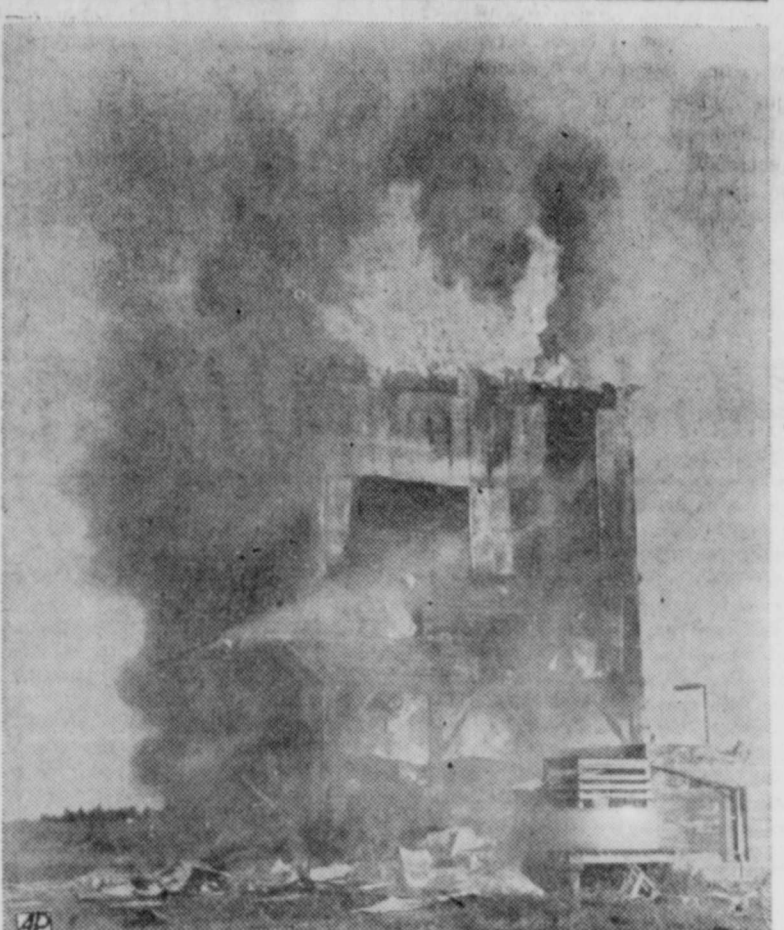

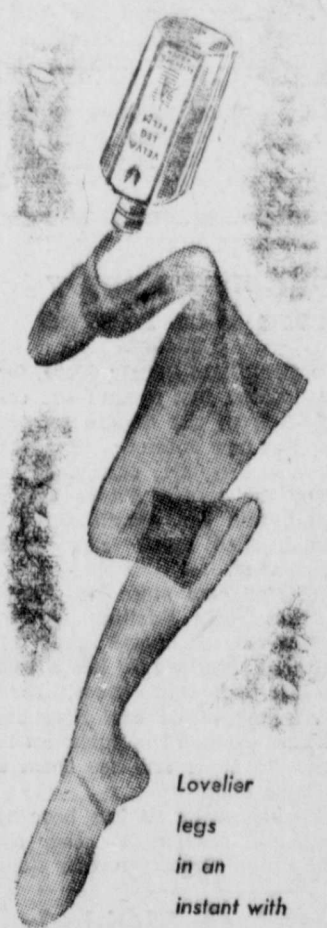

Churches Of Christ Believe....

Christ is the all-authority in religious matters. "While he was yet speaking, behold, a bright cloud overshadowed them; and behold, a voice out of the cloud, saying, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him" (Matthew 17:5). "And Jesus came to them and spoke unto them, saying, All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth" (Matthew 28:18). Certainly to debate in an ugly spirit is sinful, but to investigate any religious belief or practice in the light of "thus saith the Lord" is both careful and wise. In the long ago the people of Berea were commended for "examining the scriptures daily, whether these things were so" (Acts 17:11b). Hence, common sense and scriptural example combine to show the wisdom of a thorough comparison of present practice with those authorized by the Christ. Truth can not be hurt through investigation, but "examining the scriptures daily" can reveal the traditional practices which did not come from Jesus.

Indeed the following passage should bring one to a startling realization of the need for adhering strictly to what He has spoken:—"In vain do they worship me, Teaching as their doctrines the precepts of men" (Matthew 23:2).

