Heavy Snow Covers Area

Local citizens were amazed to awake Saturday morning to find heavy snow covering the countryside. All types of weather came during the night, previous. About midnight much thunder, lightning accompanied a dash of hail and sleet for a short time, light rainfall followed which Fred Byerly gauged at .06 inch.

The snow started about 4 a.m. and by 8 o'clock some 4 to 5 inches covered everything. Byerly gave 5 to 7 inches of snow during Saturday, which was very wet and he gauged .90 inch during the day. Saturday night and Sunday another 2 inches were read in his gauge, giving us from 7 to 9 inches of snow.

Streets were very hazardous, but the State Highway Department soon had machinery cleaning the snow. Crews worked throughout the day on streets in town.

This puts farm and range land in excellent condition and warm weather is all we need to start pastures greening up and farmers to get soil ready for planting.

We have had the 6 weeks cold, damp weather which the groundhog predicted, when he came out in bright sunshine Feb. 2, so now cold weather should be over, especially since Spring officially opens today, according to the calendar, but several of our old timers advise that the snow remained on ground 4 days, so more cold and probably snow is in the offing, so don't pack your longhandles away yet.

Brother of Local Lady Dies

J. B. Dalton, 69, of 949 Mulberry, Abilene, founder of Abilene Machine Company, died at 2 p.m. Saturday of apparent heart attack he suffered on a fishing trip at Sugar Lake, Old Mexico. He was brother of Mrs. Paul Heathington of Rotan.

Funeral was at 3:30 p.m. Monday from Elliott's Chapel of Memories with Dr. Frank D. Charlton, pastor of St. Paul Methodist Church, officiating.

Burial was in Elmwood Memorial Park.

Mr. Dalton was born Aug. 20, 1899, at McGregor and attended school there and at Texas A&M University. He married Pearl Nabors Nov. 5, 1920, at Stanton.

The couple moved to Brownwood where Mr. Dalton was employed by the Texas Oil Company before moving to Abilene in 1933.

Mr. Dalton and his brother, L. A. Dalton, formed the Abilene Machine Company June 15, 1933, at 873 Pine. In 1938, Mr. Dalton bought his brother's interest in the company and in 1946 the business moved into quarters at 1334 Pine, its present location. He operated the business until his retirement in 1962. During World War II, the Abilene Machine Company made propeller shafts for the United States Navy.

In 1951, Mr. Dalton was appointed to the Taylor County Volunteer Parole Board and was commissioned by Secretary of State John Ben Sheppard.

He was a member of St. Paul Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife of the home; one daughter, Mrs. J. B. Bryant of Midland, two grandchildren; one brother, L. A. Dalton of Kerrville and one sister, Mrs. Paul Heathington.

Immunization Schedule

Following is a schedule of immunization for Rotan Schools:

March 19 — Diphtheria-Pertussis-Tetanus (any combination)

March 26 — Typhoid

April 9 — Typhoid

April 16 — Typhoid

April 23 — Diphtheria-Pertussis-Tetanus (any combination)

April 30 — Tuberculin Skin Test

May 7 — Smallpox

May 14 — Diphtheria-Pertussis-Tetanus.

All immunizations are to be given in the basement of the East Wing of the hospital, beginning at 1:30 p.m. Pre-school children should come at 1:00 p.m.

Only one immunization will be given at a time and only the one listed. If a pupil is unable to take the vaccine because of illness, etc., he will be allowed to take it on the Friday afternoon following, if accompanied by a note from his principal.

The TB skin test will be given to all first and seventh grades, and to all new students in the system. If a pupil has redness or swelling at the site of the Tuberculin Skin Test, he should be seen by a school nurse 2 days following the test for evaluation, a record of the reaction reading recorded by the nurse and any recommendations for further evaluation be turned over to the family physician.

Students who did not receive the Oral Polio vaccine should be urged to obtain it from their family physician.

Latest recommendations for boosters are as follows:

(1) Diphtheria - Pertussis - Tetanus - every 5 years.

(2) Typhoid - every 5 years

(3) Smallpox, Challenge every 5 years.

A charge of 50c per shot will be collected at the time the shot is given only.

Washington, D.C. — The Social Security act was amended in July, 1965, establishing the Medicare Program which, among other things, provides eligible individuals at age 65 or over with basic protection against the costs of services provided by hospitals which meet certain conditions of participation.

To be eligible to participate in Medicare, a hospital must meet certain conditions relating to patient health and safety.

Among requirements established by law are: A hospital (1) provide 24-hour nursing services, rendered or supervised by a registered nurse and have a licensed practical nurse or registered professional nurse on duty at all times and (2) have in effect what is called a hospital utilization review plan to see that prescribed conditions be continuously met.

Conditions established by the secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare for safeguarding the health and safety of beneficiaries require, among other things, that a hospital (1) have proper facilities for handling contaminated linens, the incineration of infectious wastes and for storing and safeguarding drugs and (2) eliminate fire hazards and maintain clean and orderly work areas in the food department, and if surgery is offered, have a properly equipped operating room free from hazards of explosions.

