HUMBLE GETS CAMPAIGN FOR OIL UNDERWAY

Concerted Drilling Begun on Huge Lease Bordering Snyder on West-Others Active

As predicted by The Scurry Coun-Times in mid-April, Humble Oil & Refining Company officially got under way this week with its deep drilling campaign in Scurry County. In an area approximately 10 miles wide, east to west, with Snyder on the east line center, and 12 miles, north to south, some 76,-000 acres have been solidly leased, with Humble holding approximately two-thirds of the acreage. Standard of Texas is next with over 10,000 acres leased. Humble and Standard are followed by Magnolia, Cities Service, T. & P., Superior, Shell and small independent hold-

Humble has contracted for a series of core drilling tests, seeking a high "lime top" on the deep structure known to exist as a result of seismograph shootings the past two

Humble's first core test is its No. 1 C. E. Land, southwest onefourth of Section 247-97-H&TC Survey, which was drilling at 340 feet. This test is six miles west of Snyder and about five miles southeast of Coffield & Guthrie's No. J. Wright Mooar test, rapidly nearing contract depth of 4,500 feet. Humble location adjoins Stanlard of Texas leases on the west.

Core drilling is being done by the Failing Drilling & Exploration Company of Houston. Employees of the contractors decline to make any statement regarding the work, but from equipment and drill stem on location, it is apparent test holes will be drilled to the top of the "Big Lime," around 1,800 feet.
