There was a time when sheep raising was held rather generally to be a "big operations" industry with individual breeders owning thousands of head.

That's partly true today, with big flocks still owned in West Texas, but the "little man" has come to the front in recent years, it being hard to find farms in this region on which there are not at least a few sheep

In Tom Green County, for instance, it is estimated that there are 50,000 more sheep than could have been counted five years ago. Principally, the increases are to be found on small farms.

#### Land Bank Will Keep Low Rates Two More Years

The reduced interest rates on fedoans have been extended by feder-Hugh Boren, secretary-treasurer of the Snyder National Farm Loan As-

On Federal Land Bank loans hrough national farm loan associaions the temporary reduced rate of per cent per annum will be coninued for all interest installments payable prior to July 1, 1940.

The temporarily reduced rate of our per cent on land bank commisioner loans is also continued unt July 1, 1940, Boren said.

"The temporary interest reduc on does not change the contract interest rate, that is, the rate written in the mortgage at the time loan was made," Boren said. "At present the contract rates on new land bank loans are four per cent for loans through unimpaired associations. The contract rate on all oner loans made through the land bank is five per cent. Under the law, as now amended, both land bank and commissioner borrowers will resume interest paynents at their respective contract ates on July 1, 1940.

"Farmers who now obtain new oans through an association at the four per cent contract rate," Boren continued, "will get the benefit of the 31/2 per cent rate for all interes installments payable prior to July , 1940, and after that will not have to pay more than the four per cent contract rate for the belance of the term of the loan, which may be fo Doris Warren spent the week-end as long as 20 to 30-odd years."




