Spring cleanup April 12-16

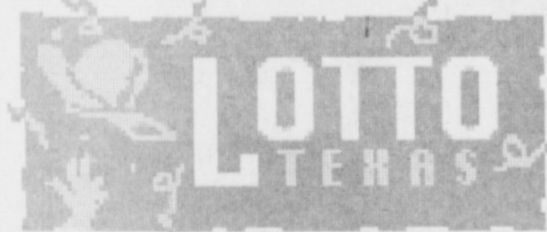
The City of Muleshoe is ready to help with your spring cleaning.

"You've made it very hard for me," judge Tom Boutell said to the members present during the judging. "There is a lot of good work here."

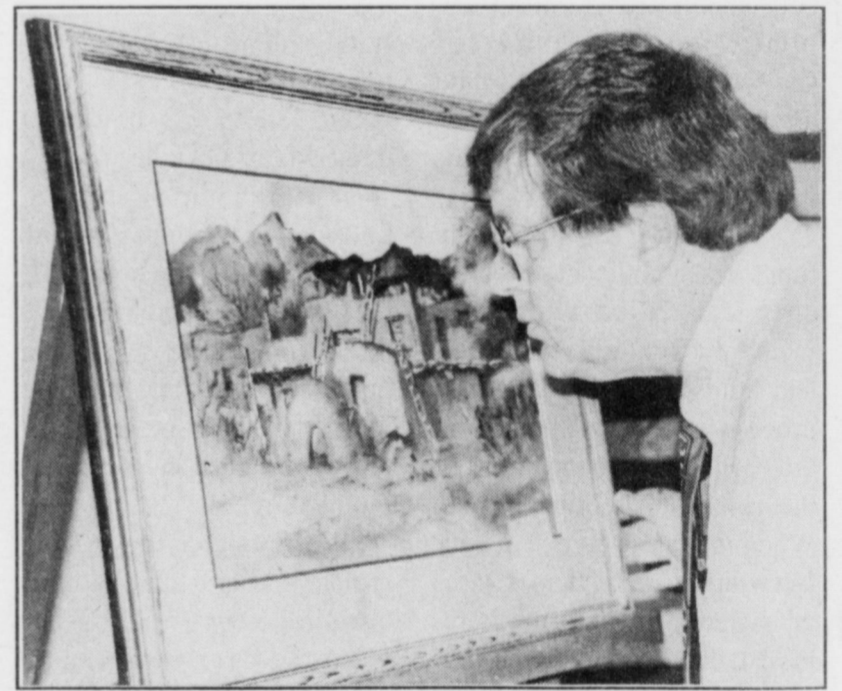
The Best in Show award sponsored

Friona overtakes Mules in 2-3A golf

FRIONA — Muleshoe was already having a bad day Monday when Jason Toelle of Lubbock Roosevelt holed a wedge shot from 85

yards out on the final hole Monday to snatch the District 2-3A boys golf title from the Mules' Ryan Hodge.

The stunning shot gave Toelle a par 4 on the 18th hole and a one shot win over Hodge. The Roosevelt golfer, who finished with a 79 had shanked his previous shot out of bounds.

Playing in the same group, Hodge two-putted from 35 feet

for a par on No. 18 and finished with an 81.

"It was a tough way to lose," Muleshoe coach Kodi Crane said. "But sometimes someone just makes the perfect shot at the perfect time."

Friona also overtook the Mules for the team title in the third and final round at wind-swept Friona Country Club.

Trailing by six strokes after two rounds, the steady Chieftains rallied to win the title by shooting a 342 Monday for three-round total of 1,029.

Tyson Neill, who finished third, shot an 80 as all five Chieftains shot 92 or better.

Muleshoe rebounded from a disastrous front nine to finish second and earn its first trip to

the Region I-3A Tournament in three years.

Third-place Lubbock Cooper finished 11 strokes back of Muleshoe.

Mule freshman A.J. Buhrman shot a final-round 83 and finished fifth at 251. But Muleshoe's three other players all struggled and finished in the 90s.

