#### Hats off to this cop

HUNTINGTON PARK, Calif. - Cops around the world have been tipping their hat to police Lt. Michael Gwaltney. He claims to have the nation's largest collection of police hats.

Gwaltney's collection includes 829 hats, and one of them - a spike-top headpiece worn by a German officer - dates back to 1866.

Known as "the Hat Man" among police memorabilia collectors, Gwaltney estimates the hobby has cost him about \$100,000 over the last 11 years.

Thirteen more and he'll have a hat representing every nation, but he's not optimistic about completing his collection. "I wrote to Iraq, but I'm almost afraid to open the box if they send it to me," he joked.

#### Parents evade paying

MARTINSBURG, W.Va. - Hundreds of parents in Berkeley County are being reminded there's no such thing as a free school lunch.

The school board has filed civil lawsuits seeking to collect \$50,000 in overdue lunch bills from the parents of 250 students. The families haven't responded to two collection letters and their bills are each more than \$200 overdue.

Most of the unpaid lunch bills are at the middle and high school level. School lunches cost \$1 for elementary school students and \$1.25 for secondary students. Parents receive bills each month.

## Couple jailed on child abuse charges

## Three-year-old boy suffers third degree burns on legs

A Muleshoe woman is being held without bond in the El Paso County Detention Facility, charged with first degree injury to a child after a three-year-old boy in her care suffered severe burns in a tub of scalding hot water.

Leticia Maricella Hernandez, 19, of 414 W. 2nd, was arrested Sunday night by the El Paso Police. She had been detained by Mexican Po-

lice in Juarez, transfered to Mexican Immigration and deported back to the U.S. El Paso Police took custody from U.S. Immigration.


The child, who suffered third-degree burns on the lower part of his body, is reported to be in stable condition in a Juarez, Mexico Hospital. Texas Child Protective Services worked with Mexican authorities to take custody of the child and have moved him to a hospital in El Paso.

Jailed in connection with the case was 33-year-old Roberto Contreras, also of 414 W. 2nd. He was arrested by Muleshoe Police at 5:45 a.m.

Monday and is awaiting arraignment in the Bailey County Jail on a charge of 3rd degree injury to a child. An 8-month old child in the home was taken into protective custody by Child Protective Services.

Police believe the scalding incident took place in the residence at 414 W. 2nd and that the child was transported to Mexico for treatment to avoid suspicion. However, officials at the Juarez clinic where the child was treated alerted Juarez

### WJHS student chosen for state honor

Watson Junior High 6th grader Mitci Kay Hawkins recently earned a trip to the Texas Library Association's Bluebonnet Award luncheon in Austin.

Mitci Kay, the daughter of Keith and Brenda Hawkins of Muleshoe, was one of just 10 students selected to attend the ceremony. She was chosen to represent District 9, which includes the many school districts in the High Plains and West Texas. She was accompanied on the trip by Watson Junior High Librarian Jane Rudd.

The Texas Bluebonnet Award is a reading incentive program sponsored by the Texas Association of School Librarians. Participating students in grades 3-6 were required to read at least five of a list of 20 new books

and then voted on what they felt was the best book. More than 190,000 Texas school children cast ballots and 107 schools applied to be represented.

"Verdi," a book about a garden snake who wanted to change his skin color, was the top choice of the young readers. At the banquet, which was attended by 1,900 persons, the 10 young readers met "Verdi" author Jewell Cannon.

Mitci Kay, whose reading teacher is Diane Harrison, was one of 21 WJHS students who participated locally. She was chosen after interviews with administrators and teachers. Students from Abilene, Mission, Argyle, Northwood, Wellington, Plano, Katy, Waco La Vega and El Paso joined Mitci Kay at the luncheon.

## Grant makes city history; Leal elected

Sharon Grant became the first woman elected to the Muleshoe City Council on Saturday.

She defeated incumbent Eugene Hawkins in District 3 by a vote of 57-47, with challenger Kelly Harrison also siphoning off 28 votes.

