Most of Material Already Received For New System

darkness during the next few weeks and become one of the best lighted little cities in West Texas again. Contract was signed by the City of Snyder Thursday night with the Texas Electric Service Company by which 80 new mercury vapor street lights' will be installed to replace

the 25-year old lighting system that now is employed to light the town. Good portion of materials for making the installations already has been received by the electric conern. Lamps, globes and wiring arrived Tuesday. The steel brackets to which the lights will be installed are expected within the next several days. Actual installation work will be started immediately upon arrival of the balance of the materials, according to J. E. Blakey, manager of the Snyder office of the electric

A number of neighboring towns have installed the new type lights during the past several months, among them being Roscoe, Sweetwater, Lamesa, Big Spring, Hamlin, Roby and Breckenridge.

Tests have proven, city officials vere told by electrical engineers, that the mercury vapor lights produce nine times as much light as the old type standards now serving around the square.



Scurry County cotton farmers will again be extended free cotton classng service if application filed this week by the county cotton commit, tee is accepted by government officials. The committee is composed of Hoyt Murphy of Hermleigh, Jones Chapman of Arah and W. J. Ely of Snyder.

Free cotton classing is provided to cotton growers under provision of the Smith-Doxey act passed several years ago. Cotton is classed according to grade, lint length and tensile strength under the program. It is pointed out by the commit-

tee that cotton properly classed will permit the grower to get premium prices for better grade staples of cotton. Scurry County cotton growers last year made some money by having their cotton classed through the program, according to Oscar Fowler, county agent.

Spot cotton prices continued their downward trend during the week, according to the Department of Agriculture's weekly report to The Times. Activity in spot markets increased but sales were limited in volume. There was fair demand for new crop for prompt shipment. In. port inquiries were more numerouss and Japan entered the market for about 50,000 bales.

Mexican cotton crop for 1948 is expected to total about 620,000 bales of 500-pound gross or about onethird more than last season.

Trade reports stated that the United Kingdom purchased 50,000 bales of Brazilian cotton and was preparing to purchase another 50,000 bales in that country. U. S. Tariff Commission was reported to have authorized textile mills to obtain a total of 2,345,000 pounds of the 18,000,000-pound supplemental long staple import quota proclaimed last

Cotton prices in spot markets continued to ease during the week and on Thursday, July 29, the price of middling 15-15 inch averaged 23.94 cents, per pound This compared with 33.47 cents a week earlier and 36.27 cents a year ago. For the week ended Wednesuny the average spot price was 33.25 cents per pound compared with 33.52 cents for the preceding week. The spread between spot prices and October fultures narrowed to less than one cen during the week. A week ago the spread was about 120 points, and a month ago 317 points. Prices for spot cotton in the early ginning areas declined this week.

Market activity increased with reported sales in the 10 spot markets totaling 59,100 bales. Sales totaled 55,700 bales last week and 53,500 a year ago. Demand was chiefly for t forward shipment and mill inquiries ing the past week, the U.S. Departfor new cotton were fairly numerous



F. of L. once in five years, which happens to be the "elective" term of the president, vice presidents and secretary-treasurer, who constitute the general executive board. In a period of 30 years between the conventions and "elections" of 1911 and 1941, all the original officers but one died or were thrown out in fights for control of the treasury. The survivors among the old group elected reliable friends to fill the vacancies.



BERLIN: Showdown

The old familiar pattern of just one crisis after another in the cold war between Russia on the one hand and the western Allies on the other was being repeated again in the Berlin showdown. But an uneasy world watched anxiously, fearful that at any moment some crisis might explode into actual warfare.

Urgency of the Berlin crisis re sulted in the recall of Gen. Lucius D. Clay, U. S. military commander in Germany, and his top political adviser, Ambassador Robert Murphy, for a first-hand report on

the situation. Clay conferred with President Truman, State Secretary Marshall and Army Secretary Royall on means of carrying out the American government's intention to stay in Berlin despite the concerted Russian drive to force the western powers out.

The official line was laid down by Secretary Marshall who said that while the United States would not be "coerced or intimidated" by the Russian blockade of Berlin, the administration nevertheless will "proceed to reach an acceptable solu tion to avoid the tragedy of war."