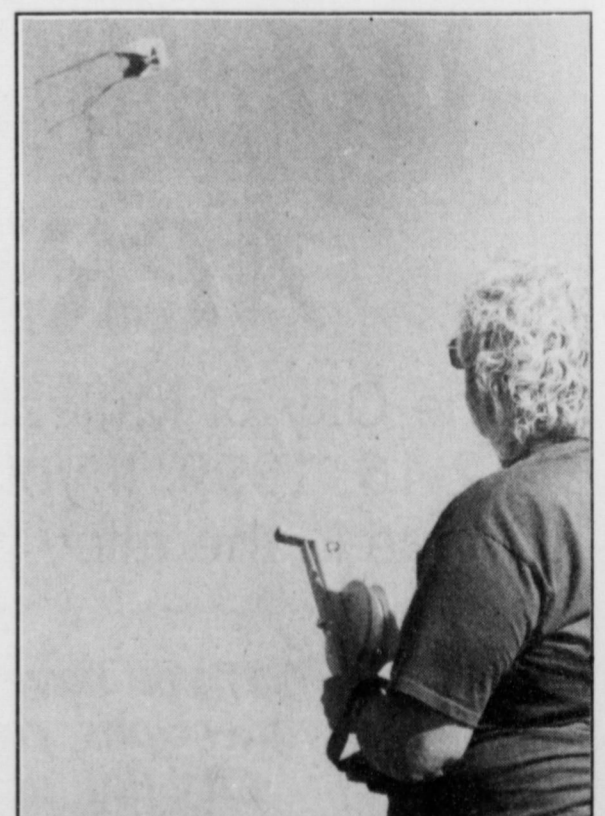
"We're still young," Crane said, pointing out that besides Hodge the rest of the team is underclassmen. "The biggest thing we need to learn is course management."

Dairy Queen helping the Children's Miracle Network

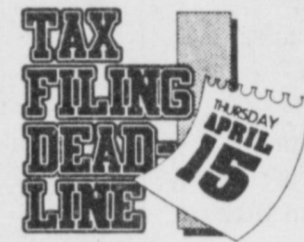
BEDFORD (TX) - Dairy Queen stores throughout Texas will be having a ball in April and helping their local hospitals for children in the process.

Beginning April 5 while supplies last, Dairy Queen stores across the state will be promoting the sale of a special baseball commemorating the achievements of future Baseball Hall of Fame inductee Nolan Ryan. FSA notes reminders for locals

The Bailey County FSA reminds farmers of the following programs, deadlines and announcements.

■ The Bailey County FSA will have new office hours beginning Monday, April 12. The new hours will be 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. Wednesday hours will be 12 to 4:30 p.m. The office is located at 111 E. Avenue D and the phone number is 272-4538.

■ April 9 is the final date to file an application for disaster assistance. If you need to file for the Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program, call the office for an appointment.

■ The Bailey County Committee has established final planting dates for the following crops: potatoes - May 1;

jalapeno peppers, sweet peppers and tomatoes - June 1; peanuts - June 5; watermelons and cantaloupes - June 15; sweet corn and Indian corn - June 20; soybeans - June 30; mungbean, pumpkins, mini-pumpkins, pinto beans, black-eyed peas and gourds - July 1; cabbage and broccoli - July 5; carrots - July 10; green beans, cucumbers, acorn squash and sunflowers - July 14; and haygrazer and millet - August 1.

■ If you intend to plant fruits or vegetables on your farm, call the office to make sure there will be no violation of the farm contract.

■ The last day to certify crops is May 15, 1999. Call for an appointment.

■ The final date to obtain a

loan or LDP for 1998 cotton, corn, grain sorghum and soybeans is May 31, 1999.

■ The final date to request a reconstitution for combining or dividing farms is June 1 for the 1999 fiscal year.

■ The final date for spring transfers of peanut quotas is July 31, 1999.

■ Agricultural land that is bought or sold by foreign investors must be reported to the local FSA office within 90 days of the transaction. Failure to do so could result in penalties.

■ Acreage that is harvested for hay during the 1999 crop year must be certified and a CCC-709 must be filed prior to the date the crop is harvested for hay or the date sold/delivered to be eligible for a loan deficiency payment.

