Hammers Swat Hornets 36-9

After taking a narrow lead in the first half, Rotan Yellowhammers geared up for a 36-9 score over Aspermont Hornets here last Friday night. This was first Dist. 6-A conference game for both teams. At halftime Rotan held narrow 6-3 edge. The Yellowhammers now have a 3-2 season record, while the Hornets have two wins, two ties and two defeats.

Hornets opened the scoring with three points on a 22 yard field goal.

In the second period Rotan's Mickey Early intercepted an Aspermont pass and returned the ball 32 yards to the Aspermont 14. From there, quarterback Walter Hargrove passed to end John Wylie for 14 yard TD. This came with 14 minutes left in the second period.

Hargrove in the third quarter ran 35 yards to the Aspermont 25. On the first down, he passed to halfback Mickey Early for a TD with the play covered 25 yards. Another touchdown for Rotan in the 3rd period came when Early went up the middle, then cut outside on a 64 yard run.

Rotan scored in the fourth quarter when Hargrove passed to Wylie on a 20 yard play. Later, Hargrove completed a 30 yard pass play to end Chico Garcia to set up a TD from the seven. From there, Hargrove completed a TD pass to Wylie.

Final TD for Yellowhammers came on a 21 yard run by Early. This was set up by a 32 yard pass from Hargrove to Garcia.

Aspermont's TD came with two minutes left in the fourth period.

DAR Members At Dedication

Representing Nancy Harper Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution, Mrs. J. W. Watson, Mrs. Delila Baird and Mr. and Mrs. Henry B. Cook Jr., attended the dedication ceremonies at the Douglas McArthur Academy at Brownwood Saturday.

Principal speaker at the convocation ceremonies Saturday morning was General William C. Westmoreland, Texas Lt. Governor Ben Barnes served as Master of Ceremonies and introduced the dignitaries on the platform. Among these were high foreign officials from Thailand, Singapore, South Vietnam, South Korea, Republic of China, Japan, the Philippines, Australia, England and Canada.

Dr. Guy Newman of Howard Payne College and originator of the plan to get the Academy located on the H.P. C. campus, welcomed guests.

Lt. Governor Barnes said there was no need for a monument to General MacArthur, because he had made his mark on history; but the Academy was a means of honoring a great hero and helping to perpetuate the noble things for which he lived.

Senator John Tower, who introduced the speaker, referred to General MacArthur as the "greatest American of our generation."

In his speech General Westmoreland reviewed much of the life and activities of Gen. MacArthur. He quoted from a speech delivered by the General at his last public appearance, when he returned to West Point to receive the highest honor bestowed by his fellow alumni—the Thayer award.

Honorary Doctorate degrees were conferred on Westmoreland, W. Fred Duckworth, and Mrs. MacArthur.

Following the convocation, the assembly of more than 5,000 people moved to the Academy for the final ceremonies. Master of ceremonies was Col. Russell Fudge, U.S. A., Retired, Academy Director. The statue of General MacArthur was unveiled by his widow. Following the unveiling, Mrs. MacArthur spoke briefly. She stated that she would never forget the two days at Brownwood. She said that the statue was, "a wonderful likeness", and presented HCP officials with a copy of the General's farewell address to West Point Cadets, in which he pointed out the ethics of the American Soldier—"Duty, Honor, Country." She also praised Dr. Newman and Howard Payne College for carrying on the principles which were the basis of General MacArthur's life of Service.

Closing the ceremonies, Dr. Newman told the crowd that "the Academy is constructed for the future, but there will be no future for America if man does not follow the ethics of General MacArthur, and most of all, put his faith in God.

Following the concluding ceremonies at the Academy, the DAR members and other "friends of the Academy" were guests for a barbecue luncheon in the Coliseum, where music was furnished

Feedlot Meeting Tuesday in Roby

A meeting to explore the possibilities of setting up a warm-up type feedlot for Fisher County will be held Tuesday, October 28, 8:00 p.m. at the Agriculture Building in Roby, according to Richard Spencer, County Agent.

