#### Only Woman War Casualty on Way Home for Burial

Body of Scurry County's only woman casualty of World War I is due to arrive this week-end at Snyder for reburial, according to word received this week by relatives of Lieutenant Laverne Farguhar. formerly of Fluvanna.

Lieutenant Farquhar was a nurse at an advanced hospital near Anzio beachhead, Italy, during the early campaign against Germany made from South Central Italy. She was killed when four German shells hit ked American field hospital near Anzio on February 10, 1944. She was one of two nurses and several others killed in the shell-

Laverne had been praised in early campaign press dispatches as one of five surgical nurses with a forward position on the Italian war

Funeral services will be conducted Saturday afternoon, 4:00 o'clock, at the Fluvanna Methodist Church. Rev. J. P. Ready of Fluvanna, assist ed by Johnny Richter of Cleburne, Bob Wimberly Home will officiate. Interment will be in Fluvanna Cemetery undr direction of Odom Funeral Home.

A graduate of King's Daughters Hospital at Temple, Laverne served as night supervisor at the Gorman Hospital before she moved to Abilene. She was a nurse at the Snow Clinic five years before she entered the service in January, 1942. She trained at Camp Barkeley and sailed for North Africa in March, 1943.

Miss Farquhar is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Farquhar of Fluvanna: four brothers Tommy Farquhar of Big Spring, Bill and Bob Farquhar of the Navy in California, and Truss Farquhar of Fluvanna; and a sister, Mrs. Josse Browning of Dermott.

# Destroyed by Blaze



#### Infant and Mortality Lowest in History of State Says Officer

Infant and mortality rates i Texas are at their lowest level in the history of the state, according to figures released to The Times by the Bureau of Vital Statitics of the State Department of Health.

Infant mortality has reached ow of 41.2 deaths for every 1,000 live births. Compared to the figures for 1940, this represents a reuction of more than 39 per cent in that year, there were 197,023 live births and 8.685 deaths. But depite these gains, Texas still ha the sixth largest infant mortality rate in the United States, with 42 states reporting lower rates.

Dr. George W. Cox, state healt officer, attribute the reduction t the increase in public response to he educational efforts of the Texas State Department of Health.

"We have reason for pride in our duced infant and maternal morality when it is realized that the eduction means in excess of 5.000 babies are being saved annually which would have otherwise died, Dr. Cox said. "In addition, the birth rate is higher than the 1940 figure by more than 71,000."

The comparison between the live births for 1940 and 1947 shows white births up 22,707; Latin American births up 7,186; and Negro births

The report also shows maternal mortality has been reduced over 65 per cent. In 1940 the rate was 4.6 for every 1.000 live births as compared to 1.6 for 1947.

Q.-Should block salt be kept be fore cows?

A .- Yes, as the amount of salt dairy cows need is almost entirely an individual proposition, varying with the size of the cows, the type of ration and the amount of milk produced. In addition, some cows seem to have a special appetite for extra salt. Milking rations should contain one per cent salt, but block salt should also be available for the cows to eat according to their individual desires.

#### **Cotton Continues** Price Losses as Big Crop Pegged

Spot cotton prices declined again and lost about \$2.50 a bale during the week, according to the Department of Agriculture's weekly release to The Times.

The Crop Reporting Board's first 1948 crop forecast last Monday was the most important price factor of the week. The 15,169,000-bale forecast was about a million bales higher than general trade expectations. Spot markets were less active during the week. Farmers were reported to be offering very little cotton at current prices and mill interest in spot cotton was limited. Trading in the gray goods market was brought to a near standstill by the large crop forecast.

Crop progress was generally good during the week but sub-normal temperatures stimulated weevil development in some areas. Picking and ginning made good progress in Central and South Texas.

Spot cotton prices declined sharply on Monday following the release of the crop forecast and reached the lowest level since early October, 1947. Prices for middling 15-16 inch cotton averaged 31.52 cents per pound in the 10 spot markets on Thursday, August 12. This is about 90 points above the average 1948 loan rate for middling 15-16 inch and compares with the average spo price of 32.14 cents on Thursday o last week and 34.67 cents a year ago. The average spot price for the week ended Wednesday was 31.75 cents per pound compared with 32.52 cents for the preceding week.