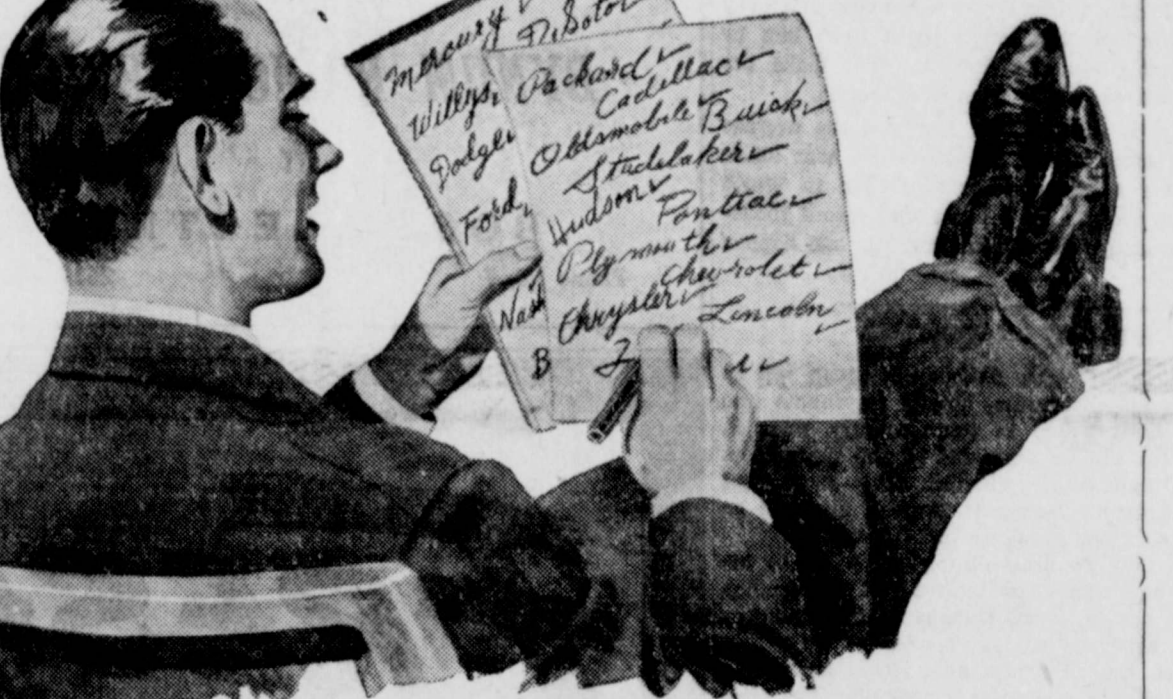

## TEXANS IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, July—AP—A bit of history in the making has been the recent Civil Aeronautics Board hearing here on the so-called Texas-Oklahoma case, proposed new air routes in the Southwest.

A century ago ambitious men with confidence in the future were gambling their fortunes and fates competing with each other in the building of shortline railways to serve the small towns and connect them with main lines at the big cities.

In much the same way now, enterprising and far-sighted men confident that folk soon will be riding through the skies as a very common mode of travel, seek authority to establish feeder-line air routes tying in with transcontinental airlines at such main junctions as Fort Worth and Dallas, Amarillo and San Antonio.

Their 32 applications pending before the CAB in most cases would provide for light, twin-motored 8 to 10 passenger planes, setting down at virtually every community with a population of 3,000 to 5,000 or more. Some would fly clover-leaf routes looping out from larger cities, others would strike out up the Rio Grande connecting all border towns, and still others would serve the numerous communities throughout the western part of the state and the Panhandles of both Texas and Oklahoma.

Some of the lines would operate heavier craft, such as Pioneer Airlines of Houston, formerly Es-sair. Robert Smith, its president, who was a vice president of Braniff Airways before service with the army air forces as a colonel, gave an idea of what kind of service may develop on regional air routes.

Here backing his company's application for new mileage, he said that 24-passenger DC-3s, which were surplus Army C-47s, are to be put on a run from Houston to West Texas. Fresh seafood soon will be flown weekly to San Angelo. A Colorado concern soon will be flying mushrooms to Texas.

One of the applicants at the hearing was a young Perryton ex-serviceman, one day out of the army air forces in which he served as a first lieutenant, and still in uniform. Applying as an individual and in his own name, Wayne B. Lee, he asked certification for routes throughout the Texas Panhandle, into New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas.

