Defrost Your Electric



Pick ONE DAY in the Week for Defrosting

The layer of frost that forms on the freezing unit of your electric refrigerator actually acts like a blanket, for it keeps the cold from reaching food that you want kept fresh and wholesome. This frost layer also harbors food odors, and should be removed when it becomes about 1/4 inch thick, about the thickness of a pencil.

Pick one day in the week to defrost your refrigerator. A freezing unit free from a heavy layer of frost makes ice cubes faster and maintains a lower chilling temperature in the food compartment. Consult your refrigerator instruction book for a recommended method of defrosting or try the quick method explained below if you are storing frozen foods.

*HOW TO DEFROST YOUR REFRIGERATOR QUICKLY

Turn the control switch to "off" and remove everything from freezer compartment. Wrap any frozen foods with several thicknesses of paper and put them on a refrigerator shelf. They won't thaw out in the short time required to complete the defrosting.

Fill a pan or baking dish with hot water and place on the bottom shelf of the freezer compartment. Do not use the quick-release type ice trays for this purpose, as they are coated with a thin film of wax that will wash away

3. Clean the food compartment and racks with a solution of one quart of cool water and a teaspoonful of baking soda. By this time, the layer of frost should be melted from the freezer compartment, which also should be

Wipe the refrigerator dry and refill the ice trays. Old ice cubes collect food


