . Improved quality of Texas cotton would tend to strengthen the competitive position of American cotton abroad and to make it more saleable at home."

This statement comes from one of the state's leading cotton economists. It is the same sentiment, expressed in different words, of a Scurry County farmer, who expressed his opinion in Snyder this week.

This farmer said our section of the clate would profit not only in the world market by growing a better grade of cotton, and then picking it instead of pulling it, but would also improve Scurry County cotton land year after year. He declared that when cotton burrs are taken from the field they remove one of the soil's chief sources of productivity, potash. Regardless of the immediate merits of cheap pulled cotton-and these merits are doubtful-it is folly for