Former Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks won the District 4 council seat overwhelming, with 57 votes to seven for Sam Burke and four for Rich Magby.

In the only contested Muleshoe School Board race, Sergio Leal downed Francis Saldana Recio by 24 votes to eight.

School board incumbents Cindy Purdy and Nick Bamert had already been declared reelected because of their lack of opposition.

Two candidates for the Muleshoe Area Hospital District board, Tim "Buck" Campbell and Arline Phelps, also were unopposed.

In explaining her desire to serve on the council, Grant said, "I just wanted the opportunity to work with Muleshoe for Muleshoe. ... I'm excited about being a team player."

She said she was glad for the voters' support and "I'm going


## Rural 9-1-1 addressing heading for completion

Within the next year, each citizen in Bailey County will receive notification of their newly assigned 9-1-1 physical address as a result of the rural addressing projects implemented by each county throughout the region.

Other counties include: Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley, Cochran, Hockley, Crosby, Dickens, King, Yoakum Terry, Lynn, Garza, Kent and Stonewall. This process will convert route/box addresses over to the new physical address. Many citizens have questions about this address information prior to notification.

Until the notification process is complete in the county, a citizen may obtain address information by contacting Emergency Communications staff for the South Plains As-

#### Children okay after pickupsemi collision

Three children injured in an April 28 pickup-semi crash at the west edge of Muleshoe were from Roswell, N.M., a spokesman for the Texas Department of Public Safety said Wednesday.

The pickup was eastbound on FM1760 when it pulled in front of the 18-wheeler, which was eastbound on U.S. 70-84, according to DPS Trooper Billy Spears, who investigated the accident.

Spears said the truck driver swerved and apparently did everything he could to avoid the accident.

None of the children — ages 6, 5 and 5 — were seriously injured. They were treated and released at Muleshoe Area Medical Center.

The only other agency that has the initial address assignment information is you county's designated addressing coordinator. No mailing address should be changed on any citizens record of document unless the address has been verified by addressing personnel. This eliminates the possibility of citizens having to change an incorrect address that may have been obtained from another source not utilizing the county's adopted addressing scheme.

The postal notification process will be completed in conjunction with your local Postmaster, Commissioner, and the SPAG 9-1-1 Director.

Police, who in turn detained Hernandez and contacted U.S. authorities.





from four states attended the event in 1998. The trial is one in a series of six sanctioned by the West Texas Stock Dog Association. Dogs and their handlers compete for cash prizes, buckles, trophies and acquire points toward the coveted title of "Stock Dog of the Year" for the WTSDA and in the Texas Stock Association as well

"It's a sport that's seeing a lot of growth," said Muleshoe stock dog breeder and trainer Richard Belvin. "People see a trial and get interested in these dogs and what they can do. It's extremely competitive and the dogs have to be good to win."

The dogs compete in five different classifications -Novice, Ranch, Nursery, Open-Ranch and Open — with a graduated degree of course difficulty as they progress.

Components of the contests

• The "outrun," which consists of the dog leaving the handler and circlingbehind the livestock. The outrun starts at a central location and dogs are judged on the manner in which they circle the livestock and get into position. The "outrun" is worth 20 of 90 total points.

. The "lift," which is the manner in which the dog 'picks up' or gains control of the livestock to begin driving them back to a designated location. The lift is worth 10 points.

• The "fetch," which is the process of the returning the livestock to the designated location. The fetch is worth 20 points.

· The "full drive," which requires the dog to drive livestock in a triangle pattern. The pattern includes two sets of panels which the livestock must be driven between on their way to the pen. The full drive is worth 30 points.

• The "pen," which requires the dog to drive the livestock into a pen and hold them. The pen is worth 10 points.

Judging in each portion of the contest is based on the dog's efficiency and ability to move the livestock along imaginary straight lines. Points are deducted based on course variations.

At the Novice level, which features dogs just beginning to compete in trials, dogs are judged on the outrun, the lift, the fetch and the pen. In the Ranch class, dogs are judged on the outrun, lift, fetch, partial drive and pen.