Although rumors that the Berlin blockade might prove the spark that would enkindle fighting warfare permeated official quarters, the U. Under this law, the federal govrnment pays three-fourths of the irst \$20 of each grant (\$15) and one-half of the additional amount

ANSWER: Try this method for again-tonight-this time to "too flattening the bulge: Cut a slit in nice a girl." the bulge, following a line of the pattern so that it will not show. Then press linoleum cement under each side of the slit, working it well underneath with a spatula, or some similar tool. Wipe off surface smears promptly. If you cannot get linoleum cement, use roofing cement. Smears of roofing cement should be promptly wiped off with turpentine. Then place weights on top until the cement has dried hard.

QUESTION: My walls are covwallboard, which bulges here and there. It is covered there. It is covered with paper; but now shows a few cracks, which developed after the furnace was started. What is the best thing to do with the walls? The expense is an item; I'll have to have someone do all the work.

ANSWER: For a good job it would be better to take off the board and replace it with one of better quality, properly put up according to the manufacturer's instructions; or else nail up new boards over the old ones. In the meantime, you might consider nailing down the bulges as well as you can, and then covering the joints with strips of decorative wood moulding, such as halfround.

QUESTION: The walls of our new home are all pastel-colored, rough-finished plaster. Now "five o'clock shadow" is beginning to show around our high-wall registers. Our oil furnace has filters for the blower but, nevertheless, the soot on two walls looks black. How can I remove this grime and prevent a recurrence?

ANSWER: To clean the walls, first remove as much loose dirt as you can by light brushing, and follow by cleaning with a wallpaper cleaner. The filters probably are loaded down with dust and may need cleaning, if they are of the cleanable variety. If not. they may need to be replaced.



Platter II Place well chilled ripe olives and green stuffed olives in center of large platter and separate these with carrot strips and celery hearts. Divide rest of plate into four sections and in each one place the following: Tomato slices, cucumber wheels, scallions and radish roses.

COOKED VEGETABLES also may be used for pretty platters. Each vegetable should be cooked only until it is tender, and served at once. Here's a lovely platter which may be used as a main dish:

LYNN SAYS: Keep Kitchen Cool During Hot Days

It's best to do the main part of the cooking early in the day before it becomes so warm. For example, roast meat or bake meat loaf in the morning and serve cold for evening meal.

Au gratin potatoes may be cooked, the cheese melted in a hot sauce, then mixed with potatoes, and the whole dish heated for 15 minutes in the oven.

Keep a good selection of garnishes on hand which will make mealtime pretty and tempting as well as nourishing. There are pickled beets, sliced tomatoes and cucumbers, carrot curls, pickle fans and all kinds of greens Keep the family cool by starting

dinner off with icy chilled fruit juices. Top this with sherbet if you want to perk up wilted appetites. Watch the time you use your burners carefully; be sure they are turned off before you remove the pot or pan, not after.

Wash cauliflower and let stand in salted water for one-half hour to remove any insects. Cook in salted water for 25 to 30 minutes. The tomatoes should be firm. Wash and scoop out insides leaving the shell. Fill this with seasoned kernel corn to which has been added some chopped green pepper. These should be baked with just a little water in the bottom of the pan. The green beans should be washed carefully and picked over for any hard ends, then sliced lengthwise. They will take 30 to 40 minutes to cook. The cauliflower should be placed in the center of the platter, then banked with green beans, and the tomatoes with the corn and green pepper are placed around the green beans Serve with melted butter.

ANOTHER PRETTY SUMMER platter uses entirely different vege-

tables but is very colorful: Cabbage with Sliced Carrots Fried Parsnips Lima Beans Parboil a large head of cabbage

for 10 minutes. Remove all the inside leaves, so that only a few of the larger ones remain, leaving a huge cup. This is filled with carrots which have been sliced, or creamed if preferred, and cooked for 20 minutes. Sprinkle with parsley. Around this place parsnips which have cooked for seven to 15 minutes, then fried until golden brown and crisp in a buttered skillet. Lima beans are shelled and placed around that after cooking for 20 to 30 minutes in boiling, salted water.

