# **PAVING PLANS OUTLINED FOR CITY CITIZENS**

#### **Collection Campaign Brings** Heavy April Water and Sewer Payments

Two rules governing the city paving program were passed, and collection of heavy water and sewer fees in April was recognized, as the two features of the City Council meeting Monday night.

Water and sewer collections of \$1,809.08 included a large amount of delinquent bills that have been paid during a strenuous collection campaign.

Building permits of \$3,825 brought the 1938 total figure to \$9,175. Fines were \$32.10, and tax collections were \$633.02. Bills totaling \$1,520.57 were allowed

#### Two Paving Rules.

The council voted to pave extra strips of streets or alleys, not included in the regular approved street projects, providing the owners of the property abutting on such streets or alleys will pay the entire estimated cost of the additional paving.

Pending completion of the paving projects authorized by the council January 3, the city will pay for topping material and otherwise sponsor the paving of the following streets only: Avenue S from the Deep thence west on 30th Street to Avenue T, thence north on Avenue T to the Deep Creek bridge. This was the context of the second paving regulation.



der Monday of next week. Sweetwater, most "scout-minded" city in the Buffalo Trail Council, recently set the ball rolling by raising a budget of \$3,010.

Snyder has been given a suggested budget of \$600, considerably more than the district raised during the past fiscal year. Ed McCurcharge of the Snyder District, will be here to assist local and county leaders.

Figures provided by Frank Farmer, rural scouting chairman, show that Scurry County has the largest number of Boy Scouts in her history-a total of 144 at a recent

Of this number, Snyder has 64 boys in her two troops. Pyron and Fluvanna each have 16 boys, Hermleigh has 15, Ira has 12, Dunn has 11, and Turner has 10. Thus, the county now has eight troops in seven communities. Scurry is the leading rural scouting county in the council, Farmer said.

A few years ago the Buffalo Trail Council had only one executive. Now the area has three executives, and these are being kept busy.

A young twister swept through a portion of the county several miles outh of Snyder late Tuesday evenng, doing some property damage, out injuring no one.





Fruit Crumble

- 11/4 cups fine toasted bread crumbs 1 cup crushed pineapple 1/4 teaspoon salt cup seeded raisins, chopped
- marshmallows, sliced cup dates, chopped cup nuts, chopped
- Mix all ingredients together thoroughly but lightly. Chill. Pile in sherbet glasses. Serve with whipped cream.

#### Mexican Salad

1 bunch curly endive 1 cup bread cubes (1/4 inch) 1 bunch radishes toasted. French dressing bunch watercress

Break salad greens into small pieces. Slice radishes. Add to greens with French dressing and let marinate in refrigerator. Just before serving, toss the bread cubes lightly with the greens. Yield: 6 servings.

#### Bread Crumb Cake.

cup soft bread crumbs eggs, separated teaspoons baking powder cup sugar tablespoons cold water tablespoon melted fat cup chopped nuts teaspoonful vanilla extract Beat yolks until thick and light. Add sugar and water. Add nuts, bread crumbs, baking powder and fat. Mix well. Add flavoring and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in 2 greased layer cake pans in a hot oven (400F) 15 to 20 minutes.

#### **Royal** Pudding.

2 cups hot milk cups bread crumbs eggs, separated tablespoons sugar

Beat yolks. Cool milk and add sugar, salt and flavoring and beat with yolks. Place crumbs in buttered casserole or baking dish and add liquid. Bake in a moderate oven (350F) 25 minutes. Remove from oven. Sprend jam on top of pudding. Cover with meringue made by whipping the egg whites with a pinch of salt and folding in the 4 tablespoons sugar. Return to oven and bake 20 minutes. Serve hot or cold.