The Nursery class dogs com-

pete over the full course, but the class is limited to dogs under 30 months of age.

The Open Ranch class features a full course, while the Open class requires a full course with a "shed," which is a required separation of the livestock group during the drive.

"It's interesting and exciting to watch," said Belvin, who attends trials all over the country. "With the competitiveness of the trials, these dogs have to be really good to win."





#### MISD offers criteria for acceleration testing

Muleshoe ISD has estab- ter on tests in individual classes, lished a process for credit by examination without prior instruction. Any student, grades K-12, who wishes to receive credit for a class or a grade level and move to a new grade may do so within the following guidelines. A test will be administered free of charge and will be approved, furnished and monitored by a representative of the Muleshoe Independent School District.

Elementary students must score 90% or more in areas of Language Arts, Math, Social Studies and Science to advance to the next grade.

Secondary students receive credit by scoring 90% or bet(i.e. English I)

Parents or legal guardians must notify the principal of the intention to test at least 30 days before the date of testing.

Elementary Students: Students in grades 1-5 must meet these three requirements to be accelerated:

1. The student scores 90 percent or above on the criterion-referenced test for the grade level to be skipped in each of the following areas: language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies;

2. A District representative recommends that the student be accelerated; and

3. The student's parent or must be notified of the inten-

guardian gives written approval of the acceleration.

High School and Junior High Students: To receive credit in an academic subject in grades 6-12 in which the student has received no prior instruction will require that the student score 90 percent or above on

the test. Muleshoe ISD will provide 3 testing days for acceleration purposes between July 1, and December 31, and 3 days between January 1 and June 30, annually.

## Public information laws provide for equal access by everyone

O: I want to find out some information from my local city council. I need to make an open records request but am not sure of the proper format. Also, how much time do they have to respond to my request?

A: No special form is required to request information under the Public Information Act. Some governmental bodies may, however provide you with a standardized form. Although using the form may assist the governmental body in processing your request, the agency cannot require you to use their form to make a request.

You should be as specific as possible when making your needing more time to respond,

request for information. You should provide your address and phone number in case the person processing the request needs to contact you. Although it is not required, a statement that you are making the request under the Public Information Act may be

Upon receipt of your request, a governmental body generally has four options it can take to comply with the act:

- The governmental body may promptly produce the requested
- contact you with a request for clarification or a reason for

• request a ruling from the Attorney General's office on whether it may withhold the information under on of the exceptions to the Act, or

• in limited circumstances, withhold the information pursuant to a prior attorney general opinion which determined that such information is an exceptions to the Act.

If the governmental body chooses to seek an Attorney General's decision, it must do so within 10 business days of receiving the request. The Attorney General's office will

Mr. Mata was a farm laborer and a catholic. In 1984, he moved to Morton from Saragosa, Texas.





#### Locker gains state berth with third straight Region 1-3A 800 meter title

Muleshoe's Stacy Locker won her third-straight 800 meters title and nearly pulled off an impressive double by finishing second in the 400 at the Region I-3A meet in Odessa Saturday.

Posting her second-best effort of the season, Locker pulled away from district rival Kristal Mullins of Shallowater and finished with a time of 2:21.03. The Muleshoe junior was a bronze medalist at state last year.

Although relatively new to the 400, Locker led most of the race before being overtaken by Breckenridge's Channelle McKay down the stretch. McKay edged Locker eight-tenths of a second with a time of 60.74. It was only Locker's fifth open 400 meters race of the season.

Four events later, Locker later ran the anchor leg on the Lady Mules' 1600-meter relay team, which broke its own school record with a time of 4:13.5 while finishing seventh.

"She's such a great competitor," Muleshoe coach John

Irwin said. "The only thing that kept her from winning the 400 stride when another runner clipped his heal. Atwood ended up was she got a little tired."

Locker said the hardest thing about competing in three events — which consisted of 1600 meters of sprinting for two days — was the lack of recovery time between events.

