### Proclamation

BY THE COUNTY JUDGE OF FISHER COUNTY

To All to Whom These Presents Shall Come:

I, E. G. Perkins, County Judge of Fisher County, do hereby declare the week of July 20-26 as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Fisher County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, the citizens of Fisher County are proud of our farm families from whom comes our abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of this segment of our population as they go about the sometimes hazardous task of producing the commodities needed by the entire population; and

WHEREAS, farm and ranch accidents continue to take more lives annually and cause painful disabling injuries; and

WHEREAS, the President of the United States and the Governor of Texas have proclaimed the same period as FARM SAFETY WEEK; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas 4-H Clubs, Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Fisher County Farm Bureau with the theme, "Manage To Prevent Accidents"; and

WHEREAS, such a campaign will do much to call to the attention of our rural citizens the need for observing safety precautions which would reduce the tragic toll inflicted by accidents;

THEREFORE, I urge all citizens to recognize this special period, and especially urge farm families of Fisher County to become more safety conscious, not only during FARM SAFETY WEEK, but every day of the year.

## Contract Signed Brush Control Roby Lady Is 4-H Adult Heads Roby FFA Group Mitchams Wreck By Union-Mill Proving Popular Pres. VFW Aux. To Dist. Meet To State Meet New Trailer

Agreement was reached Tuesday night by Gypsum & Lime International Union Local 74 members and National Gypsum Company for a 2-year contract.

Willie Martin, president of the local Union and Victor Hill, plant manager for National gave the Advance-Star-Record joint statement Wednesday morning that "an agreement had been reached and contract would be signed during the day."

Martin said the two-year package will include 56.4 cent raise for union members, at 23 cents the first year and 20 cents the second year with the remainder of the settlement in fringe benefits including pensions, insurance and jury pay and vacations.

Members had not been on strike. The local Union had been negotiating with the company prior to expiration of their contract July 1. A previous offer of 54.3 cents was rejected by the Union June 27.

### McHaney Has Scholarship

Stephen McHaney, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McHaney, Roby, has been selected as recipient of a Robert A. Welch Foundation Scholarship.

This award is for \$4,000, payable \$1,000 per year to persons who must major in Chemistry in college and evidence a desire to engage in research in Chemistry at the graduate level in Texas.

McHaney intends to enroll at the University of Texas at Austin in September.

### Quiet Fourth In Roby

Roby spent a quiet Fourth of July, with most business houses being closed. Service Stations and eating establishments were mostly open. Most citizens were away on short trips, to lakes for boating and fishing, visiting relatives, but most of the teenagers took advantage of the Swimming Pool.

This Pool is providing wonderful recreation for our youth. This splendid project was made possible by the far sightedness of a few local men and wonderful cooperation of practically everyone in supporting the cause.

No fatal accidents marred the day and only two traffic accidents were reported, one 10 miles south on highway 70 and the other 3 miles south.

A total of \$1400 has been collected so far this year in Fisher County by the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association.

The sum is part of the more than \$70,000 which has been contributed by Texas landowners to the BCRIA.

Fisher County Chairman, Roger Smith of Rotan, said the association was formed last November by a group of prominent ranchers to raise funds to fight brush invasion of rangelands and to study range improvement methods.

The brush situation is considered to be one of the states major agricultural problems.

Smith said the plan is to collect 1 cent per acre from each cooperating landowner each year for five years. The goal for Fisher County for 1969 has been set at \$3,000.

The BCRIA is a non-profit organization not directly associated with any university, company or agency. A 16-member board of directors, representing different areas of the state, is directing activities.

State BCRIA Chairman John Matthews of Abilene said the goal is not to wipe brush off the ranges entirely. Instead, ways will be sought in which the landowner can economically control undesirable brush and weeds.

He said that not only does brush reduce animal carrying capacity of ranges, but it also wastes water. About 10 million acres of water could be saved each year in Texas by controlling worthless brush and weeds.

More and more ranches, Matthews said are aware that they must help solve the brush invasion problem. The BCRIA offers a convenient and effective vehicle for that help.