Treated clothes could disinfect themselves

In a breakthrough that could help workers from farms to hospitals, a University of California researcher has found a way to treat cotton so it rids itself of some harmful germs or pesticides.

UC Davis scientist Gang Sun's research is based on a chemical called hydantoin, which grabs chlorine molecules and holds them. Sun says the process would graft hydantoin onto cotton fabrics and immerse the fabric in chlorine bleach. When the fabric comes in contact with certain pesticides, virus or bacteria, the chlorine is released, disinfecting the cloth.

The technology also can be used by farm workers who constantly come in contact with low levels of pesticides.

Sun's research showed his treated fabric can break down some agricultural pesticides known as carbamates into small, harmless fragments. The breathable cotton clothes would be an improvement over impermeable clothing sometimes worn by farm workers who often work under the summer's intense sun.

"We're not saying that it'll replace impermeable clothing during heavy spraying, but when the farm worker enters

the field for harvesting, there's still pesticide residue in the field," Sun said. "We can use our regular clothing like T-shirts and jeans and we can treat them. The worker will not notice any difference, but have additional protection."

The treated fabric could also be used in protecting medical workers from germs. "We were surprised how quickly and powerfully it killed the germs," said Sun. "The main purpose would be for hospitals - doctors' uniforms, bedding materials - you can even use it in hotels for bed sheets and towels."

LA CROSSE, Va. — La Crosse has a bit of an identity crisis: It seems nobody, not even the town's residents, knows how to spell its name. Some in the town, population 549, spell it La Crosse.

In the center of downtown is the old Bank of LaCrosse, now used as a storage building. Within sight are LaCrosse Laundry and Dry Cleaners and LaCrosse Candy Co. All spell the town as one word.

But wait. A Mecklenburg County map prepared by the Virginia Department of Transportation refers to La Crosse.

The sign on the front of the building spells LaCrosse as one word. But inside, an emblem has the town's name as two. The council agreed in February to use the two-word spelling as the standard—the one-word sign on the front of town hall notwithstanding.

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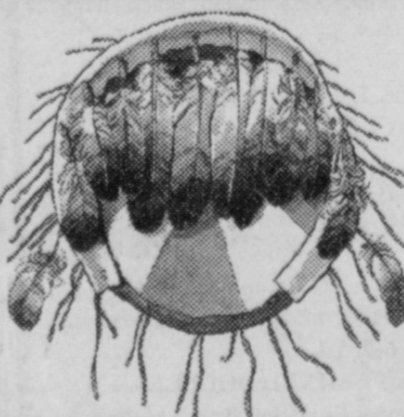

■ Win in 1600 relay vaults Lady Mules to 2nd-straight title

IDALOU — Muleshoe is developing a strong closing kick.

Sitting in third place heading into the final event Friday at the Wildcat Relays, the Lady Mules won the 1600-meter relay with a season-best effort and surged past host Idalou and Lockney to capture their second-straight meet title.

Atwood duels rival at Amarillo Relays

AMARILLO — Muleshoe's Kyle Atwood held his ground in a matchup with one of the Panhandle's top middle distance runners Saturday at the 50th annual Amarillo Relays at Dick Bivens Stadium.

Highland Park's Raheem Travis needed a strong finishing kick to fend off Atwood in the 800 meters despite a career-best effort by the Muleshoe freshman. Atwood rebounded to post an easy win over Travis

The Lady Mules won the Longhorn Relays in similar fashion a week earlier.

In addition to picking up 20 points in the 1600 relay, Muleshoe received wins by Stacy Locker in the 400 and 800 meters and Tommie Hernandez in the discus while finishing with 100 points.

Idalou was second with 94 points and Lockney third with 88. Both teams finished out of the top three in the 1600 relay.

Muleshoe seniors playing in Golden Spread Tournament

Muleshoe seniors Dustin Cleavinger and Eri Wilhite were invited to play in the Golden Spread Basketball Tournament, which features some of the best senior high school players in the area.

The tournament tips off Thursday in the Amarillo Civic Center.

