Lions Lose First Game of Season

Roby Lions suffered their first loss of the season last Friday when they met the Jayton Jaybirds in first district 6-B game of the season, for both teams.

Roby went into the game 5-0 and Jayton was 3-2 before their victory.

Johnny Perales, defensive end for the Lions, started the scoring when he intercepted a Jaybird pass and ran 55 yards for TD. An extra point pass failed.

Jayton came back to take the lead in the first quarter on an eight-yard run and a successful kick by Nichols, who made four Jaybird PAT kicks in all.

Jayton then went ahead in the second quarter when Nichols scored from the one. Roby bounced back to tie the game at 14-14 when full-back Dudley McClure scored from three yards out and tail-back Ray Douglas ran over the extra points.

Halftime then caught Roby in Jayton two-yard line.

Jayton scored in the third period on an 11-yard run.

Roby bounced back, scoring on a nine-yard pass from QB Barron Wetsel to end Bobby Holcomb, but an extra point run for two which would have put the Lions ahead, failed and Jaybirds kept the lead.

Jayton added final score of 48 yard run.

Rainy Season Continues

It's hard to realize, but most everyone is tired of rainy, muddy conditions. After one of the hottest, driest summers in a number of years, the exact opposite is occurring. Well above normal yearly rainfall has covered the area, but most of it came at the wrong time for crops. The 70-odd days of extreme heat and high winds did heavy damage to cotton and feed crops. When the rains came, most fields grew nice cotton plants, but little cotton. Some spots have good cotton and feed, but as a whole the crop is very short. Insect damage also was a big factor the last month.

Stockmen are in good condition moisture-wise, with the abundant moisture for the winter and most tanks have caught some water.

More of the same weather is forecast. Roby has reported 2.11 inches for 3-day period and Rotan 2.30.

Fred Byerly gives his station in Rotan, 3.02 for the past week and 24.73 for the year to date.

Mail Box Vandalism

Residents are asked to please be on the alert for mail box vandalism and report it immediately. Mail boxes are not toys for playful delinquents.

Pranksters and especially children who do not know better, should be made to realize the seriousness of their actions. A \$1,000 fine or a term in jail is enough to take the humor out of even a Halloween prank, and take all the fun out of deliberately destroying property belonging to someone else.

The law states that "whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any mail deposited therein shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

This applies to all mail boxes and the mail in them, even though the boxes are bought by citizens and are their personal property.

State F-U Prexy Spoke at Roby

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco addressed two meetings in Central West Texas this week. He spoke at the annual meeting of the Fisher County Farmers Union at Roby on Monday and at the Mitchell County Farmers Union annual meeting at Colorado City on Tuesday.

The annual meetings are customarily held preparatory to the state convention and the evening's program in both counties included the election of officers for the coming year, election of delegates to the state convention, and the adoption of resolutions to be taken to the State Convention.

The Texas Farmers Union state convention will be held at the Windsor Hotel in Abilene December 4-6.

The farm leader addressed both audiences on the status of farm legislation in Washington. He reviewed the history of the 1965 farm act, and described the present commodity programs as being "sound and a good base from which future legislation should be developed." He urged grass roots support for a bill introduced by Congressman Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls that would permanently extend present farm programs with some minor changes that would, according to Naman "strengthen the present programs."

Naman said that he interpreted Secretary Hardin's recommendations as a general endorsement of the type of programs which are now in effect. He commented that he felt the Administration was moving too slowly toward the development of specific legislation and expressed disappointment that Secretary Hardin's recommendations did not include specific farm income levels.

Naman said, "Rolling Plains farmer and the business communities that serve them will suffer serious economic dislocations if future farm programs do not spell out specific objectives for increased income for the basic commodities. I fear that the Secretary does not recognize the need for adequate supply management to strengthen cotton prices. The recent announcement by the Secretary increasing cotton acreage for 1970 is a tragic mistake. Without substantial increase in the payment level, it will result in added surplus and reduced cotton producer income."

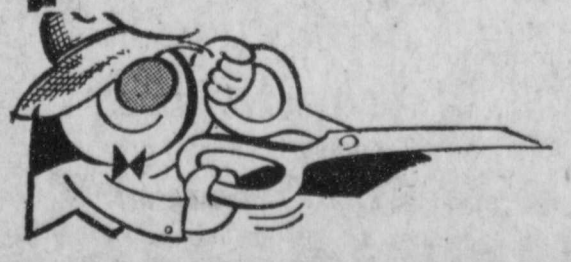

FORMER LONGWORTH MAN DIES IN ARLINGTON

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Lice that are on your cattle now are the ones that start the winter infestation. Since lice don't fly and they don't spend any time on the ground or in the brush, treatment of lousy cattle now will kill all of the lice that are on your cattle and the cattle will stay free of lice this winter unless they come in contact with a lousy animal.

