COUNTY GAINS 651 PEOPLE IN **CENSUS COUNT**

Back-to-Farm Trend Noted in Past Five Years—Total Population Of County Given 12,188

Figures released Friday by A. G. Bearden of Lamesa, district superrisor of the 1940 census, indicate a significant trend in population and conomic trends of the decade from

In Scurry County, for example, there were 1,481 farms in 1930; in 1935 this figure had dropped to 1,348 and between 1935 and 1940 the trend limbed upward again, with 1,450 farms reported for 1940.

Showing a gain of 651 people population of Scurry County climbed from 11,537 inhabitants in 1930 to 12,188 people in 1940, census statistics reveal.

Sadler Plan For Social Security Cash Is Definite

(Editor's note: This article is nother in a series of impartiallypresented stories dealing with the candidates for governor of Texas. It was prepared by Boyce House well-known political commentator at Austin.)

The most clear-cut and tangible tax program of any candidate for Governor is that offered by Jerry Sadler when he announced his candidacy, say a number of political observers. He tells where he proposes to raise the money for old age assistance and other social security, what the tax rate will be and how much it will raise. Sadler pro-

An additional tax of 24 cents per barrel on oil, to yield \$13,000,000 of new revenue; a tax of 1 cent per thousand cubic feet on natural gas, to produce \$10,000,000 of new revenue, and an increase of 22 cents a ton on sulphur, to provide \$355,000 of new revenue-a total of \$23,355,-



Final Call Made For Mattress Aid For State Senate By County Agent

Last call to county residents to file their applications for mattresses if they want to get in on the county's cotton mattress demonstration program was made Tuesday by the county and home demonstration ofoffices.

"We are very anxious," the county and home demonstration offices said in a joint statement, "that each family due to get a mattress apply for one before June 28.

"Any family that received a total cash income of less than \$400 during 1939, a part of which came from sales of farm products such as cotton, poultry or livestock, is eligible to receive a mattress

"A family means two or more persons living together and pooling their income," the local extension service units report. "Income means total cash received, and not profit made. A farm laborer may receive a mattress even though he does not live on or operate a farm. Application banks may be secured from the home demonstration office or from any county committee mem-