Cleavinger, a 6-6 post, averaged 20 points and 10 rebounds a game while leading Muleshoe to its first district title since 1957 and a school-record 24 wins. A starter for the Mules since being called up as a freshman, Cleavinger will play for a West squad that includes Derek Buckley of Dimmitt and Justin Daniel of Friona.

Cleavinger signed to play football at West Texas A&M next fall.

The West will play a South team in the first round that includes Charles Sims of Tulia at 8 p.m. on Friday.

Wilhite, a 5-10 post, averaged 11.8 points and 6.8 rebounds while leading an improbable Lady Mule run that ended in the regional quarterfinals.

A two-time all-district selection, Wilhite will play for a West team that also includes Whitney Ellis of Friona, Ramsey Bennett of Farwell and Shawna Kenworthy of Dimmitt.

Wilhite signed Wednesday to play at Panhandle State (Okla.) University.

The West will face a South team in the first round that features Allyson Lewis of Slaton and Mandi Culwell of Tulia at 6 p.m. on Friday.

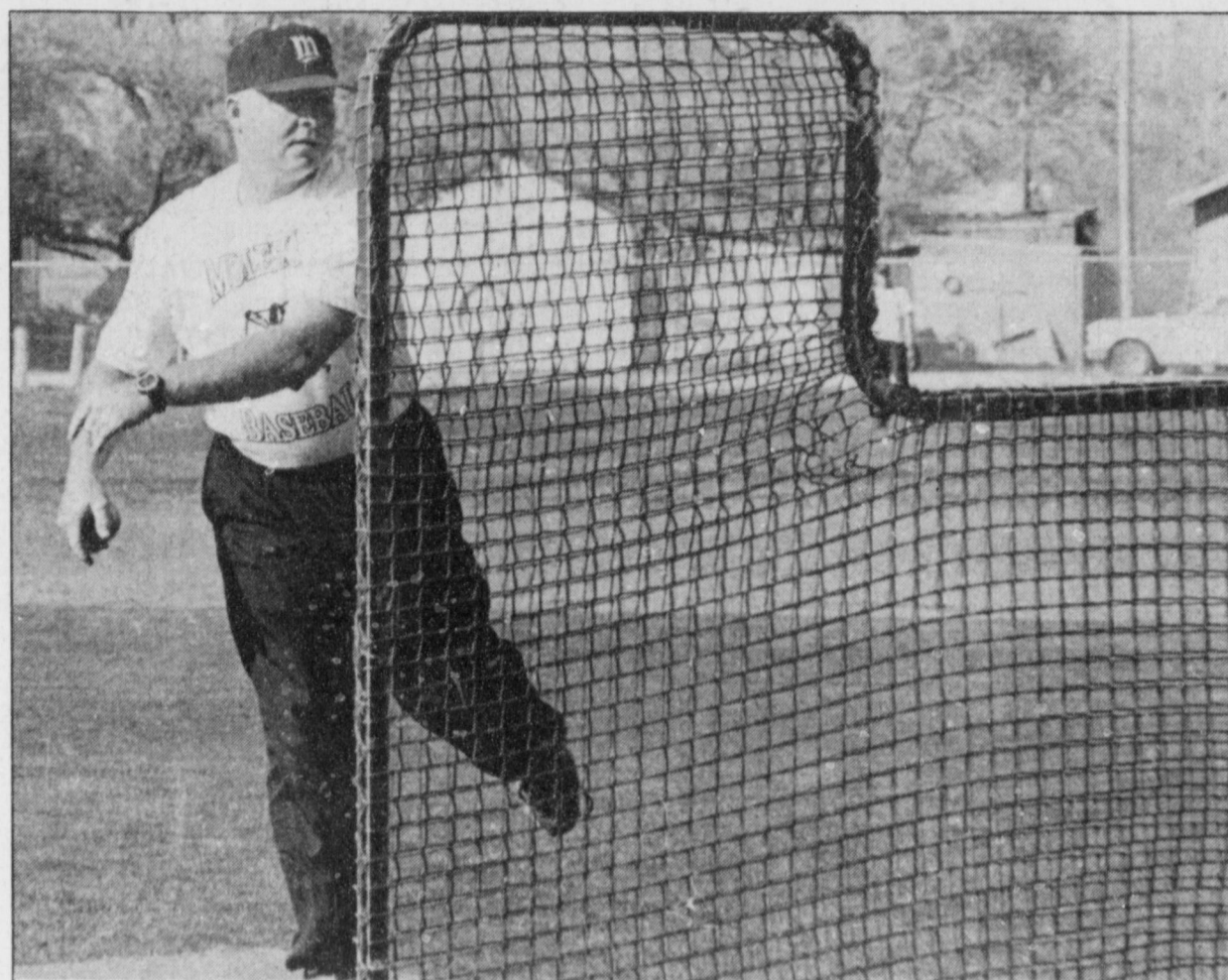

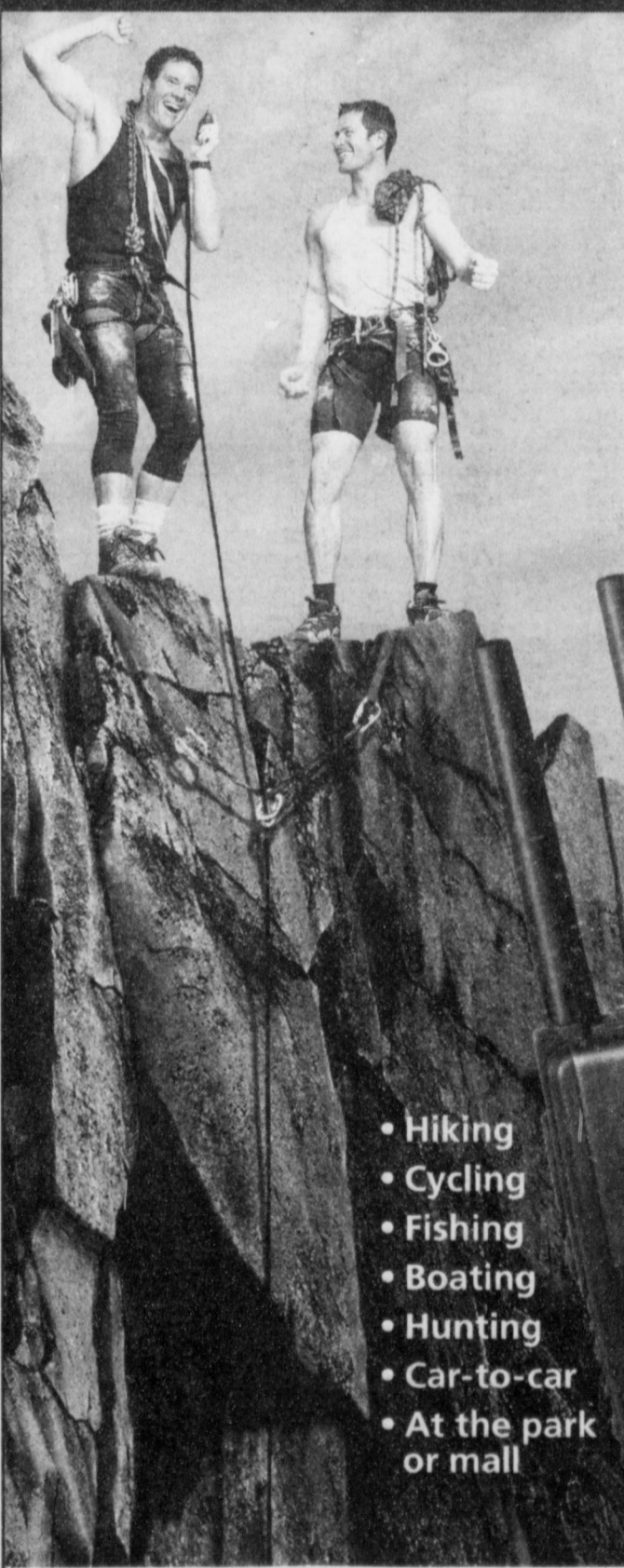

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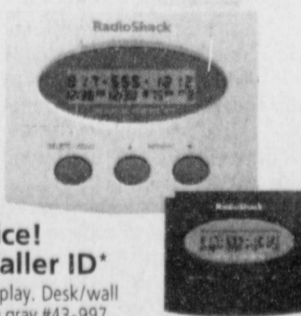
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Parent company of SPS announces plans for merger

New Century Energies and Northern States Power Co. announced March 25 that they have entered into a definitive merger agreement.

