





The head is pecuiarly characteristic of the breed-Roman nose and thin, black, pendulous ears. The legs as well as the face and ears of a Karakul are covered with short, fine, lustrous, black

Ewes are generally hornless, but the rams sometimes have long spiral, outspreading horns. The ool is coarse and long, and it varies in color from black through various shades of brown to light gray,

Practically all lambs are black at pirth and remain that color until they are yearlings, after which the wool gradually becomes of lighter shade. Change in color is not uniform in all animals, some remaining dark in maturity and others become






