BRIDGEMAN TO BE INTERRED IN SNYDER TODAY

Veteran Transfer Man Dies After Long Siege of Pneumonia in Lubbock Hospital.

Farewell services for Pete Bridgeman, veteran West Texas transfer man, will be held at the First Baptist Church this (Thursday) afternoon, 5:00 o'clock, with Rev. Lawrence Hays and Rev. H. C. Gordon officiating.

Pneumonia, growing into heart complications, claimed the life of the 49-year-old business man in a Lubbeck hospital at 10:45 o'clock Wednesday morning. The illness struck April 11, and Mr. Bridgeman was carried to the hospital three days later.

He lingered for days after hope for saving his life was apparently gone. An oxygen tent was used a large part of the time in an effor to pull him through the critica hours. Friends and relatives believed during the last few days of his life that he would conquer th protracted illness, and his death yesterday morning was a severe blo to the entire community.

Daughter Seriously III.

Mrs. Ben Tefkin of Los Angele California, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bridgeman, is seriously ill in the Lubbock hospital in which her father died. She contracted pneumonia after she came from California to be at the bedside.