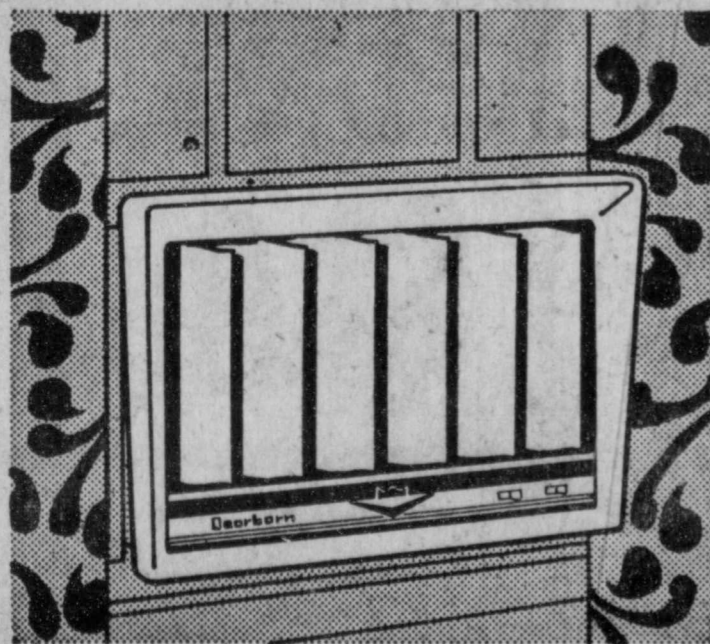

The Agent prepared okra, blackeye peas and fresh peaches for freezing. Ascorbic acid was added to the peaches in the syrup to retain color. Good wrapping is very necessary in packaging foods to be frozen. Proper blanching is important, also.

The purpose of wrapping food is to keep it from drying out, and preserves food values, flavor, color and pleasing texture. 4. Rigid containers, made of aluminum, glass, plastic, tin are moisture vapor resistant and are suitable for all packs.

Put no more unfrozen food into a freezer than will freeze in 24 hours.

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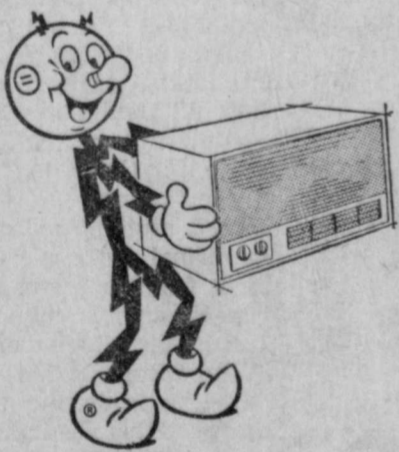
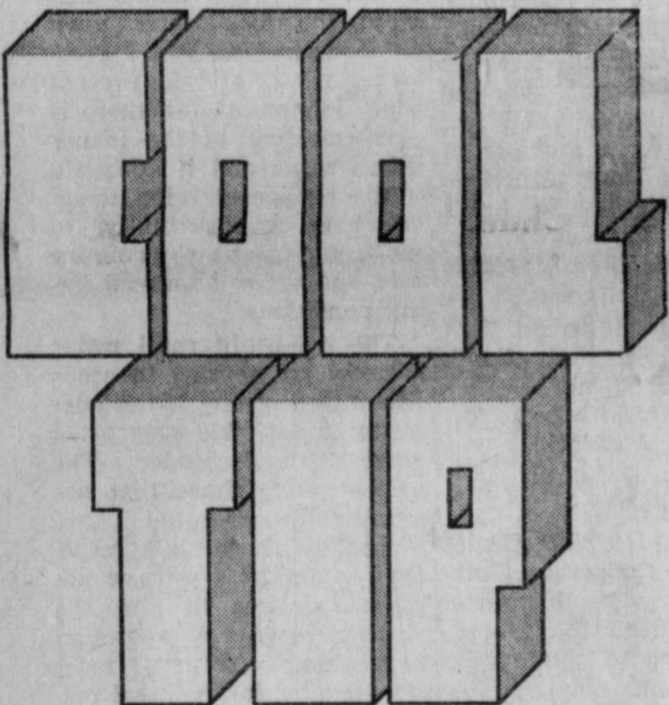
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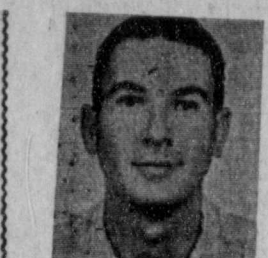


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## COUNTY AGENT NEWS

by Richard Spencer

What does it take for you to produce a bushel of wheat or a pound of cotton? How efficient are you compared to your neighbors? Several Rolling Plains farmers are attempting to find this out by using an enterprise accounting record system. They have found that on the average their costs in 1968 under dryland conditions were as follows:

**COTTON**  
(cost per pound)  
Cash operating cost (fuel, oil, grease, repairs and maintenance) .09  
Fixed cost (interest, depreciation, insurance and taxes) .04  
Total cost .13  
Yield per acre . . . 450 lbs.

