6.-This amendment provides for assistance to the needy blind over the age of 21 years, not to exceed \$15 per month per person, and provides for acceptance from the federal government of financial aid I for such payment.

### **GUN ACCIDENT** TAKES LIFE OF **BISON FARMER**

C. C. Tate Killed Instantly When Shotgun Discharges as He Climbs on Tractor.

Accidental discharge from a double-barreled shotgun early Tuesday afternoon was fatal to C. C. Tate, 44-year-old farmer of the Bison community, 14 miles southwest of

Members of the family who became worried when Mr. Tate didnot return from work Tuesday evening found him, about dark, hanging from the tractor he had been operating in a field a half mile from

the Bison school house. The farmer had taken the shotgun to the field with him after dinner. He planned to shoot crows that had been bothering his crops. Since the tractor had not been operated after dinner, members of the family concluded that Mr. Tate dropped the gun as he climbed onto

#### Thumb, Ear Mangled. The left thumb was shot away,

and the right ear and a portion of that side of the face were mangled. The body hung midway between the tractor and the ground, the one place at which the head had struck the dirt indicating that death was

miles west and slightly south of Ira, 18 miles southwest of Snyder. It is located on the northwest quarter of Section 112, Block 97, and will be known as the Shaw Oil Company-First National Bank, Dallas.
