BABSON DISCUSSES MORE INDUSTRIES

BABSON PARK, Mass., June 14. —Once every six months I prepare a brief summary of the leading industries...

PAPER STOCKS: The outlook for the paper industry is good. Just now it is handicapped by a scarcity of pulp...

PETROLEUM STOCKS: Although these stocks have been behind the rest of the market, they may be one of the best purchases.

PUBLIC UTILITY STOCKS: These are destined for public ownership. This means that stockholders will be compelled to turn in their securities for cash...

RUBBER STOCKS: The rubber industry has completed its re-conversion problems and earnings for the next two or three years should be satisfactory.

STEEL STOCKS: This country cannot enjoy prosperity without the steel industry benefiting therefrom. Therefore, the investments in the better-grade steel stocks appear justified.

TOBACCO STOCKS: The tobacco stocks have many things in their favor but, of course, are much affected by taxation.

TRANSPORTATION STOCKS: Every month the railroads are showing declining earnings compared with the same months of previous years. I don't like this trend.

GOVERNMENT BONDS: Everyone should have enough cash or government bonds on hand as a good reserve for emergencies or market breaks and to pay estate taxes upon death...

MUNICIPAL BONDS: Most municipal bonds should be as safe as government bonds and, at the present time, are non-taxable; but, of course, are selling at a very low yield.

CORPORATION BONDS: The only corporation bonds that look good to me are those selling at a high yield, or due within a reasonably short period of time; or which are convertible into stock on some attractive basis.

STOCKS: I continue to believe that well-selected stocks are the best investment at the present time (both for safety and yield). Furthermore, as investors look into the situation, carefully and impartially, they will come to similar conclusions.

Soap Box Derby Gets Interest

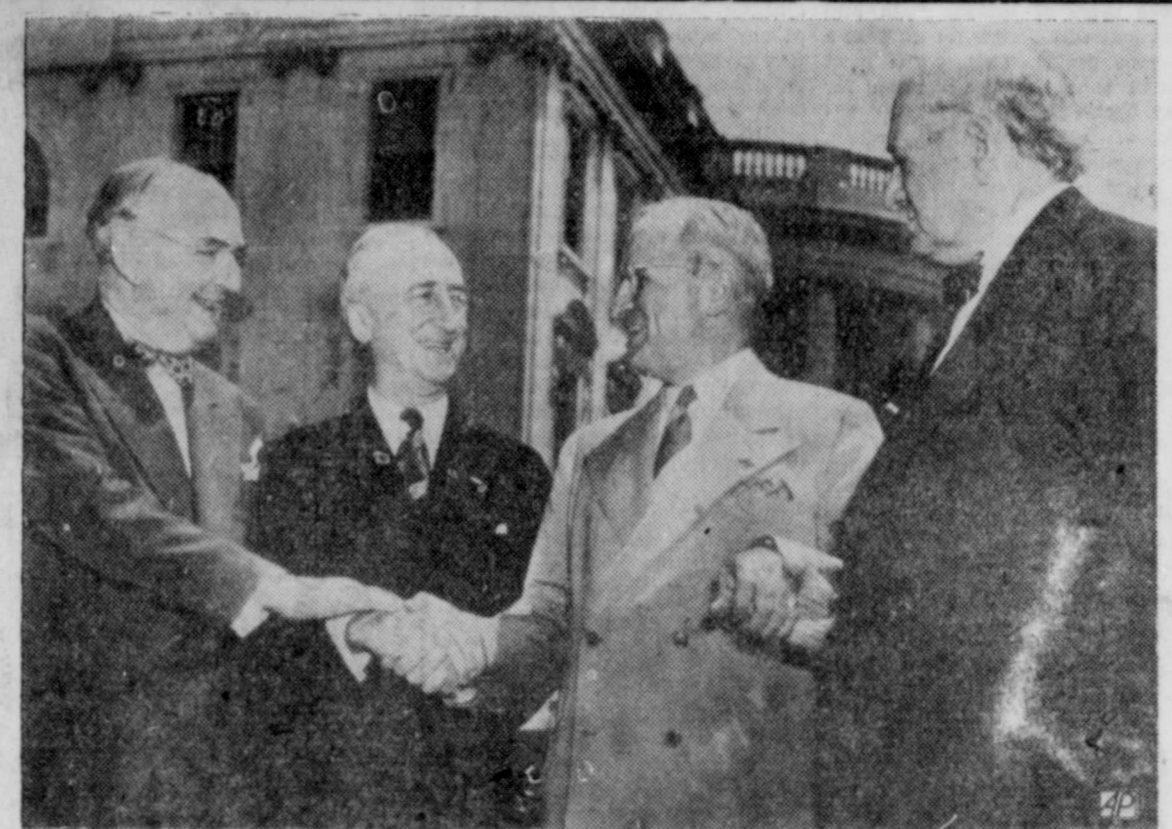
Boys of Snyder are very busy these days preparing for the First Annual Soap Box Derby. There are promises of quite a bit of competition for all prizes.