Appearing on the program will be Dr. Ray Dietrich and Dr. Don Farris, both professors in the A&M Agricultural Economics Department. Dr. Ed Uvacek, Livestock Marketing Specialist with the Extension Service will also appear on the program.

Dr. Farris and Dr. Dietrich have done extensive studies in the Texas and Oklahoma cattle feeding business, including structure, economics of size and operational characteristics of existing feedlots. Dr. Uvacek is a nationally known livestock marketing specialist and has kept very close watch on the feedlot business and its influence on beef cattle marketing.

Anyone interested in cattle feeding is invited to this meeting, according to Spencer.

'CROP' Helps Stop Hunger

CROP has exported more than \$1 1/2 million in food and supplies thus far in 1969 according to Texas CROP Director, Norma A. Sundwall. The shipment total is similar to that of a year ago in spite of earlier delays caused by the longshoremen's strike.

The shipments, valued at \$1,566,000, were made to hunger areas in 25 countries for distribution through church welfare and development agencies. CROP is the Community Hunger Appeal of Church World Service.

The chief recipient has been Nigeria-Biafra with its food and supplies valued at \$577,000. In addition to emergency shipments of food to starvation victims, CROP is now providing 9,000 pounds of vegetable seed, 110,230 pounds of hybrid seed corn, and 42,000 pounds of soybean seed to help refugees replenish their vanishing food supply.

Other recent 1969 shipments largely from last years contributions to CROP and from special corporation gifts included the following items: \$437,000 worth of supplies to the Republic of the Congo. \$104,000 worth of food to the Central African Republic where a new rehabilitation project for refugees from the Sudan has been initiated.

A shipment of Newcastle vaccine for poultry development project in Malawi.

200,000 pounds of rice to provide approximately 14,000 school children in Hong Kong with a good hot meal at least once a day.

A shipment of 153,000 pounds of split beans to India.

Fifteen tons of jams and jellies from major U.S. processor to add a nutritious supplement to the diets of children in hospitals, schools and orphanages in Hong Kong, Korea and Taiwan.

Multipurpose food for refugees in Vietnam and 8,284 pounds of vegetable seeds for farmers in the Philippines.

A half-ton of garden tools and 50,000 pounds of sorghum seed to help develop special farm programs in Haiti.

CROP shipments continue throughout the year in accordance with requests received from the overseas church programs and in accordance with contributions received from the people in the United States for CROP community appeals.

Under the direction of Roby Community CROP Director, Mr. Kiefer Cauble, the youth of the United Methodist Church of Roby will be knocking on doors for TRICK or TREAT in Roby for CROP at 7:30 p.m., Thursday the 30th.

We have a lovely little couple at Crest View, Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Carey. Mr. Carey loves to talk, almost better than anyone I know and I love to sit and listen. He has lived one of the most colorful lives imaginable. He is a retired evangelist. He reminded me as I talked with him that word "retired" is a word ministers just don't like to use and it was "strictly because of health" that he is retired.

Born in West Tennessee, he was the only son of farm parents, growing up mostly alone. He lost his mother when he was 12 years old. Mr. Carey was active in the ministry for 45 years, supply preaching and teaching long after that. His work has been mostly in Texas and West Tennessee. He tells of the great flu epidemic in 1917 and 1918 when he worked closely with the local Dr. in Union City, Tenn. He says people were dying everywhere by the scores, especially in army camps. He went with the doctor and other trained people out into the country-sides, convincing people to keep their doors and windows open, even though the snow might be two feet deep. This seemed to be the only way to control the epidemic, and Mr. Carey says that in all the tramping thru the snow of the country-side he never had even a cold.

