

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

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

WHAT ABOUT THE EUNUCH?

"I have heard you stress that one must be a member of the church to be saved? After his conversion, of what church did the Ethiopian eunuch become a member?"-Querist

The account referred to is found in Acts 8:35-39 where we read, "Then Philip opened his mouth and began at the same scripture and preached unto him Jesus. And as they went on their way, they came unto a certain water and the eunuch said, See, here is water; what doth hinder me to be baptized? And Philip said, If thou believeth with all thine heart thou mayest. And he answered and said, I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. And he commanded the chariot to stand still: and they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him. And when they were come up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord caught away Philip, that the eunuch saw him no more: and he went on his way rejoicing."

Now of what church did he become a member? The conclusion seems to be drawn that since the word church is not mentioned in the passage, the church is unimportant, and the eunuch became a member of none.



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