Don't wait until your cattle are rubbing the fences down before you treat for lice. Treat cattle by a thorough spraying or a good dipping now before the weather gets bad and their hair gets long. If treatment for lice is put off until cattle are noticeably infested, the cattle have been weakened and the lice are more difficult to control.

Insecticides and application rates recommended for lice control on cattle are listed in the "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry," which is available in our office.

Before buying insecticides for spraying or dipping cattle, read the label on the insecticide container completely. Pay particular attention to warnings and restrictions listed on the label, check on waiting periods, especially if some treated cattle may be going to slaughter.

The "spinose" ear tick can be a serious pest of cattle and horses.

Larvae and nymphs feed deep within the folds of the outer ear fully engorging four times on the blood of the host over a period of one to seven or eight months. Only the larvae and nymphs are important parasites. The adults do not feed nor do they ever live on the host.

Animals infested with ear ticks are listless and dull and may lose weight rapidly. Ear infestation sometimes results from the irritation and inflammation and the animal may exhibit "gotch ear" symptoms. Heavy infestations frequently result in death especially to young neglected animals.

Control of the "spinose" ear tick can be obtained by

applying various pesticides into the outer ear.

Small cuts on trees or shrubs usually heal over quickly and treatment is not necessary.

But if the cut is over 1 inch in diameter, some protection should be given to prevent decay organisms or diseases from entering thru the wound.

The wounds should be painted with a water emulsion or a commercial tree wound dressing that contains an antiseptic. The antiseptic helps prevent the spread of organisms which contaminate the tree paint. Most garden supply stores have commercial preparations suitable for treating tree wounds.

Ordinary asphalt paint can be used if the wound is first swabbed with alcohol. If the wound is wet or "weeping," it may be necessary to wait until it dries before applying the dressing.

Do not use tar or creosote compounds for tree wounds. They are toxic to the cambium layer beneath the bark and may prevent the wound from healing over.

It is best to keep an unbroken film or dressing over the pruning wound. One coat of tree wound dressing should last 2 or 3 years. On larger wounds it may be necessary to re-coat them several times while they are healing over.

Interest in swine production is increasing over the Rolling Plains and Fisher County. Due to this a three-county Swine Shortcourse is being planned for Fisher, Jones and Haskell Counties sponsored by county program building committees and the extension service. The meetings will be held in Stamford the second week in December. More will be carried on this later.

DAR Hears Of Dedication

Members of Nancy Harper Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution met recently in the home of Mrs. Earl Thomason in Sweetwater. Miss Delila Baird, Chapter Regent, presided. The opening prayer was voiced by Mrs. James W. Watson; and Pledge to the Flag of the U. S. A. was led by Mrs. L. T. Nelson. Mrs. C. M. Arbaugh read the Message from the President General. The regular National Defense report was presented by the chapter chairman, Mrs. J. R. Strayhorn.

A brief report was given by those attending the Dedication the Douglas MacArthur Academy of Freedom in Brownwood. It was also reported that Mrs. W. E. Towson, Mrs. Wade Forester, and Miss Delila Baird attended the State DAR Division Workshop in Odessa. This meeting is held annually in the fall by state officers and committee chairmen.

Mrs. Nelson, chapter program chairman, introduced Mrs. J. W. Watson who reviewed "The DAR Story." The speaker stated that in order to enjoy DAR membership, you should know its policy, procedure and objectives. She reminded the group that the three-fold objectives are the same as when it was organized in 1890 and created by Act of Congress in 1895—historical, educational, and patriotic. These objectives are pursued through extensive action programs and projects.

The NSDAR is classified as an educational, nonprofit organization because its fundamental aim is to promote good citizenship through education. Participation in youth programs sponsored by DAR is voluntary, and winners of awards are chosen by local citizens. All such programs are planned to promote leadership, patriotism, service and dependability.

The National Society maintains important educational facilities at its National Headquarters in Washington D. C. that are open to the public. These are the Museum of American Decorative Arts, with 28 period rooms and free guide service; the Americana Collection of historical documents; a Genealogical Library, founded in 1896, with a highly specialized collection of some 56,000 books, pamphlets and microfilm on American history, genealogy, and biography, many in manuscript form available nowhere else. Constitution Hall, the Society's auditorium, has been made available to the public for almost 40 years, constituting a tangible contribution to the cultural and educational life of the Nation's Capital, as no similar facility exists in Washington, D. C.

The National Society maintains two DAR schools and give financial aid to five others on an approved list. The two DAR schools are Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee. The Organization contributes about \$250,000 annually to these schools in addition to many scholarships and grants.