The merged company will stretch from Mexico to the Canadian border, and also will have a strong global presence, with operations in the United Kingdom, Central Europe, Australia and South America. It will be headquartered in Minneapolis and certain key business units or operations will be based in Wisconsin, Denver and Amarillo, Texas. The company will be named later.

Bill D. Helton, chairman and CEO of Denver-based NCE said, "The merger provides both the combined company and its operating units with the scale necessary to remain competitive in a changing industry marketplace."

The companies said they expect the merger to result in net cost savings of approximately \$1.1 billion in the first 10 years of operations.

"We expect significant cost savings from the elimination of duplicate programs, greater purchasing efficiencies and streamlined business processes," vice chairman, president and COO of NCE Wayne H. Brunetti said.

In the United States, the merged company will serve 3 million electricity customers and approximately 1.5 million natural gas customers in 12 states including Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

The merger requires the approval by the shareholders of the two existing holding companies, as well as numerous state and federal regulatory groups.

The merger is expected to take from 12 to 18 months to complete.

New Century Energies serves customers in Colorado, Texas, New Mexico, Wyoming, Kansas and Oklahoma. Its operating companies include Public Service Co. of Colorado, Southwestern Public Service Co. and Cheyenne Light, Fuel & Power.

Northern States Power provides electricity to customers in portions of Minnesota, Wisconsin, North Dakota, Michigan and South Dakota.

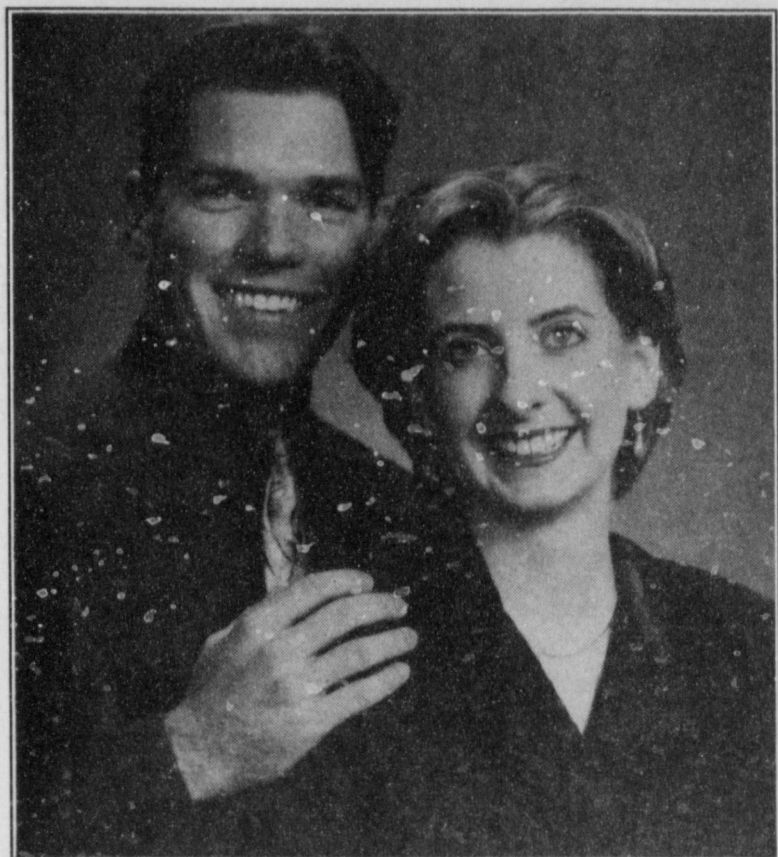

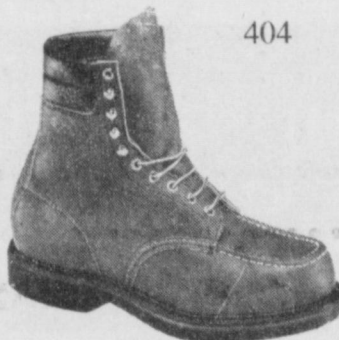
Commodity prices down 5 percent

The USDA on Tuesday reported what farmers across the country already know.

