NOTICE OF ELECTION

In accordance with the provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code, Chapter 74, Subchapter D, and 4 Tex. Admin. Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a board election in the Northwest Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, in order to select a representative of the above-referenced zone to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The Northwest Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone consists of all of Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Lamb and Parmer counties; and that part of Randall County that lies north and west of a line running along Highway 60 from the Deaf Smith County line east to Interstate 27; then running north along Interstate Highway 27 to the Potter County line.

Any person eligible to vote in the board member election that resides in the Northwest Plains Zone and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place their name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below. Nomination forms are provided by the Department and must be signed by the nominee and at least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received by the Department at its office located in Austin by February 7, 2011, and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting the Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.

The board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed to cotton growers by February 22, 2011. All ballots cast by mail must be postmarked no later than March 9, 2011, in order to be valid. Any cotton grower having planted cotton in the year 2010 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and, if he or she resides in the Northwest Plains Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, can have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton intended to be commercial cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm, or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm or from an indemnity or other payment received from or related to the planting, growing, or failure of the cotton.



"Eternal" means everlasting or forever. "Continued duration in past time and future." According to Strong's Concordance it appears about 70 times in the New Testament-and two times in Old Testament.

In the Old Testament it refers to "the eternal God of thy refuge," and to "eternal excellency".

It is interesting to note that the expression "eternal life" does not appear in the Old Testament — and neither does "kingdom of God" or "Kingdom of heaven."

The reason for that is the laws governing the Israelites was also the laws under which they worshipped God.

They were not spiritual laws. We don't read about them being born again, being baptized or other things of that nature.

Furthermore all the Jews or people of Israel were subject to the laws of Moses.

But under the New Testament the laws, rules, and commandments are spiritual. In the Kingdom of God baptism, eternal life, and such like, are spiritual, but they are binding on no one.

What I am saying is; we have no legal obligation, or duty to give attention or obedience to the scriptures. But our interest in support of, or obedience to them is a matter of choice.

If or when we make that choice (if we do) it is because of a feeling of devotion to and belief of a Higher Power that lives in our mind.