**WHEAT**  
(cost per bushel)  
Cash operating cost (fuel, oil, grease, repairs and maintenance) .81  
Fixed cost (interest, depreciation, insurance and taxes) .21  
Total cost . . . \$1.02  
Yield per acre . . . 24 bu.

If these farmers are "typical" Rolling Plains farmers and they sell cotton for 18c per pound and wheat for \$1.25 per bushel, you can see that the profit margin is quite narrow even with the good yields which were obtained. Thus, a farmer must be quite efficient to stay in the farming business and offset those bad years.

You can find out how efficient your cost of production is by using an enterprise accounting system. If you should need assistance in setting up such a system, contact your local County Agricultural Agent.

The corn leaf aphid and the greenbug are the aphids most commonly found attacking grain sorghum during June and July.

The corn leaf aphid is greenish or greenish-blue and is usually found in the whorl or on upper plant parts. Largest numbers of these aphids and usually present in the spring of the year. Heavy populations of corn leaf aphids can damage grain sorghum from the seedling stage through harvest. However, corn leaf aphids in Fisher

County are usually suppressed by beneficial insects (the lady beetle and others) before the grain sorghum plants reach the pre-boot stage.

The greenbug is light green and has a prominent dark green stripe down the center of the back. Colonies of greenbugs when present are usually found underneath the lower leaves; however, a few greenbugs may be found in the whorl and colonies may be found underneath leaves near the top of the plant. As greenbugs feed by sucking plant juices toxins are injected into the plant. These toxins cause reddish spots on the leaves. The reddened leaf areas enlarge as greenbug populations increase. Under heavy populations the leaf begins to die, turning brown from the outer edges toward the center.

Natural enemies of the greenbug include lady beetles, green lacewing larvae, damsel bugs, and syrphid fly larvae. Greenbugs are also parasitized by several tiny wasps.

When beneficial insects are not present in sufficient numbers to control greenbugs, the use of insecticides should be considered. Based on one year's research, the following table summarizes guidelines on the need for insecticide application or sorghum:

- Plant Size**  
Emergence to about 6 inches high.
- When To Treat**  
Visible damage, with colonies of greenbugs on lower leaf surface.
- Plant Size**  
Larger plants to pre-boot.
- When To Treat**  
Before any entire leaves are killed.
- Plant Size**  
Pre-boot and larger.
- When To Treat**  
When greenbug numbers are sufficient to cause death of more than the two lower normal-sized leaves.

Additional information concerning control of greenbugs on sorghum and other crop pests, as well as insecticide recommendations, is available at the County Extension Agent's office.

