Are Being Increased

from Snyder Daily News in regard to water rate increase in Snyder. This is caused partly by construction program of the \$33 million Robert Lee Dam.

The Robert Lee Dam project appears to be a very wise move of Colorado River Municipal Water District, as it will assure all cities of the district additional supply. Lake J.B. Thomas, present supply for CRMWD is far below normal, and as the article states there is no immediate need for alarm, but the district could be introuble should spring rains miss the Lake as they have done for several years.

Rotan buys municipal water from Snyder and is very fortunate to have assurance of reserve at Robert Lee. The Article from the News:

"If you are an "average customer, " your water bill in Snyder is going up about eight per cent in April.

The city council last night approved new rates reflecting increases handed the city earlier by the Colorado River Municipal Water District. Both the city's fixed charge and its rate per 1,000 gallons of water were increased by CRMWDeffective Jan. 1 this year. This followed a construction program costing over \$33 million involving erection of the Robert Lee Dam and building of Lake E. V. Spence, plus pipelines, pump stations and other equipment required to produce water for member cities from that source.

Snyder's minimum rate to its customers will remain at \$3. 50 which pays for the first 3,000 gallons of water used in a month. The rate for the next 272,000 gallons will increase from 35 cents per 1,000 to 42 cents per1,000 gallons. For customers wich use more than 275,000 gallons the rate above that figure will increase from 30 cents per 1,000 gallons to

We take the following article 35 cents per 1,000. In the past two years the cit has had increases in its payments to CRMWD of 27.6 per cent. Until the current action none of this had been passed along to the consumer. In fact, the city rates have been

changed only once since 1953 when it began taking water from CRMWD.

Rates to outside users will be hiked in proportion to those for city consumers.

Before taking action on the rates, the council conferred with Snyder's representatives on the CRMWD board. The four CRMWD-board members, W. A. McGlaun, Dr. John Blum, Rex Fields and Lyle Defferbach, said they believed the district had reached a plateau in its requirements for additional funds. They noted that one bond issue will be paid off in 1973. The cost of the Robert Lee project was originally pegged at \$30 million but rising costs of materials and construction work, plus higher interest rates on bonds,

Also the board members noted that Snyder's rate fluctuated ula of the district.

City councilmen noted that Snyder still was able to offer its consumers lower rates than the other two cities, Big Spring and Odessa. The CRMWD board members assured that despite the fact that surface supplies are far below normal, there is no im-



Some, no doubt, have made rental contracts with landlords that call for a cash payment for each acre of land to be farmed. These landlords, if they have not already been paid, will want their money before the year is

Others have either bought or leased cotton acreage from other farmers, depending on their cotton payment to help offset the cost of the lease or the price paid for the allotment. These leases or purchases of allotments had to be completed by December 31 of 1969, and the terms of the contracts signed will have to be met whether USDA makes payments on the projected yields assigned in November or on some project-

ed yield USDA decides later would be "more equitable". ASCS gives a couple of reasons for the pending reduction of projected yields. One has to do

with a revised procedure for appealing projected yields for farmers who were completely hailed out or suffered a total crop loss from some other disasterinone or more of the years 1966,1967,or1968. The new regulation permits these farmers to substitute their 1970 projected yield for the year in which the crop was lost in computing their three year actual yield

average. The change is good. It made projected yields more realistic. But it left some counties with insufficient pounds to make the required adjustments.

Secondly, the State ASCS Committee says county ASCS offices in some instances failed to withhold enough pounds in reserve for making adjustments for those farmers who were able to prove a yield high er than that assigned by the Committee.

AN ORDINACE RELATING TO DISPOSAL OF DEAD AMINALS AND ANIMAL OFFALS:

Be it Ordained and Enacted by the City Commission of the City of Roby of the County of Fisher, of the State of Texas: Section 1: That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association, or corporation to dispose of animal offals or dead aminals in or near the dump ground of the City of Roby, Fisher County, Texas.

Section 2: That any person, firm, association, or corporation convicted of a violation of this ordinace shall be subject to a fine in the City Court of Roby, Fisher County, Texas of not more than one hundred and no/100 dollars for each offense.

Section 3: That should any part of this ordinance be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining parts whall be severable and shall continue to be in full force and effect.

Section 4: That all ordinances conflicting with provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as the same affect this ordinance.

Section 5: That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after March 1, 1970.


