In honor of National Volunteer Week April 18-24, the staff would like to recognize the contributions of volunteers at the nursing home



Board approves 1999-2000 schedule

The Muleshoe Independent School District will start school earlier next year.

The 1999-2000 MISD school year will start with a staff development day on Monday, Aug. 9, eight days earlier than last year. Students will report on Aug. 11.

The MISD Board of Trustees approved the schedule on the recommendation of superintendent Bill Moore during a regularly scheduled bi-monthly meeting. It was one of three scheduling options considered.

Although several board members were hesitant about starting school so early, they felt it was necessary to accommodate the proper amount of staff development days.

Other notable changes in the 180-day schedule are having the "ski break" vacation coincide with the Houston Livestock Show and bumping spring break back a week to March 13-17. Because Muleshoe belongs to the FACT consortium, the district wanted to hold spring break at the same time as Texas Tech and South Plains College.

Christmas break will be from Dec. 17 to Jan. 3 and the last day of school is May 26.

In other action taken Monday, the board renewed its depository contract with First Bank of Muleshoe, approved campus and departmental base budgets and renewed its contract with Aramark food services to operate the district's three cafeterias.

During the department reports, Moore advised the board that in the near future Muleshoe students might be taking more state standardized tests and face a tougher exam to earn a diploma.

A bill passed in the Texas Senate Monday would move the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills "exit-level test" up a year to the 11th grade and have it cover English language arts, math, science and social studies.

Currently, the exit-level test is first taken by 10th-grade students.

The bill will also add testing during the ninth-grade year. It would not add new TAAS tests at the elementary or middle school level.

Republicans reveal plan for budget surplus

Republican lawmakers have come with a tax relief plan that sops up \$3.5 billion of the state's projected \$5.6 billion budget surplus for 2000-2001.

Republicans in the House Appropriations Committee have proposed a budget for the next two years that includes:

\$1 billion to pay for cutting the state's 6.25-cent sales tax by one-fourth of a cent.

■ \$1 billion toward raises for public school teachers.

\$1 billion for school building projects and retiring bonds.

■ \$500 million for business tax and consumer tax cuts

The GOP plan does not include the cornerstone of Gov. George W. Bush's main idea for tax-relief: a \$1.5 billion school property-tax cut. But the governor is open to proposals by house leaders, his spokeswoman Linda Edwards said.

Sen. Bill Ratliff, chairman of budget-writing Senate Finance Committee, cast doubt over the House plan. Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, said consumers won't feel much difference between a 6 percent state sales tax and the 6.25 percent sales tax they are paying

On the other side of the aisle, Sen. David Cain, D-Dallas, proposes raising teacher salaries by \$4,000 a year, or twice the amount of a GOP plan for teacher raises.



Most of the projected budget surplus would be needed to pay for raising teacher salaries and improving schools under Cain's plan, but Cain said Texans favor those things over a

Proposed UT funding hike

Meanwhile, last week, Sen. Ratliff proposed increasing the higher education funding allotment to the University of Texas by 6 percent, or about \$26 million.

Under his proposal, the university budget would swell from its present \$433 million to \$458 million over the next biennium.

UT President Larry Faulkner said, however, it would take a 2000-2001 budget increase of at least \$66 million for faculty and staff salaries to be on par with the nation's top public universities.

The House has proposed a much more modest increase of

\$16.2 million.

Austin ISD indicted

A Travis County grand jury last week indicted Austin Independent School District and a deputy superintendent on charges of tampering last fall with Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test scores.

The indictments stem from a Texas Education Agency investigation that found the district and one of its top administrators removed the exams of poorly performing student in an effort to increase overall scores.

If convicted, the school district could face fines up to \$160,000. The deputy superintendent could face a year in jail, a \$4,000 fine or both.

Debbie Graves Ratcliffe, spokeswoman for the Texas Education Agency said of the charges, "It's unfortunate that a small number of employees have tainted the school district's reputation."

Austin ISD is the first Texas school district to be charged with a crime.

