The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees approved a return to the sevenperiod day for the 1999-2000
school year during Monday's bi-
monthly meeting.
In other business Monday, the school board approved changes in the math curriculum, amended the budget for $\$ 298,000$ in construction and renovation projects to be done over the summer, and recog nized Muleshoe's districtchampion boys basketball team.

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock, or tim-ber-not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings
When is the application deadline? If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1999 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.
Do you need to reapply annually? If your land already receives agricultural or timber pro ductivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.
