servation District. With assistance provided by the Soil Conservation Service personnel in Rotan, terraces were planned for the land and a cropping system planned which would maintain the fertility of the soil and protect against wind erosion. About 3 or 4 years ago 15 acres of rangeland was cleared and put back into cultivation. Mr. Govan plans to terrace this piece of land. The 1970 plans call for about 35 acres of cotton and the remainder in high residue producing feed crops and some garden crops. He is also feeding about 48 hogs. Mr. Govan pointed out, ting up payments on a series of "I raise my own sows, breed

them and feed out the pigs. ' H. Govan is symbolic of the individual who conquered their many problems to achieve their ultimate goals. Mr. Govan shined shoes for many years at a Rotan barber shop, and he knows practically everyone in town. He points out, "I was wanting to buy some land and this one individual had told me several times that he would help me buy some land. One day I told him that I want to show him a piece of land north of Roby. After we looked at the land he buy it. I sure felt low: I didn't know where I would get the money to buy the land. 

Some years ago merchangs conceived and put into operation an idea called " The lay- away plan. " The merchant agreed to hold certain merchandise with the prevision that the customer make payments until a specified date at which time the article or articles would be released for the use and enjoyment of the buyer. Many have profited by this plan by the grace of the owner of the business.

We do not want to imply that the matter of eternal life is a commercial transaction. We cannot pay for it nor any of the joys that go with it, and yet it is true that the Lord initiated a "layaway plan" for the benefits of all who obey Him, long before man ever tried such an idea in the business world. It was Paul, peerless preacher and patient prisoner, who wrote in his final letter shortly before his death, "Henceforce there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love His appearing." (II Tim. 4:8) So, all who "Love His appearing" have a crown on "the lay- away plan. " Only those who do the Lord's will could love His appearing. Those who fail to do His will would surely dread His appearing. It will be time for judgment, and too late for mercy, at His second coming.

Jesus Christ, our Lord, said, "In my Father's house are many mansions. . . . I go to prepare a place for you. . . "(John 14:23) "If ye love Me, keep My commandments." (John 14:15) All who keep His commandments have a mansion on "the Lay- away Plan." To encourage us to profit by this plan, Jesus also said, "Lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where theives do not break through nor steal; for where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. (Matt. 6:20, 21) We might lose things on the "lay-away plan" here, but the heavenly "lay-away" is safe and secure.

applications of 2, 4, 5- T consist of one-half to one pound 2, 4, 5-T L.V.E. plus one gallon of diesel oil pus enough water to make a total of four gallons of solution per acre. If foliar spraying is done on an individual plant basis, the plants should be thoroughly wet with a mixture of three pounds of 2, 4, 5-7 L. V. E. in 100 gallons of water plus two to eight ounces of surfactant as needed for wetting agent.

The time for spraying mesquite is rapidly approaching and plans for getting the job done should be made wll in advance. Now is the time to put your equipment in working order or to make arrangements with a contractor to have the job done. Most contractors prefer to have their work scheduled no later than May 1, so make plans accordingly.

Brush control itself is not a cure-all. Excessive grazing following brush control has been disastrous for many operators. Brush control should be considered as a tool used in obtaining maximum forage production which in turn is a product of good range management. Plans for mesquite control should include a growing season's deferment plus proper stocking in the future. This type of management results in increased forage

for use on rangelands. Aerial a household pest. In the spring beetles that entered buildings in the fall to hibernate, become active and can be found throught the house. However, they usually are most abundant around the windows. In large numbers these beetles can be a real nuisance. The damage caused is limited to staining the curtains, rugs or upholstery. To control these beetles. hibernation areas should be located. These beetles commonly hibernate in areas such

as attics and wall voids. Hibernating beetles can be killed easily with household sprays containing chlordane or pyrethrum. If it is not possible to locate all hibernating places, household sprays of chlordane, diazinon or lindane should be applied to baseboards, windows, and door frames where beetles may enter the interior of the

building. Control of elm leaf beetles during the spring and summer will cut down on the number of adults entering hibernation quarters. However, in areas where there are a large number of elms this approach may be impractical. To treat larger trees high pressure, high volume sprayers are required. Materials that will give effective control are carbaryl (Sevin), chlordane, dieldrin or toxaphene. Insecticides should be applied just after the eggs hatch in May while the larvae are small; another application may be re-

quited at midsummer just after he second generation larvae atch. When using these and other

insecticides, read and follow the directions given on the insecticide label carefully.

Beautiful lawns don't happen. They are the product of good praining and management, including the use of the proper grass, fertilizing, mowing, watering, in some instances drainage and disease and insect control.

A deadline is at hand and that

#### 

is a spring application of a complete fertilizer. It should be made about the time the grass begins to grow. The fall application, again of a complete fertilizer, should be made about 30 days before the average date of the first frost. Generally, a fertilizer with a 1-1-1 or a 2-1-1 ration should be used and applied at the rate of 2 pounds of actual nigrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn.

Bermuda, Saint Augustine and

Zoysia lawns should also receive 1 pound of actual nitrogen per 1, 000 square feet every 30 to 40 days during the growing season to keep them green and vigorously growing.

Nitrogen is the key element in turf production. It produces vegetative growth and gives the plant a deep green color. Phosphorous stimulates development of a good root system and potassium affects the physiological processes of the plant.

A nitrogen deficiency causes stunted plant growth. The leaves are relatively small, thin and yellowish green to yellow, re-

sulting in a condition often referred to as "firing." Phosphorus deficiency causes sion growth of the entire plant and unhealthy dark green colored leaves. Potassium deficiency causes stunted growth with the entire plant eventually drying up and taking on a brownish color.
