Equipment Moved in This Week for Reputedly Deep Well Near Old Pender Hole

Equipment is being moved in this week for a deep rotary test well on Jesse Koonsman's land five m'les north of Camp Springs. Location of the test will be on Section 217. Block 2, H & T. C. survey.

Helmrich & Payne of Tulsa, Oklahoma, are contractors for the test, which is being financed by Forest Development Company of Abilene. Cellar is being dug this week. with spudding to be started not later than December 20, according to unofficial reports. The best information obtained by The Times is that the rotary job will be a 5,000 foot test.







Approaching Marriage of Maurine Local Girl Bride Cunningham Announced Last Week