Farmers in the early ginning areas were reported to be holding current ginnings and there were predictions that a large volume of Reported sales in the 10 spot markets totaled 79,400 bales for the week against 84,500 bales in the previous week and 53,300 a year ago.

Crop production of 15,169,000 bales of 500-pound gross was forecast by the Crop Reporting Board on August 9. This first official 1948 crop forecast was based on crop conditions on August 1. The indicated 1948 production exceeds that for any year since 1937, and is the seventh largest on record. It is about 3,300,000 bales or 28 per cent larger than the 1947 crop of 11,851,- on September 13 or September 14. 000 bales and 3,200,000 bales larges than the 10-year (1937-46) average production of 12,014,000 bales.



No, You don't have to go out to buy new furniture when your things begin to look weary. Slipcovers will do amazing things to cover the poor points or just give them a fresh, new look.


If you want to change the appearance of a room and can't maneuver the furniture just the way you would like, the answer lies in slipcover-





Probably the only accomplishment of the special summer session of congress called by President Truman was to provide both parties of political ammunition for the election campaign. Democrats would be able to say

that the GOP congress simply sat back on its haunches and did nothing about the pressing problems of inflation, housing and other national issues.

Republicans could counter with the assertion that, within the bounds of their political beliefs and judgment of what is best for the nation, they did all they could under the circumstances. To that they probably would add the stock argument that the whole thing is the fault of the 16-year Democratic regime and that the ultimate solution must lie in the election of a Republican administration this November.

One result of the special session that might be classed as favorable | COTTON: was that it served to sharpen the rough edges of the wide cleavage between the two parties over domestic problems and give the voters a more clear-cut, definitive idea of what they will be deciding on November 2.

Despite President Truman's laborious diatribes against congress and his repeated warnings that controls alone will curb the now dangerous inflation, in the final analysis it remained foolish to believe that the GOP congress ever would take the action he recommended. Republicans simply do not approve of that method of handling the nation's Republican congressmen agreed

#### TAXATION: 125 Billion

By the end of this year individual taxpayers in the U.S. will have paid nearly 125 billion dollars in direct personal taxes, according to a survey entitled "Domestic Consumer Markets" prepared by the National Industrial Conference board. Last year, the report says, Amer-

icans paid more in personal taxes than they spent for new homes. cars, furniture and medical care. Individuals are spending a lower

percentage of their incomes for consumption than in peacetime years. "They are setting aside a slightly higher percentage for savings, but the major factor in shrinking the proportion of income left for voluntary expenditures is higher personal taxes. Direct personal taxes, after the

recent tax reduction, "equal 10 cents a dollar of income or triple the tax slice in 1929 and 1939. In greater than in those years."







#### Floyd Jones Says Terrace Systems Pays Off in Yield

Floyd Jones of the Plainview conervation group says his terrace system has brought benefits in three ways, according to a report from Bob Dupree, supervisor of the Upper Colorado Soil Conservation District office in Snyder.

Added production has paid for Jones' terrace system in its three years of operation.

"Hot spots" which were in evi dence even on his most level land before building the terraces are not present now. This evidences the fact that these spots were not results of land conditions other than lack of water. When the available water was retained and spread such that penetration resulted, production on these spots was comparable to other parts of the field.

Since water was evenly distribut ed by the terraces and the contour row system, all parts of each row was in the same condition and became ready to plow at the same time. Waiting for wet spots to dry did delay tillage operations.

These terraces were installed at a part of Jones' conservation plan in cooperation with the Upper Colorado Soil Conservation District. The practice of water conservation

Things Are Rough in Peru While the U. S. price index rose 8.9 per cent last year, living costs in Peru soared as high as the Andes-increasing 46.1 per cent. Between August, 1939, and December. 1947, living costs rose 69 per cent in the U.S. compared to 207 per cent in Peru, according to the Municipal Finance officers association. Among 11 nations for which comparable statistics are avalable, Canadian living costs have increased the least since before the war. Though the Canadian price index rose 14.9 per cent in 1947, it is only 45 per cent above the 1939 level of that country.

Onions are probably the most dangerous vegetable to slice thin because they have a way of slipping out of the knife's way and leaving your fingers there to take the rap. 