"But I'm happy with the way I ran and looking forward to state," Locker said.

Muleshoe also received a big effort from promising freshman Kyle Atwood, who finished third in the 1600 and sixth in the

Atwood carved more than seven seconds off his personal-best time in the 1600 meters, but couldn't hold the lead down the stretch. Travis Perez of Brownfield closed hard and won the race in 4:30.9. Atwood, who pushed his way from the middle of the pack into the lead on the final turn, finished in 4:32.65.

In the 800, Atwood caught a bad break. Sitting in fourth, Atwood was starting to make his move, but was he forced to break

"That was pretty amazing the way he came back in the 1600," Muleshoe coach Flint Bigham said. "He just competed his butt off."

Senior Matt Turney added a sixth-place finish in the shot put (48-3) for the Mules.

Friona sophomore Jena Grimsley was the only other area athlete to qualify for state at the I-3A meet, finishing second in the 1600 meters with a time of 5:27.32.

Friona's Whitney Ellis finished third in the 100-meter hurdles and failed in her bid to return to state.

Farwell's Brett Curtis was the only local athlete to qualify for state at the I-2A meet, although Melissa Cano of Bovina placed fifth in the 800 meters with a time of two minutes and 35.17 second and K'Leigh Scroggins of Bovina was sixth in the 300 hurdles (50.02.)

notify you of any decision made regarding the request for information.

Should the governmental body choose to release the information, the Act only requires that the information be produced in a "reasonable amount of time." What constitutes "reasonable" depends on the fact of each case. If the governmental body intends to release the requested information but cannot produce it within 10 business days after receiving the request, the agency must specify, in writing, a date and time when the information will be made available to you.

In the event that a governmental body does not properly

respond to your written request. you may submit a complaint to the Open Records Division of the Attorney General's Office at POBox 12548, Austin, Texas 78711. Your complaint letter should include a brief summary of your attempts to obtain the information along with the names and telephone number of any governmental employees that you contacted. Your complaint should also include your name, address and phone number.

Finally, you should enclose a copy of the original request letter and any correspondence you received in response to your request. You can also contact the Attorney General's Open Government Hotline at (512) 478-OPEN (6736).

forum for professional networking.

"Before the seminar, county treasurers sent in question on points of law, office procedure and everything else they had questions about. Panelists divided the questions up and spent that time discussing them. We have found that some of the best education occurs during this event because attendees have the opportunity to sit down and ask their peers how certain situations are handled in other offices," Avery said.

The V.G. Young Institute of County Government was created by the 61st Texas Legislature and provides infor-

mation and educational and technical assistance to elected officials.

"Texas is one of a very small number of states that require all elected officials to earn continuing education credits," explained John Gilmartin, Extension coordinator of the institute. "We provide that service to county commissioners, judges, treasurers, tax assessor-collectors and county and district clerks."

Unnecessary flushing wastes water and places an unnecessary burden on sewage treatment plants and septic tanks.

In the Kitchen:

- · Never run the dishwasher without having a full load.
- Keep a container of drinking water in the refrigerator instead of running water from the tap until it is cool.
- Keep conservation in mind when working in the kitchen. Small water savings, such as not making too much coffee or letting ice cubes melt in a sink, can add up over time.

In the Laundry:

· Wash only a full load when using the washing machine. It takes about 32 to 59 gallons of water per load!

Outdoors:

- · Water lawns early in the morning during the hotter summer months to reduce evaporation losses.
- Use a sprinkler that throws large drops of water rather than

a fine mist. This will reduce water losses from wind drift and evaporation.

- · Consider use of drip irrigation for bedded plants, trees, or
- · Do not over-water or water too frequently.
- Use mulches to help reduce soil moisture losses.

2nd Set!

· Do not "sweep" the driveway or sidewalk with water from the hose. Use a broom instead.

•Do not water the streets, sidewalks, and driveways. You won't grow a thing there! Also, stop your lawn watering before the water runs off your property and into the street.


