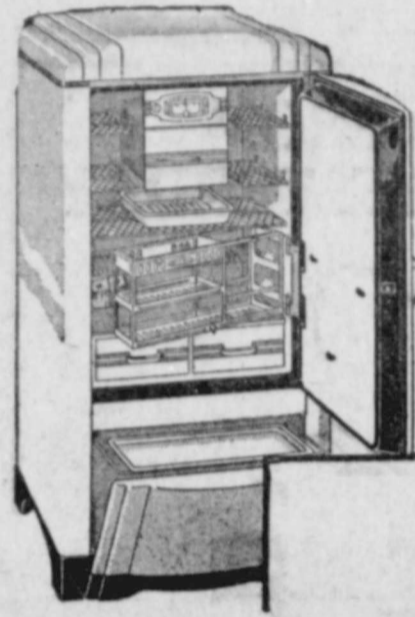

City Offers Property for Erection Of Public Library, Club Sponsored

The city of Snyder Monday night offered use of a portion of the lot just west of the city hall for construction of a public library, sponsored by Snyder club women.

Portion of the lot that remains after the city hall is enlarged under a WPA project, work on which should begin soon, would be used for the proposed structure.

Mrs. W. R. Luce, Mrs. J. D. Scott and Mrs. J. C. Smyth represented club women in presenting their request to the City Council. They were assisted by Walla B. Fish, who represented the American Legion.

Building permits took a spurt during April, climbing to \$2,500 for the month, \$7,850 for the year. Four permits were issued, as follows: E. C. Ralston, residence repairs, Southeast Snyder, \$200; Dr. W. R. Johnson, residence additions and alterations, \$600; Scurry County Grain Company, elevator, \$700; Henry Roemer, addition and alterations to residence, \$1,000.

April water and sewer collections were \$1,301.36; taxes, \$620.77. Bills totaling \$2,155.46 were approved.

The council agreed to offer the A. C. Wilmoth estate \$850 for the portion of the block now occupied by the city hall that is not now owned by the city, purchase price to be applied on taxes.