Farm prices are 5 percent below what they were a year ago, and there is no silver lining around the dark cloud hanging over the farm economy. There is, says USDA, no telling when things might improve.

Corn prices dropped one cent in March to \$2.04 per bushel, down 51 cents from last year. Wheat prices were unchanged since February, but were 59 cents per bushel lower than this time last year.

Beef prices were one of the few bright spots in the USDA report, up \$1.50 from February and 80 cents from last year at \$62.10 per hundredweight.



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Planting in Rio Grande nearing completion

WESLACO — Most, if not all, of the Lower Rio Grande Valley's 1999 cotton crop has been planted.

John Norman, cotton IPM entomologist at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Weslaco, estimates the cotton acreage total at 240,000 acres, roughly what it was last year.

And like last year, a lack of

moisture and low market prices will be a major concern this year.

"A few growers," Norman says, "have already had to irrigate to either get a stand or to keep the plants growing. But overall, the Valley's young cotton crop is doing well and growing rapidly."

Norman says there have been plenty of heat units to promote

growth, but wind has been a problem since at high velocities, it can strip young plants of leaves.

And, of course, if winds continue, it will only dry up any soil moisture that's out there.

If root growth can reach down to deep soil moisture, plants may not need additional water until about mid-May. But if rain fails to fall by then, problems could start early.

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Public university money management board agrees to disclose more facts

AUSTIN—The private board that manages \$12.5 billion in public university money has agreed to be more open about its high-risk investments.

The University of Texas Investment Management Co. on March 30 told the House Appropriations Committee it will name all principals and disclose annual rates of return when making future investments with riskier private firms.

UTIMCO also said it will ask private firms to which public university funds already are committed for permission to disclose the information.

"That goes a long way toward addressing my concerns. This will provide some comfort as to how public funds are being managed," State Rep. Sylvester Turner, a member of the Appropriations Committee, was quoted by the *Austin American-Statesman*.

Turner, D-Houston, earlier had criticized UTIMCO's confidentiality policy. He was responding to a Houston chronicle article citing alleged conflicts of interest involving UTIMCO chairman Tom Hicks, a Dallas investor who recently completed a six-year term as a UT System regent.

The article said Hicks had directed \$252 million to private funds run by business associates and friends and \$205 million to funds run by major Republican donors.

UT System Chancellor William Cunningham, one of UTIMCO's nine board members, said he was confident no conflicts of interest occurred.

Lawsuit-squelching bill okayed

Local governments would be unable to sue the sellers and makers of firearms under legislation approved last week by the Texas Senate in a 22-7 vote.

"My intent is to stop frivolous lawsuits and make sure gun control does not become a local issue in Texas," said the bill's author Sen. Jon Lindsay, R-Houston.

Cities in other states are considering suing gun and ammunition makers and sellers to recover medical costs and other expenses related to gun violence.

Senators voting against the bill have argued against limiting the attorney general's power to file such a lawsuit, and pointed out that it was good there was no lawsuit ban shielding tobacco

Clemency policy changes

The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles last week enacted a 21-day deadline for the filing of clemency applications.

■ Republican legislators say there is growing support for shaving the state's 6.25 percent sales tax rate. Democrats raised concerns that important programs might be whittled down to pay for the tax cut.

■ About 40 people gathered before the state Capitol on March 28 to protest NATO bombing raids in Yugoslavia. The gathering was sponsored by the University of Texas Anti-War Committee.

■ Almost 40,000 specialty license plates emblazoned with the Texas A&M University logo have been sold to date, making it the best-selling plate.