Freeze in Garden Flavor In Moistureproof Cartons

To keep the most "garden goodness" in fruits and vegetables that are to be frozen, package them carefully. This point is stressed by Miss Frances O. Van Duyne, assistant professor of foods, University of Illinois college of agriculture.

Choose containers that can be sealed tightly and won't leak. Frozen foods are better when packaged in containers that are moisture-proof and vapor-proof, Miss Van Duyne explains. Otherwise the foods dry out and lose palatability.

Cartons come in a variety of types and shapes. Rectangular or square cartons may have inner linings or have a waxed plastic finish; some are made for use with cellophane bags. Most of these are sealable with heat-by pressing together edges of covering material with an electric iron or a hand iron. The cartons are generally easy to handle and store. Waxed cups are convenient, but the seal on the set-in lid isn't moisture- or vapor-proof.

Before sealing a filled carton or bag, wipe inside edges with a clean cloth to remove moisture that would prevent a tight seal. Also press out all possible air from top of bag, then heat-seal tightly. Or you may like the pressure tapes for sealing: they have an adhesive substance on one side so that they can be stuck on edges of bags and 5597

What To Do In Case of Fire Each member of a household should understand how to send in a fire alarm to the fire department. In many cities the fire alarm may be sent in by telephone or from a street fire-alarm box. Some cities require that the alarm be sent in by telephone, and others require that a fire-alarm box be used. Seconds count at the time of a fire. the proper method should be definitely known, and used. If sending in a fire alarm by telephone is re-





With signing of a contract last week by the Snyder City Council with the Texas Electric Service Company for four score of the new mercury vapor street lights for the city, the old town is scheduled to "throw some new light on the subject." Work on installation of the new lighting system is slated to get underway within the next several weeks.

Many area towns have installed the new mercury vapor lights that have brought them out of the semidarkness provided by old-time methods. Among towns in this section recently putting in the lights are Roby Sweetwater, Hamlin, Breckenridge, Roscoe, Big Spring

Tests have proven that the newly developed lights provide nearly ten times as much light as the old-time street lights. With seventeen of the lights scheduled for installation around the courthouse square next to the business houses (none will be placed next to the courthouse), four to the block for one block each direction from the square, plus one every block to the city limits on the three main highway outlets Snyder will truly be a well lighted little city.

The City Council, we believe, is sincerely interested in improving our city's appearance and advantages. The councilmen and mayor will continue to add improvements as the citizenship cooperates with the business group

Famous Early Day Trails

Old Southwestern trails are traveled again in imagination and fancy in a well illustrated booklet recently published—the joint effort of nearly a dozen writers and artists.

The book, "Some Southwestern Trails," was printed by Carl Hertzog, El Paso craftsman, for Houston Harte, publisher of the San Angelo Standard-Times and other Texas newspapers.

It is a compilation of essays on trails that crossed West Texas, first issued by the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation of Amarillo. Harte enlarged the series with three additional trails which touched the Concho dian, Texas, artist, who specializes in Western draw-

The Comanche War Trail, which "stretched in a bold band across the state of Texas to carry destruction to the Mexican settlements as far south as Durango," heads off the series. Written by J. Evetts Haley, author of several books on Texas subjects, it traces the southwesterly course of this more than a century old war road from it northern terminal near Dodge City, Kansas, to the Rio Grande crossing east

"With the settlement of West Texas," Haley writes. "the trial-worn deep by the hoofs of countless travelers, man and beast and whitened by the bones of animals"--passed into history. But deeper still were its bitter memories of desolation and the terror of hundreds of wailing women and frightened children carried of into Indian slavery. For everyone except the Comanche it was a trail of tragedy.

Trade with the then Mexican settlement of Sant Fe and gold strikes in California and Colorado re sulted in the establishment of five trails described in the book. They were:

The Old Santa Fe Trail from Independence, Missouri, to Santa Fe. It traversed Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico. Its only travelers who came near Texas were those who dared the shorter, more danger ous route through the trackless Cimarron desert Stanley Vestal, Oklahoma author, wrote the essay.

