Work East, West Foreseen Soon as Surveys Started

The highway news for which the county has been waiting for years came to County Judge H. J. Brice late last week

Work on Highway 15 in Scurry County will start within the next few months-that was the sentiment of the news, contained in a letter from Julian Montgomery, state highway engineer.

Definite surveys on the new routing through Scurry County have already begun. The letter reads:

"I am pleased to inform you that the Highway Commission recently approved the 1940 regular federal aid program. This program includes the following projects in Scurry County:

"Scurry County, State Highway 15, near junction Highway U. S. 84, to Fisher County line, 12.7 miles, grading and drainage structures. "Scurry County, Highway 15, Sny-der to Borden County line, 146 miles, grading and drainage structures.'
