This buffers toxic effects of carbon dioxide and ammonia and stimulates microscopic plants to produce more oxygen. If treated soon after fish show distress, the situation is usually relieved within an hour. Using outboard motors to !! stir up the water and replinish the oxygen supply is often recommended for small ponds. If a pump is available, water can be pumped from the bottom and sprayed |back on the surface.

Suffocation from oxygen is not only cause of fish dieoff. Careless use of agricultural chemicals can also cause a lot of trouble. Therefore, possible contamination