Sidelights From Washington

This column is being written on Saturday afternoon, June 15th. There is much uncertainty as to just when Congress will recess or adjourn. The best guess seems to be that Congress will recess about July 15th for a period of three months. Such a recess would be very much in order, as Congress has been in session all or a part of practically every month since the war began more than four years ago.

On Thursday of this week I was able to secure passage in the House of my bill involving appropriations

and programs for all Government owned corporations—40 in number. Under the bill the Commodity Credit Corporation will have sufficient funds to carry on the support price and loan programs on cotton and wheat and other basic crops. Parity prices fixed by the Department of Agriculture, unfortunately, do not take into consideration all labor costs, but the approval of the Commodity Credit program will prevent the possibility of a collapse in the price of cotton, grain and other important crops for at least a two-year period. This is the most hopeful thing on the horizon for West Texas farmers. But on account of the continued drought, price guarantees for the present do not mean too much.

On Friday, June 21st, we are scheduled to present to the House the bill making appropriations for the Army for the fiscal year beginning July 1st. This will be the biggest bill presented to Congress this year. We are providing funds for pay and equipment for a modern Army and occupation force which will average about 1,250,000 men during the year. The sum recommended will be 7 billion dollars—a huge sum—but we have proceeded

no the basis that the American people believe in a strong national defense program and are willing to pay whatever may be necessary. Under the law, all appropriation bills for the regular agencies of the Government must be passed prior to July 1st of each year, and the month of June is always a very busy month in Congress.

During the week we passed by unanimous vote the bill providing terminal leave pay for enlisted men of our armed forces. The bill has now gone to the Senate, where favorable action is expected. The bill is of interest to all enlisted men and their families.

Following the veto by the President of the so-called Case Bill, involving Labor-Industry disputes, a vote was taken in the House on the question of whether the House would override the veto. A two-thirds majority is required to override a Presidential veto. The vote was 255 to 135 on the motion to override, which was 5 votes short of the necessary two-thirds. I voted to override the veto.

In the death of Senator John Bankhead of Alabama, the farmers of America have lost a true and powerful friend. The farmers of the Nation did not always agree with Senator Bankhead, but they never questioned his loyalty to the cause of agriculture. In the post-war years our agricultural producers will be confronted with problems varied and difficult, and we will need the best possible leadership.

Prior to the death of the late Senator, the State of Alabama had kept a Bankhead in Congress for 40 consecutive years.

THE TWIN MEETS—IN RECORD-BREAKING TIME!—A new east-west speed record was set by this new Navy Neptune patrol bomber, a two-motored Lockheed P2V, when it set down at Burbank Field, Calif., 9 hours 23 minutes and 2 seconds after its take-off from Floyd Bennett Field. This sliced 29 minutes off the previous best speed, despite more flying conditions that forced the plane 150 miles off course. The Neptune was piloted by Commander Thomas D. Davis, of Chevy Chase, Md., and carried three naval crewmen and two civilian passengers.

Veterans' News

Q. May a pension be paid by the Veterans Administration because of a service-connected disability when the veteran's service was other than in time of war?

A. Yes, for disability resulting from injury or disease contracted in line of duty, when such injury or disease was incurred in, or aggravated by, active military or naval service in time of peace. The disability must not have been the result of the veteran's own willful misconduct. The veteran also must have a discharge from active duty under conditions other than dishonorable.

Q. If an eligible veteran is taking a course of education or training but due to illness is unable to continue for several weeks, may the time of his training period be extended?

A. Yes, it may, when his physical condition will permit. The total period to which the veteran is entitled may not be increased.

Q. Are there any charges for a guaranty of loan by the Veterans Administration?

A. No. Commissions, brokerage, or similar charges may not legally be assessed against a veteran for securing a guaranty of loan. Of course, those fees usually borne by a borrower, such as appraisal, title research, title guaranty, transfer fees, etc., may be charged against the veteran.

Q. May a veteran start training under the GI Bill in a trade and later find that it was ill chosen, and change to some other vocation?