While his application had been adversely recommended by Examiner Thomas L. Wrenn—formerly of Sherman—Lee was a keenly interested observer in arguments on all cases. Laid up in a hospital in Nebraska after the fighter plane he was flying crashed, he said he began to figure out what he wanted to do in the future. Although he had spent two years at Texas A. and M. College studying toward a Chemical Engineering degree, he decided there was a big future in feeder airlines. He wrote the CAB for information, soon had his application on file and found friends who volunteered to subscribe \$30,000 in stock if and when he got his company organized.

He visualized a small route serving small cities in the Panhandle, and estimated the cost should not exceed \$200,000. The adverse recommendation was made on the grounds that the line was really too short to be operated with the required efficiency and economy, so he amended the application to include more distant points. While he faces an uphill fight, with an adverse examiner's recommendation, he takes encouragement that officials of some of the larger, recommended lines, evidently admiring his enterprises, have offered him positions with their concerns.

**Around the Capitol:**  
President Harry S. Truman has signed a bill for the payment of \$4,709 to Clyde McKinney of San Antonio for injuries and loss of earnings sustained as the result of a collision of the car in which he was riding on Feb. 20, 1944, with an army truck. Guests of Rep. Ewing Thomason of El Paso in the House restaurant here were Charles Guy, Lubbock publisher, his wife and three sons. They stopped over here on their route home after a motor trip to New York in their new 1946 automobile.

Texas House members are booming Rep. Gene Worley of Shamrock for a position on the Foreign Affairs Committee when Congressman Luther A. Johnson of Corsicana resigns to assume the federal judgeship to which he recently was appointed.

Although Worley already is on a so-called major committee, that of Agriculture, they want to make sure that Texas continues to have representation on the House group which handles international matters. On the Agricultural committee ahead of Worley in seniority is Rep. Bob Poage of Waco, who would thus have the first chance at chairmanship on that group.

While his colleagues point out to Worley that the Foreign Affairs committee likely will be an extremely important body for years to come, handling international trade and farm products agreements, he wants to make sure that his place on the Agriculture committee is retained by a Texan.

Because of its importance as a farm state, Texas long has had two members on the Agriculture committee. The chairman during the 1930s, when all the

## SCIENTIST SAYS ATOMIC TESTS ARE NOT COMPLETE

The possibility of the Bikini atom bomb tests resulting in a major catastrophe such as an earthquake or destructive tidal wave is extremely remote, in the opinion of Dr. George W. West, University of Texas chemist who worked on the Manhattan (atomic) project for two years during the war.

Dr. West was offered a "ringside seat" at the tests but declined the invitation. His decision was based, not on fear of possible danger to the witnesses but rather on the possibility that the tests would consume more time than anticipated and more time than he could spare.

Although he thinks the tests are desirable from the standpoint of accumulating more information on the effectiveness of the bomb, Dr. West is skeptical that "there will be any great yield of purely scientific information" because scientists haven't had time to prepare the proper instruments for the tests.

Dr. West pointed out, however, that the whole future of the navy will be determined by the tests and for that reason they will be extremely valuable from a practical, if not a scientific standpoint.

## FARMERS HOLD UP THEIR END

American agriculture is not on a normal basis, due to labor shortages, the lack of farm machinery. Interferences from the Federal Government impose artificial restraints on grains, cotton, dairy and food products and operations of our farms.

The land does its part. Men may come, men may go, men may strike, but the land keeps on with production, and agriculture keeps supplies rolling to the markets—despite confusing systems of control, OPA, and interference by "brass hats," whose methods challenge the very foundations of what is called competitive economics.

Of course the producers are anxious to keep in step with the aims and principles of our economic life. But how can a farmer toe the mark and obey all the restrictions that are imposed upon him by boards, organizations and directors that make the charts and enforce them from Washington.

Farmland is turning over fast and the average increase in prices is now almost 70 per cent above prewar. That's a higher percentage than in World War I, which brought on a boom that forced thousands of farmers into bankruptcy. It can happen again.

## NEW LAW ON WEEKLIES

A new law for weekly newspapers which will be agreeable to all advertisers, chiefly merchants and wholesalers using space in their country weeklies, and which too will be agreeable to the newspapers having the legitimate circulation they claim, has just been signed by President Truman and will go into effect the first issues after October 1.

The new law requires all weekly papers to include with the annual statement of ownership, which is not new, a sworn statement of the number law is very agreeable to the Times.

Effect of the new law hits most the weekly papers not having justifiable circulation for rates charged, but claiming to their advertisers a greater number than they actually have.