This dear little man is deeply admired by all of us at Crest View for many reasons. Mostly, perhaps, because of the love and care he takes of the sweet little gal who is his wife. He has told us many times that she used to be the most beautiful blonde girl in all of Tennessee and Texas. He still thinks she is beautiful. Mrs. Carney was the daughter of a Country Doctor and one of ten children. I asked the Carneys where they met and Mrs. Carney said "He met me when I was old enough to start to school." The Carneys were married in 1905, rearing 2 daughters, having lost a third. The daughters are Mrs. Mavis Yantis of Rotan and Mrs. Lavonia Goodwin of Archer City. The Carneys have 2 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren. What a wonderful marriage!

NROTC Tests Offered Dec. 13

Applications for the Navy's twenty-fourth annual Regular NROTC qualification test are now available according to Mrs. Hamric, counselor, at the Fisher County Schools. This nationwide examination will be given on Dec. 13, and all eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations, and other factors, Mrs. Hamric explained, about 1,700 young men will enter the Regular NROTC Program as midshipmen at leading colleges and universities throughout the nation where NROTC Units are established. Male citizens of the United States who will be at least 17 but not yet 21 years old on June 30, 1970, and who are now high school seniors or recent graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examination next January and February.

A successful candidate receives financial aid for four years of college. This includes tuition and educational fees, books, uniforms, and \$50.00 per month subsistence allowance. After successfully completing baccalaureate degree requirements and naval training, graduates are commissioned as officers in the U. S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Regular NROTC midshipmen participate in three summer-at-sea training periods with various naval units. These periods assist them in learning about the variety of interesting and challenging opportunities available to them as naval or marine corps officers.

Registration for the test will close Nov. 14. The 1970 NROTC Bulletins containing eligibility requirements and qualifying test applications are available from Mrs. Hamric or the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station at Abilene.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

county agent column . . . before the grass supply is used. "Stocking rates are vitally important to the modern day rancher, and should be determined on the basis of forage available.

Moderate stocking rate means carrying only the number of livestock that can utilize about one-half the current season's forage production. The remaining half is used for maintenance of plant vigor, deep root system, cover to protect the soil from erosion, extreme temperatures, and influences deeper moisture penetration, and provide for efficient forage, livestock and wildlife production.

Keeping the livestock operation flexible is sound management. This means grazing only three-fourths as many animals as the range is expected to carry. This may also be termed as a low base herd.

During the good years when there is excess forage, calves can be kept for a longer period before marketing or purchases of other stock may be made to utilize the forage. During the dry years when forage is short, livestock should be culled and sold. When deer are grazing the area, the livestock rate must be adjusted in order to maintain forage required by the livestock and deer. Livestock and wildlife should not be in competition for the available forage.

Stocking rates should be based on the amount of forage available and not on the amount of rainfall that is expected for growing grass. A range inventory to determine stocking should be made during August or September and again at the beginning of the growing season. Livestock numbers should be adjusted at the time of the survey in order to maintain forage production. The main thing is to adjust livestock numbers

before the grass supply is used. Producers, through hedging can shift some of the risk of price change to others through the Futures Market. They can defend a price of a growing crop or defend a price of gain in storage for later sale.

Cattle feeders can defend the price of grain to be purchased in the future. Small amounts of capital are used to manage a grain inventory and the purchase price of grain futures can be used to project feed costs in cattle rations.

Grain elevators use futures trading to defend a price on their grain inventory—thus shifting some of the risk of price change to others. "Basis" is a must when using futures as a grain marketing tool.

The cash market, represents a supply-demand situation as it is at the present time, while the futures market evaluates the anticipated situation at a future date. The futures market is available

able to all people in order to reach trading objectives—to lessen risks, lower costs and make profits! These interactions with different objectives help in arriving at a price, a negotiated level of exchange.

We want to urge the public to come out and see the 4-H exhibits on display at the Agriculture Building in Roby Saturday. 4-H has a wide variety of project selection. Fisher County 4-H have done a good job with their projects and hope the public will visit with them Saturday and also have lunch.