These are major requirements of a long list a hospital must provide to be eligible to serve medicare patients.

A section of the medicare provisions authorizes the Health, Education, and Welfare Secretary to enter into agreements with State agencies to make inspections of hospitals and certify that the services and facilities of a hospital do or do not substantially meet the required conditions.

In November, 1965, the Federal Bureau of Health Insurance agreed with the Texas State Department of Health for the State to carry

out the necessary inspections and qualifications of hospitals.

By April 30, 1968, 6,847 hospitals nation-wide had qualified to participate in the Medicare Program. In Texas 530 hospitals had been certified. Of this total number in the United States, about 600 were awarded a special "limited access" certification. Of this total 230 were located in Texas. A number of these are now facing serious difficulties trying to meet the requirements. For instance, those buildings with wooden floors, with doors 30 inches wide and narrow hallways, can do little about it.

Rural areas are in most instances hardest hit. Even if available, older people are less inclined to want hospital care away from their home town but smaller towns are less able to support a hospital meeting specifications.

The second annual report to Congress on the Medicare Program has not yet been printed but one part of it will say: "The State agencies have reported that those hospitals which received special access certification, have in general made progress toward correction of original deficiencies. The Nation-wide shortage of registered nurses, however, is especially acute in those rural and isolated areas where no access facilities are located and has remained the single and significant obstacle for these hospitals to overcome despite their continuing recruitment efforts." The report will also say that hospitals with the limited approval have made many corrections of physical plant deficiencies.

These problems being encountered by many of our older and smaller hospitals in Texas are spread over about all parts of the State except the larger cities. In many instances no other hospital services are available and even if there were, they are usually filled and their facilities strained. Doctors and nurses are not available even of facilities were adequate. The Social Security Administration is under criticism from some other Federal Agencies involved for not having disqualified some hospitals completely before this time but the Social Security Administration is seemingly trying to be as lenient as possible under the law to give every hospital as much time as possible to correct deficiencies to the

qualifying point.

NOTE: Those born on or before October 1, 1901, and have thus far not enrolled in the medical insurance part of Medicare are reminded that this coming March 31st is the last possible date for them to qualify. The premium rate will vary from \$4.40 to \$4.80 for enrollees coming in at this time. Those nearing age 65 should look into the "pros" and "cons" of the program and make their decision in the

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three-month period before reaching age 65 for maximum coverage.

The March 31, 1969 Date is also the last opportunity for those to enroll who may have dropped their coverage in 1966.



Medicare Information

The 1969 general enrollment period for the supplemental medical insurance under Medicare by some 8 Fisher County residents will close in a few more days, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager. He cautioned that this will be the last chance for some people over 67 to ever be entitled to the doctor bill part of Medicare.

The supplemental medical insurance part of Medicare is financed through the participants paying \$4 a month and

the Federal Government contributing \$4 a month from general revenues. Tuley stated that although over 95 percent of those entitled to the hospital insurance have also taken the optional supplemental insurance, a few have turned it down in the past or have not said whether or not they want it.

Each year from January through March there is a general enrollment period giving those already over 65 but not enrolled for the supplemental insurance a second chance to do so. One exception is that an individual who is not enrolled must do so within 3 years of his first opportunity. Those born October 1, 1901,

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or earlier fit this category; and if they have never been enrolled, they must do so by March 31. He noted that this group would not be able to apply next year in the general enrollment period since it will have been over 3 years since they could have first enrolled.

According to Tuley the general enrollment period does not apply to those just now nearing age 65, as they should apply in the 3-month period before reaching 65.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

A recent USDA report says cost at the grocery store for U.S. farm foods have risen 14 percent during the 1960's but during the same time, wages of food buyers rose faster. The percent of their income used to buy food declined from 20.7 percent in 1957 to 17.4 percent in 1967. Farmers in 1968 received 39 cents out of the food dollar, an increase of 1 cent over 1967. The farmer's share varied from 19 cents out of the dollar for bakery and cereal products to 55 cents for poultry and eggs.

The Apollo 9 astronauts may bring information that could help solve the problems of hunger. By using a battery of special cameras, they have photographed farm lands in the U.S. From these photos, it is hoped information can be derived which will show signs of drought and plant disease on crops and also on timber and grazing lands.

Organic matter is the storehouse of plant nutrients in the soil. It is often referred to as the "fat of the land." It results from the decomposition of plant and animal materials by soil organisms. On the average it contains about 56 percent carbon and 5 percent nitrogen.

Organic matter improves soil structure and its ability to take in water and hold it in storage for later use by plants. It also improves soil aeration, loosens dense, compact soils and granulates loose, open sandy soils to give them a friable crumb structure.