A. Yes.

Q. Can a veteran with a dishonorable discharge receive benefits under the GI Bill?

A. No, but any discharge other than "dishonorable" does not disqualify him.

60 Per Cent of Canned Meat Is Federal Demand

Federally-inspected meat slaughterers and canners may not produce canned meat for civilian consumption unless they deliver to governmental agencies 60 per cent of each week's total output of canned meat. This is the essence of the new war food order designed to obtain more canned meat for foreign relief shipment.

U. S. Department of Agriculture reports state that the order applies to any canned food which contains 20 per cent or more of meat or meat by-products. Excluded from the order are vinegar pickled meats in glass, canned soup, mince-meat, tamales, chow mein, chop suey, raviola, meat extract, infant and junior foods.

Department officials said that the new order is designed as the most effective and feasible means of facilitating the procurement of canned meat during the next few weeks. Large quantities of canned meat are needed for foreign relief programs. Because of distribution problems encountered by the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation

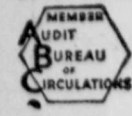

TEXANS IN WASHINGTON

By TEX EASLEY

AP Special Washington Service

Washington, June 19—Wednesday Service in the House have become somewhat bewildering affairs to the spectators in the galleries, all because of the FEPC.

Texas and Southern Congressmen are determined that pending legislation to establish the Fair Employment Practices Committee as a permanent agency won't be passed.

Thus casual onlookers in the Chamber are usually at a loss to understand why all the fuss over motions to adjourn, as if a big issue were the question being voted upon—but in effect, that's actually the case.

This is the reason: The FEPC boosters long ago got their legislation out of the Labor Committee, but the Rules Committee has kept it securely in a pigeon hole.

Without a "rule," a measure can be brought up by the various committees on so-called "Calendar Wednesday," the day set aside for bills which normally are not of major importance and can be passed quickly.

For weeks now the anti-FEPC forces have forced adjournment before the Labor Committee could get its turn. They concede that the proponents would win out if it ever got up for a vote.

Moves adopted by the opponents in the House each Wednesday include that of asking repeatedly for a "quorum call." This consumes about 30 minutes while the clerk goes over the roll of members to see how many are present.

If the leaders of the Southern bloc think they have the greatest number on the floor they will ask for an adjournment; then the next Wednesday the call of committees would again begin from the first of the list.

Evidence that the FEPC is a highly political issue is seen in the fact that frequently on a voice or standing vote a clear majority will vote to adjourn, then upon demand of Marcantonio or others that a roll call be taken some decisions are reversed.

Created originally by an executive order of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, the FEPC ceased to function last April 30 because Congress would appropriate no more money for its activities.

If it isn't passed this year, it's almost certain to come up again in the 80th Congress starting in January of 1947.

A LESSON IN DISTRIBUTION

The sale of surplus war property is a sad lesson in distribution that the nation will long remember. Politics, mismanagement, cumbersome rules and the general confusion have nearly blocked the sale of billions of dollars' worth of material which the country desperately needs.

The lesson is that an efficient retail distribution system cannot be set up overnight. Moreover, it cannot be set up at all if it is burdened with red tape. The government could probably learn a few things from the retail distribution industry.

The job of distributors is doubly difficult at the present time, partly because they must fight an uphill battle to convince government regulators that excessive red tape and unnecessary rules are anathema to efficient distribution.

AND WHERE THE FREE PRESS?

In those nations where free enterprise has been either destroyed, crippled, or subjected to iron-handed political control, a free press has become a thing of the past.

It is not a coincidence that this is so. When a man or a group of men reach out to seize the economic resources of a nation, the first step must be to control that nation's sources of opinion and information.

THE "FOURTH" IS A HOLIDAY

A move is already on foot among many of the local merchants to close up on July 4, and call it a real Holiday. It is the favorite Holiday—and should be observed. Business houses wishing to join in the move should notify the Chamber of Commerce that they are in favor of it.

Scurry Counties 1400 livestock owners are admonished this week by H. M. Johnston of the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine at Dallas, to be on the alert for possible beginning of Screw worm infestations in this trade zone. Johnston was here Monday conferring with Jamie N. Caviness, County Agricultural Agent and reports that a survey is being conducted by the bureau to ascertain what allocation of materials may be needed to stop a possible screw worm epidemic. Smear No. 62 is highly recommended for halting the spread of all live stock owners to secure the screw worms, and Caviness urges smear from reliable companies. In using Smear No. 62 U. S.
