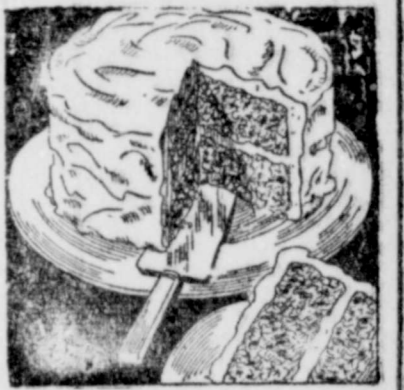

### STATE LEADER SPEAKS TWICE FOR BAPTISTS

Mitchell-Scurry Workers Gather 300 Strong at First Baptist Church Here Tuesday.

Dr. R. C. Campbell, state secretary of the Baptist General Convention, spoke twice Tuesday to 300 members of the denomination and several others from the Mitchell-Scurry Association, meeting in monthly workers' conference.

The state leader, former pastor of the First Baptist Church, Lubbock, delivered the principal sermon of the all-day meeting at 11:23 a. m. "State Missions" was the topic.

He pointed out the immensity of the state field, and said that human organization and power, with divine guidance, will bring in the harvest.

Texas Baptists cooperating with the general convention are more than 615,000 strong in more than 3,000 churches, he said. He painted a vivid picture of the fruits of a gigantic state-wide mission program, with emphasis on the glory of soul winning to local church units.

Speaks on Stewardship. In the afternoon, Dr. Campbell spoke on "Stewardship."

Next workers' meeting goes to Colorado January 19. The date was moved up a week because the state Sunday school convention will be held in Dallas during the second week of January.

Missions Discussed. The Tuesday meeting's theme, "Our State Mission Program," was carried out morning and afternoon. Lawrence Dever led a song and praise service to open the meeting, and Rev. J. F. Fields led the devotional.

### Head of Hardin-Simmons University Art Department Shows Masterpieces

Using prints of art masterpieces, Miss A. M. Carpenter, head of the art department of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, presented a beautiful illustrated talk on "History of the Madonna in Art," before a group of interested listeners at the Presbyterian Church here Tuesday evening.

Angeles; "Geometric Landscape," "Decorative Landscape," "River Valley," a scene near Los Angeles; "Springtime in Texas," a Bluebonnet scene near Abilene on Potosi Road, worked out decoratively; "Morning Mist," first place cash award in state-wide contest sponsored by Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, and "Early Morning in California," both of which were painted about 5:30 o'clock in the morning; "Eucalyptic Trees," scene in California.

A group of four oils called "Nature Suite" was created by Miss Carpenter at the suggestion of Edwin Young, head of the piano department of Hardin-Simmons University, to illustrate four of his musical compositions by the same names. These were exhibited Tuesday evening to local people, some of whom saw them at the Bluebonnet Hotel, Sweetwater, in an exhibit late in September.

To illustrate pencil technique, two pictures were shown—"Texas Cactus" and "An Oak Tree." "Arizona

Miss Carpenter will present the same illustrated talk in Abilene Friday before a group of club women, and again over radio station KRBC, Abilene, during the Christmas holidays. The talk will be published soon, the artist says.

A. A. (Pat) Bullock, former head of the rural school division of the department of education, and former superintendent of Scurry County schools, told a senate committee Tuesday school children of Texas would be benefited if the state superintendent was appointed instead of elected.

The committee has been gathering information on which to base recommendations for revising school laws.

"The children will never get 100 per cent value out of the rural school equalization fund as long as the superintendent is dependent entirely on politics," Bullock, an unsuccessful candidate for the office last summer, testified.

Bullock answered in the affirmative a question as to whether this was "true no matter who is state superintendent."