Too, organic matter exerts a strong influence on the exchange capacity of the soil, and also acts as a buffer to prevent rapid changes or fluctuations in soil acidity or alkalinity.

During the decomposition process, a continuous supply of carbon dioxide, nitrogen in various forms, phosphorus and other nutrients so essential to plant growth are liberated. Organic matter serves as a storage facility for mineral nutrients such as calcium, magnesium, nitrogen, and many others making them less likely to be lost in drainage or water seepage. It also makes the soil more favorable for vigorous, rapidly developing root systems on young plants.

Continuous cultivation without giving attention to regular additions of residues gradually lowers the organic matter in the soil. The level may become so low that maximum cannot be obtained. Soil tests will show the organic level in the soil.

Rats are expensive to have around the farm. It isn't so much what they eat, but what they waste because of their filth and living habits.

A single rat may actually eat only about \$10 worth of grain or feed but will destroy 10 times as much.

These pests need food, water and shelter and around the farm it is difficult to remove

these necessities. Rats can be discouraged if good housekeeping practices are carried out.

Clean up and straighten up all farm buildings. Abandoned implements, discarded building materials and rubbish piles make excellent homes for rats. Crop residues should be spread on fields or burned. Grain storage bins should be rat-proofed and all grain spilled outside the bin should be cleaned up. Weeds and tall grass should be cleared away from buildings and kept mowed during the growing season.

Leaky hydrants often supply all water needs of rats. Water troughs should not be allowed to overflow to further curtail water supplies for the rodents.

After a thorough cleanup campaign, the next step is a baiting program. Rat baits are a good supplement to good housekeeping. Rats, of course, must eat the baits if they are to be effective. If grain or other foods are available, getting rats to take the baits may be a problem. Baiting stations should be placed where they are easily accessible to the rats but difficult for other animals or pets to reach. The anticoagulant baits are effective and relatively safe to use. Most farm supply stores have rat baits available. Label instructions for their use should be carefully followed.

HD Club Studies Sauce Cubes

The Hobbs Home Demonstration Club met March 13 in the home of Mrs. L. E. Hardin. The vice-president, Mrs. Dale Cave, presided over the business session and presented the program on, "Instant Vegetable Sauce Cubes." She gave an explanation and demonstration on the preparation and use of vegetable sauce cubes which can add nutrition, interest and variety to vegetables. They are useful to speed up meal preparation because they are prepared ahead and stored in the freezer.

Mrs. Cave gave recipes for Tomato Sauce Cubes, Cheese Sauce Cubes, Lemon Butter Sauce Cubes and Curry Sauce Cubes. These sauce mixtures are prepared ahead, poured into pan, frozen, then cut into cubes, put into plastic bags and stored in the freezer to be taken out as needed.

In cooking vegetables, when they are nearly done, add four to eight of the cubes stir and cook until the sauce is smooth and the juice of the vegetable is thickened. Mrs. Cave used cheese sauce cubes for sauce on broccoli and on mixed frozen vegetables. They were delicious.

ORDER FOR ELECTION PROCEDURE IN WATER DISTRICT DIRECTORS ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
 COUNTY OF FISHER

On this the 13th day of February, 1969, the Board of Directors of Rotan Municipal Water Authority convened in regular session, open to the public, with the following members present, to-wit: W. I. Branch, President, Bill Hardy, Cecil Edwards, and the following absent: John Gray and Bartlett Strayhorn, constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings had by said Board of Directors was the following:

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas provide that an annual election shall be held in this District on the 1st Tuesday of April of each year for the purpose of electing members to the Board of Directors of said District and the next ensuing 1st Tuesday in April being the 1st day of April 1969;

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas provide that said Directors election shall be ordered by the Board of Directors of said District, and further provide that the notice of said election shall state the purpose of the election, the officers to be voted upon, the polling places and the names of the officers of election, and further provide that said notice shall be posted once a week for three consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the county or counties in which said District is located, the first publication being at least 21 days prior to the election, and not more than 35 days prior thereto;

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas provide that the statutes regulating voting are applicable to said Directors election in said District; Whereas it is anticipated that the order calling the above mentioned directors' election will be passed by this Board on the 13th day of February, 1969;

Whereas at the next above mentioned directors' election there will be elected three directors for this district;

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas do not fully set forth the procedure to be followed by candidates filing for said office of Directors of said District, and this Board has the power and authority to establish said procedure, and in order to comply with the above mentioned provisions, it is reasonable to require that all persons desiring a place on the ballot as a candidate for director of said district must apply at least 15 days prior to the date of election for his name to be placed in said ballot

THEREFORE be it ordered by the Board of Directors of Rotan Municipal Water Authority :

1. That all candidates for the Board of Directors of said District at the election to be held on the 1st day of April, 1969, filed their application to become a candidate with the Secretary of this Board at Rotan City Hall on or before the 15th day of March, 1969, said date being 15 days prior to the date when this Board of Directors will issue its order calling said election.
