A soil survey is an inventory of the soil resources of in area. This inventory groups soils that are alike, placing them in Land Capability classes .The procedure is called soil classification. Soil surveys not only classify all the soils in the surveyed area but it also delineates and the survey area.

Soils with like characteristics have similar responses to management. In other words, soils with like characteristics, will respond the same to cropping sequence, fertilizer and tillage methods. They will require the same conservation practices and will be adapted to silimar crops. They will also have about the same productive capacity under similar man-