The Times is pleased with the new law for various reasons. In the first place, the Times territory is covered thoroughly with one of the best subscription lists in West Texas—now approaching the 3,000 mark. Per person rate on advertising, it is one of the cheapest in the Southwest. There are no false claims to the local merchants, since the paper is a member of the Audit Bureau of Circulations, a distinction few weeklies in this section of West Texas have. A merchant is not obliged to listen to claims on the number of paid subscribers—he may see the sworn records on request. A national advertiser has no need to guess; they, too, can get accurate figures from ABC in New York.

Thus, the Times looks forward to the new law as a benefit. A paper formerly claiming a large circulation, yet actually having a very small list, can expect to make amends.

## Cotton Classing Sent to Abilene

Applications of Scurry County farmers for free cotton classing under the Smith-Doxey Act have been sent to Abilene by Jamie Caviness, County Agricultural Agent.

The Smith-Doxey Act, now in its ninth year of operation, provides free classing service so that farmers will know the actual grade and staple of their cotton as a guide to selling it. Samples from each bale of cotton raised by members of organized groups are sent to control points by cooperating ginners for classing by government employees. A market news service gives the market prices for the various grade and staples.

In 1945 a total of 1,422 gins or 63 per cent of those in the state, signed up for the program as a service to their customers, and 13 percent of the cotton grown in Texas was classed under the Smith-Doxey act. Almost five million acres of cotton produced by 96,626 farmers were covered by the 1945 applications.

ON WATER PROJECT

Snyder, Texas July 8, 1946.

Gentlemen: In a recent issue the Abilene News-Reporter stated that in a meeting of a group of citizens invited to Big Spring to discuss the building of a lake on the Colorado River that I had "dissented" from the proposition.

I would like for the citizens of Snyder to know my position at this meeting, and I will appreciate it if you will publish this letter.

Mr. J. E. Thomas, President and General Manager of the Texas Electric Service Co., invited me to meet with a number of citizens from Odessa, Midland, Big Spring, Colorado City and Snyder for the purpose of discussing the building of a lake on the Colorado River to furnish a municipal water supply for these five towns. At this meeting Mr. Thomas submitted the following proposition:

That the five towns organize a "Water District" for the purpose of financing and operating the lake, the "Water District" to lease from each of these five towns their water pumping facilities. This lease is to be permanent and in payment therefor the "Water District" will assume payment of the outstanding Water & Sewer Indebtedness of each town in the District. Mr. Thomas stated that he thought the water could be furnished at a rate of 17 cents per 1,000 gallons, each town to pay the same rate.

Just before the meeting adjourned Mr. Thomas requested each person present to sign a Resolution endorsing all action taken at this meeting. I stated that I did not care to sign this resolution as I wanted more time to give some thought to it and to make some investigations. I did dissent to signing this resolution, and think by position was fully justified.

I find upon investigation that the is so vitally necessary in this age of keen competition and complex problems.

I am informed by an official of the City of Snyder that Snyder has an outstanding bond issue of approximately \$84,000.00 which was used to extend water and sewer lines but are not water and sewer bonds, consequently, the "Water District" would not be legally bound to assume these bonds.

The "Water District" proposes to issue and assume bonds as follows: 2 3/4% Interest Revenue Bonds, \$9,600,000.00; Water & Sewer Bonds, 2,896,000.00

Total Indebtedness of "Water District" \$12,496,000.00 The cost of the water to the various towns will be all operating expense plus the interest on the above indebtedness and whatever amount will be paid on the principal.

I object to Snyder paying any part of the indebtedness of the other four towns, and also object to a town 100 miles from the lake having a 30 inch water main and a town twenty miles having a 10 inch water main paying the same water rate.

I am not opposed to the lake nor have I ever been, but I do object to the proposed method of financing it.

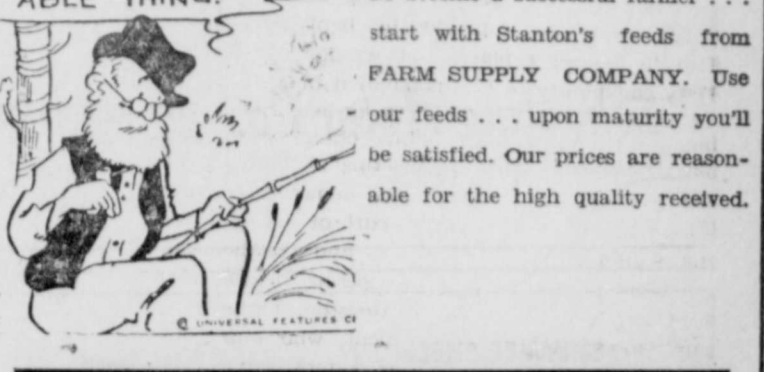