UT wants on-campus hotel

The University of Texas at Austin wants to put a new oncampus hotel, parking garage and conference center on the site of one of its parking lots.

A 225 to 275 room hotel would complement the aujacent Joe C. Thompson Conference Center, university officials said.

Construction could start in a year and be completed by 2002, University of Texas Vice President Patricia Ohlendorf said.

Cost estimates on the construction have not been made. Shields proposes new agency

Rep. John Shields, R-San Antonio, has filed legislation that would assemble a commission of business owners and executives to identify duplication of services and waste in state government.

The commission would be styled after the Reagan-era Grace Commission, which exposed wasteful federal agencies, programs and expenditures.

Shields said the commission would consider merging the Department of Human Services, Health and Human Services Commission and Texas Workforce Commis-

Shields also is proposing a merger of the oil and gas regulation Texas Railroad Commission with the Public Utility commission, which regulates utility rates.

Other Highlights

Rep. Lon Burnam, D-Fort Worth, has filed legislation that would base auto collision insurance coverage on the number of miles and amount of time a Texas policyholder drives.

The Three Way Independent School District Board of Trustees has cancelled its election scheduled for May 1 in accordance with the Texas Election Code.


Jarrol Layton and Jack Reeves were the only candidates to file for election. The candidates will be sworn in at the May 13 meeting of the school board.

Their primary business is feed manufacturing and feeding cattle for the public.


Presenter Lary Hooten praised Wes-Tex for its behind-the-scene support of youth and community activities — including donating the steaks for the banquet for the past several years.





MHS sets school mark in 1600 relay

AMARILLO -Muleshoc broke an 18-year-old school record in the 1600-meter relay Saturday at the 25th annual Amarillo Girls Relays at Dick Bivens Stadium.

The team of Stacy Locker, Olivia Alarcon, Bobbie Benham and Kala Johnson shaved .02 seconds off the Muleshoe record set in 1981.

Locker added a gold medal performance in the 800 meters and Muleshoe scored in 12 of 16 events en route to solid fourth-place finish in Division II.

Class 2A power Panhandle parlayed its prowess in the relays and distance events to win the meet with 139 points.

Childress dominated the sprints and jumping events and finish second with 114 points, followed by Dalhart with 97 and Muleshoe with 90.

The Lady Mules ran a 4:14.59 in what's commonly referred to as the mile relay, second behind Panhandle's sparkling 4:08.04 effort.



Texas producers intend to Texas Agricultural Statistics plant more acres of barley, dry beans, cotton, rice, sunflowers and wheat. Acreage of oats planted remained constant, while acreage of corn, sorghum, soybeans and peanuts are expected to decline.

Based on results of a March 1 survey conducted by the

Service, Upland cotton acreage is forecast at 5.7 million acres, up 1 percent from last year. Planting of Pima cotton is expected to total 34,000

Growers intend to plant 1.9 million acres of corn, down 21 percent from last year. Rice 2 percent from last year to 290,000 acres.

State Statistician Robin Roark cautioned that this report is an early indication of producers' intentions to plant. Actual planted acreage may vary depending on whether, production costs and antici-

Texas wheat harvest estimate down 30 percent

Texas wheat producers expect to harvest 95.0 million bushels this year, 30 percent less than the 1998 crop and 20 percent less than the 1997 crop.

According to an April 1 survey conducted by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, planted acreage for the 1999 crop is estimated at 6.2 million acres, up 2 percent from 1998 but down 2 percent from 1997.

Production on the Northern

High Plains is expected to total 46.0 million bushels, down 27 percent from a year ago. Most irrigated fields across the region are in good condition Recent rain improved dryland fields, however, more rain is needed.

Producers in the Blacklands expect to harvest 16.0 million bushels, down 30 percent from last year. Planted acres for the region were up 3 percent from the previous year at 780,000 acres. Moisture conditions are good in this region and fields have made good progress.

Statewide winter wheat condition around April 1 was rated at 69 percent of normal, compared with 76 percent last year.

Texas is the only state that makes an April 1 winter wheat production estimate. The first national wheat forecast will be released May 12, 1999.
