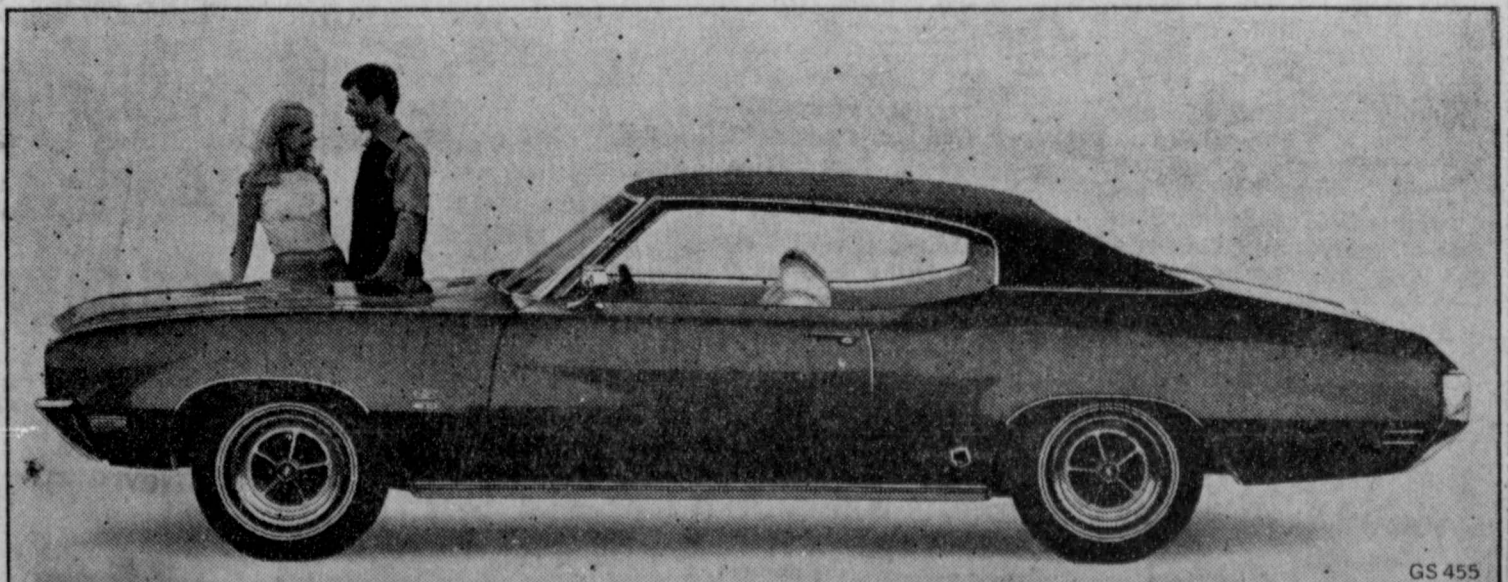

Hicks Helps In Hurricane Area

Biloxi, Miss.—Airman Johnny R. Hicks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jessie R. Hicks of 508 E. Snyder St., Rotan, Texas, was among the thousands of personnel from Keesler AFB, Miss., who joined the massive effort to help nearby communities recover from the devastation of Hurricane Camille.

Airman Hicks and others from the Air Training Command base located at Biloxi aided Civil Defense teams and city crews in the distribution of food, clearing debris and directing traffic. Heavy equipment was assigned throughout the Biloxi area to help clear wreckage. Medical teams from the base augmented health staffs in the stricken communities of Bay St. Louis, Waveland, Pass Christian and Gulfport as well as Biloxi.

The Keesler airfield was the center of airlift operations for giant cargo planes bringing in food, supplies and medicines, and for continuous shuttle missions by helicopters.

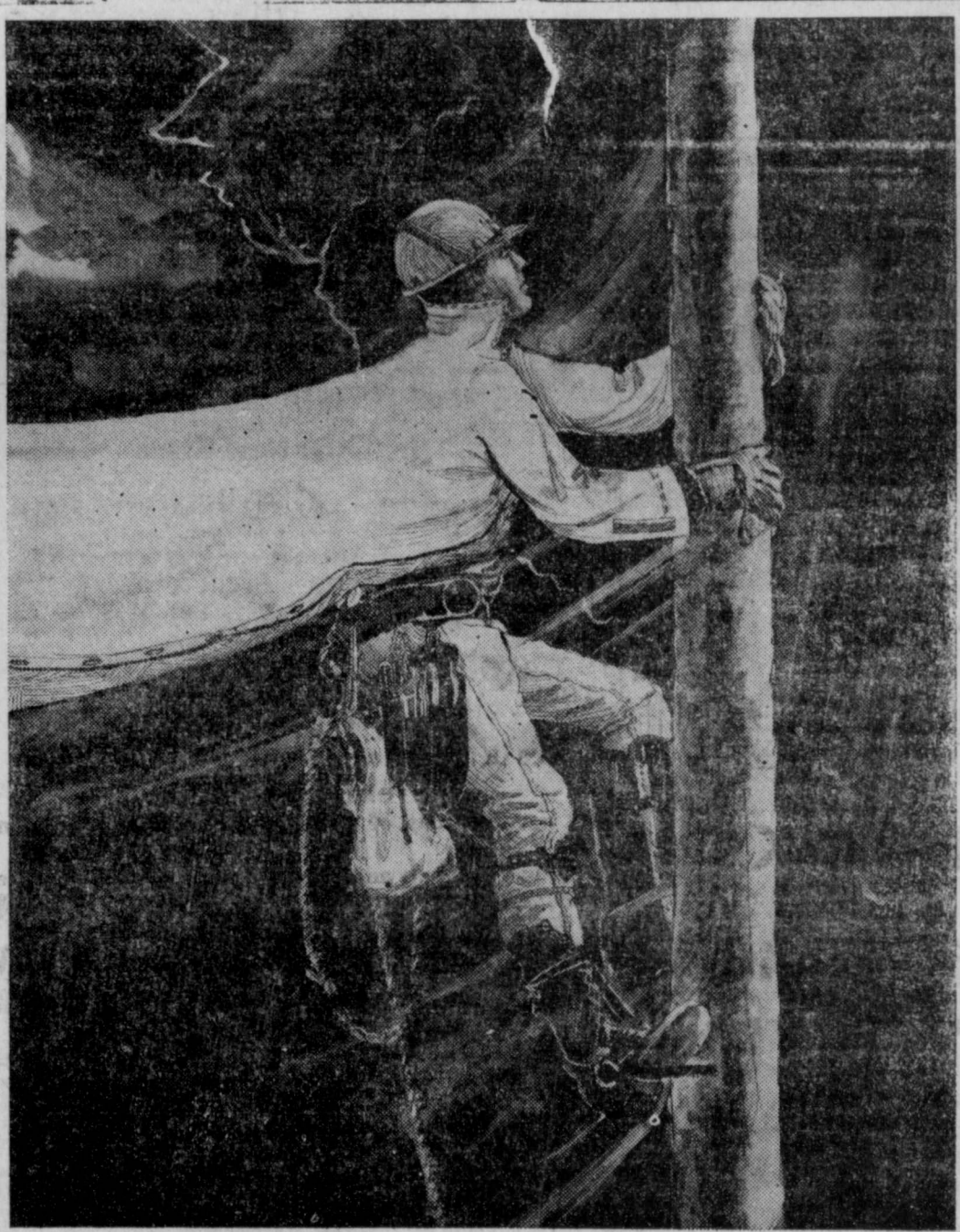
