### Taxpayers Save Interest and County Debtors Are Paid in Cash

For the first time in many years, the government of Scurry County

is being operated on a cash basis. Completion of general fund refinancing by the Commissioners Court within the past few days broke the final barrier between the county and a paid-up financial con-

Asked by The Times to provide figures that would give a rather complete view of the county's present financial structure, County Auditor A. C. Preuitt states that the county now has a cash balance of \$71.906.21

### Division of This Balance,

Of this amount, said the auditor, \$38,198.97 is credited to the maintenance funds and \$33,707.24 is credited to the several sinking funds. After \$10,332.18 in general fund scrip, now outstanding, is turned in, the maintenance fund balance will be \$27,866.79. With the sinking fund balances, the cash balance to the credit of the county would then be