The Fort Smith (Arkansas)-Santa Fe Trail. H. Bailey Caroll of Austin, director of the State Historical Association, described the route across Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle first traveled by Trader Thomas James in 1821. It passed near the future site of Tascosa, Panhandle cattle capital that has since come and gone

The Marcy Trail: Captain Randolph B. Marcy of the U.S. Army opened the route from Fort Smith to Santa Fe in 1849. Haley writes, "when all known northern routes were crowded by eager immigrants' headed for the California gold fields. It angled south west, first touching Preston, in Grayson County and crossing the Comanche War Trail at Big Spring, where there were reliable water holes. It passed through the present site of Pecos and passed north

The Butterfield Trail: "It is doubtful if any Western trail so stirred the imagination as that which brought the mail," Haley wrote. The route was named by John Butterfield, who contracted in 1858 to carry the mail by stagecoach from Tipton, Missouri, to the Pacific Coast. It entered Texas at Sherman, ran near the present site of Jacksboro and touched Fort Chadbourne, north of San Angelo, Fort Stockton,

Fort Davis and El Paso. Arkansas River Route: LeRoy Hafen of Denver. state historian of Colorado, describes the trail that writes John L. McCarthy, Amarillo newspaper man forked off the Santa Fe Trail at Las Animas, Color do, and turned north of Pueblo, Colorado Springs large herds of cattle over it. It was a freight route and Denver in the gold rush of 1858.

The Western Trail extended northward from Brownsville to Dodge City and was established in 1876. Potter writes, because "the earlier Texas trail, that merged with the Chisholm Trail in Oklahoma, was giving too much trouble to the nesters (farmers) along its course." The trail passed through San Antonic and Kerrville before crossing the Red River into Oklahoma near Vernon, Texas,

The Goodnight Trail, over which Charles Goodnight and Oliver Loving pushed great herds of cattle west to New Mexico and northward to Cheyenne, Wyoming, is described by Haley. Leaving the border in 1866 in search of a market, they traveled through the Abilene and San Angelo country, crossed the Pecos at Hersehead and "turned up that salty unsettled stream to the first habitation upon it, Fort Sumner, New Mexico." The Goodnight Trail is marked across New Mexico.

The National Trail, which left Texas at Doan's Crossing on the Red River and skirted the Kansas-Colorado border to end on the Red Cloud Indian Agency in South Dakota, is described by Floyd Benjamin Streeter, librarian of Kansas State College at Hays. The trail was operated after the Kansas Legislature in 1985 passed a rigid quarantine law against Texas cattle entering the state. It was abandoned after cattlemen generally began to ship their herds

The Rath Trail "was built on the business of buffalo hides," Haley writes. It was set up by Charlie Rath in the early 1870s to freight buffalo hides to Dodge City, Kansas. Rath City was set up as a hunter's trading post "near to the Double Mountains' in Texas. After two years, most of the ers, the Mooar brothers," Haley related, "took their 40 yoke of cattle and at one trip moved to Rath City, kit and boodle, back up the Rath Trail to Camp Supply in Indian Territory."

Insects Doing Little Damage in Area Cotton, But North Texas Suffers Loss

damage to the fast growing cotton of Scurry County, according to this week's report to The Times from the Texas A. & M. Experiment Sta_ tion, cooperating with the U.S. Department of Entomology and Plant

In spite of hot dry weather in most of the northern two-thirds of fields in that area, in contrast to the damage in Scurry County and neighboring counties.

On the whole cotton in the south, ern third of the state has matured area. and is beyond the point of insect damage although some fields of late planted or rank growing cotton in the northern portion of this area are now heavily infested with bollworms. In many areas weevils are now migrating from mature cotton nto cotton that is still fruiting Heavy migrations sometimes occur within a 24-hour period. Heavy boll. worm infestations also occur sometimes on short notice. Therefore where cotton is not mature, grower should inspect their fields severa times a week to determine if in sects are present in sufficient numbers to warrant control measure the Extension Service warns.

Bill weevil infestation in 523 field in 31 counties averaged 20 per cent punctured squares. This is an increase of two per cent over last week and is five per cent higher than two weeks ago