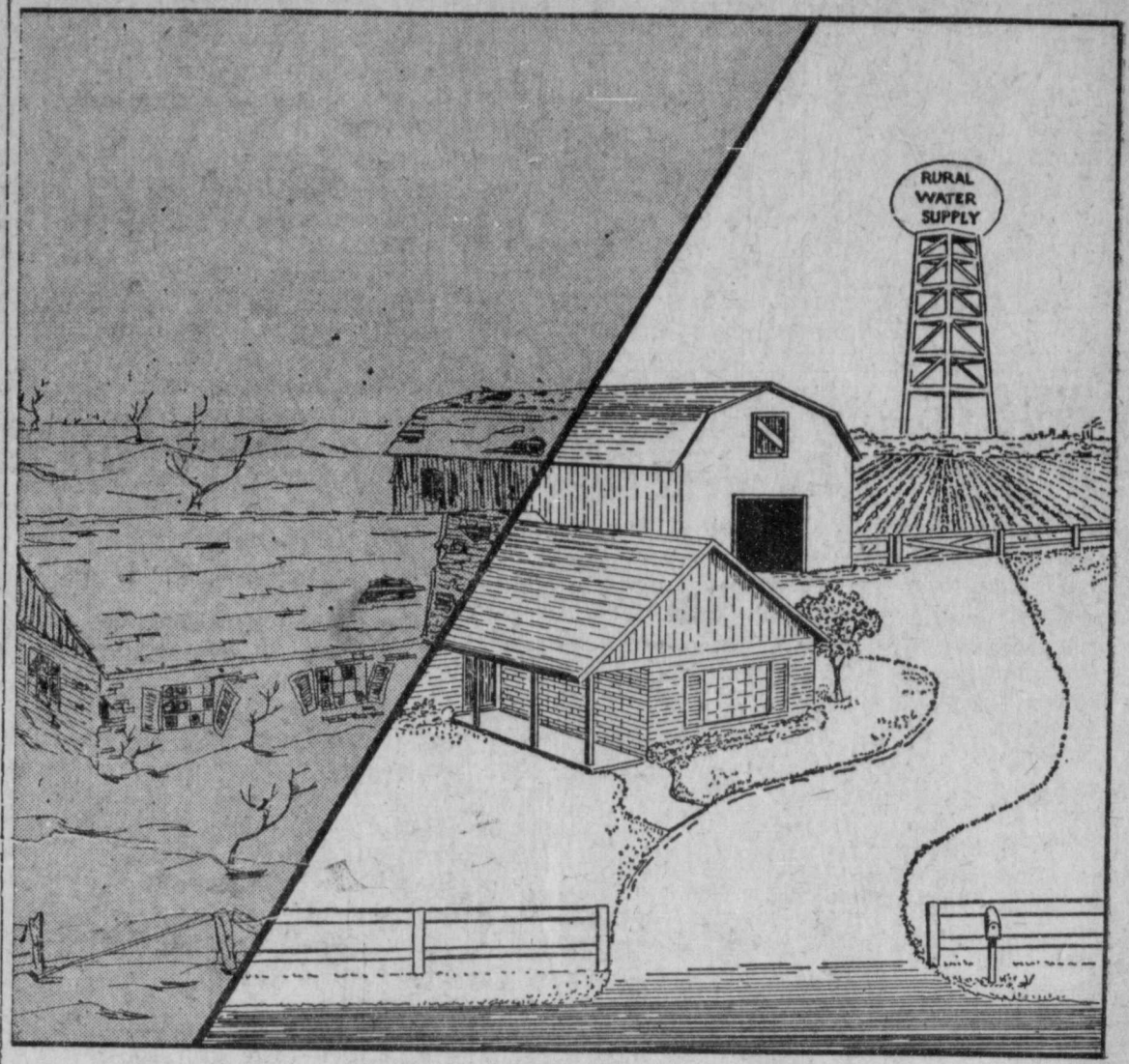

"The basic purpose for the development of the Texas Association of Rural Water Corporations is to work for progress in the rural Texas," says Jerry K. Johnson of Nacogdoches, president.

More than 200 of Texas' rural water supply corporations are members of the Association, and the membership is gaining eight to ten systems weekly.

The Association's members and directors feel that if the state's economy continues to grow, ample services, including water, must be made available to the rural areas. "At the present time, Johnson states, there is over-crowding in the major urban areas and if adequate utility services develop, many will have an opportunity to move into the nearby country side and enjoy improved living conditions."

The non-profit rural water systems are serving in areas where well water is not adequate or available sources of water are undesirable. The systems, like those that are municipally operated, are owned by those they serve. Only a limited few have adequate sources to hire the desired services of operation employees. Rather, most are operated by the rural residents that are pledged to the ideal of having good, fresh water in the country.

The Association's opinion is that the systems can play important roles in rural Texas development, but they require, for that role, the same tax advantages as the city-owned systems enjoy. Most municipal systems are exempt from taxation. In meetings throughout the state, the Texas Association of Rural Water Corporations is attempting to inform the public about this need and is asking for support and vote favorable on position four of the August 5 ballot.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR5)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:  
"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:  
(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;  
(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;  
(3) Needy blind persons;  
(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.  
"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.  
"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition:

"The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places or (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

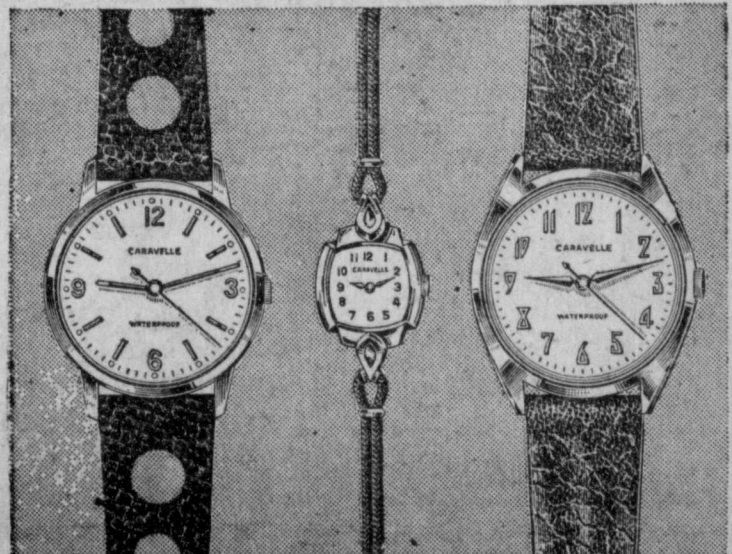
