SCHOOL WORK **BEGUN MONDAY** WITH PROGRAM

Formal Beginning of Demolishing Job Marked by Talks on **Progress** of School

Formal opening of Snyder's new school building program was highlighted Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock with talks depicting progress of local schools through the years. Actual demolishing of the firerazed structure was begun several days earlier, but the crew of more than 20 men was just getting underway when the ceremony was held. Tiger Band gave an opening musical number, and Superintendent C. Wedgeworth gave introductory remarks.

#### Several Local Talkers.

Rev. James E. Spivey gave the invocation. County Judge H. J. Brice used the theme of progress, adopted by Snyder Schools as a motto this year, as his subject.

N. M. Harpole gave a review o school conditions 30 years ago, with D. P Yoder, who was on the school board more than a decade ago, giv ing a summary of schools as the were 15 years ago.

J. E. Sentell, member of the school board, spoke on today's school conditions. He gave facts to show that Snyder's new building program will be a foundation for the future.

As Sentell spoke, Board Member Clyde Boren knocked some bricks from the old building, symbolizing demolition of the old structure. Dr J. G. Hicks, president of the board moved the first spadeful of dirt to Regional Game Manager Discusses symbolize the new construction program.


