## Immunization Set In Rotan Schools

The following is a schedule of immunization for Rotan Public Schools.

Due to new state regulations Typhoid will no longer be given - although it should still be recommended that it be obtained from the family physician for those living in rural area.

April 15, Diphtheria-Pertussis - Tetanus (any combination)  
April 22, Smallpox  
April 29, Diphtheria-Pertussis - Tetanus  
May 6, Skin Test  
May 13, Diphtheria-Pertussis Tetanus

All immunizations are to be given in the basement of the East Wing of the hospital, beginning at 1:30 P. M.

Only one immunization will be given at a time and only the one listed. If a pupil is unable to take the vaccine because of illness, etc., he will be allowed to take it on

the Friday afternoon following, if accompanied by a note from his principal.

The TB skin test will be given to all first and seventh grades, all previous reactors, and to all new students in the system. If a pupil has redness or swelling at the site of the Tuberculin Skin Test, he should be seen by a school nurse 2 days following the test for evaluation, a record of the reaction reading recorded by the nurse and any recommendations for further evaluation to be turned over to the family physician.

Latest recommendations for boosters are as follows:

- (1) Diphtheria-Pertussis-Tetanus, . . . . every 10 years
- (2) Smallpox, . . . . every 10 years

A charge of 50¢ per shot will be made which will be collected at the time the shot is given only.


Fisher County Young Farmers will meet April 20 at Midwest R. E. A. in Roby at 7:30 p. m.

### Be Patient Your Census Taker Is Coming

Richard R. Newton, District Manager, reports that the 1970 Census of Population and Housing is nearing completion in the area, that in about another week the census takers should have visited every residence on their lists.

Census takers began visiting households on April 1 and have been working continuously to cover their territories. The District Manager asks that householders hold their questionnaires, which were delivered prior to April 1, and have them filled out, ready for the census taker to pick up. This will save time for both the householder and the census taker and speed up the completion of the census.

For every fifth household, the census taker will have a longer questionnaire which she will fill out by interviewing a member of the household. The District Manager asks householders to welcome these census takers when they call and to give them full cooperation in getting the required information.

Most of the census takers are women. Each wears a red, white, and blue identification badge which is her official credential. It bears her signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a Census Enumerator, and has sworn to keep confidential all census information given her.



**COUNTY AGENT NEWS**

One farmer produces the food and fiber consumed by 42 of his fellow citizens and his efficiency continues to improve.

Yet urban Americans, who make up approximately 94 percent of the population are often unaware that agriculture is still a "cornerstone of life".

Many children may think milk originates in a carton, that meat and poultry begin their trip to market wrapped in plastic, and that cotton shirts grow that way.

The producer of these goods and agriculture is the U. S.'s largest industry and employs more workers than any other industry.

Agriculture is a principal source of new wealth in America. Each dollar of wealth taken from the soil yields about \$7 of income throughout the rest of the economy.

Roses and many other ornamental plants are attacked by aphids. Large numbers of aphids feeding on a plant gangreathly mar its beauty, prevent growth and cause its death.

Aphids, commonly known as plant lice, are soft-bodied, pear-shaped insects and are usually 1/25 to 1/8 of an inch long. These insects vary in color from light yellow to green or black.

Through their short, stout beak aphids suck plant juices from the plants greatly devastating them. The leaves of plants on which aphids are feeding become curled, cupped or distorted. When the flower buds or roses fail to develop properly the aphids are feeding on the growing tips and flower buds of the plants.

Many species of aphids excrete a colorless, sticky honeydew which attracts ants. This honeydew may be a medium for the growth of black fungus or sooty mold which may cause further damage to the plant.

Aphids can be controlled by treating the affected plants with Sevin, diazinon, cygon, lindane, malathion, nicotine sulfate, or with a new granular systemic disulfoton. Disulfoton is being marketed under various trade names. Read and follow directions on the label carefully when using insecticides.

Competition for efficient workers is forcing more farmers to mechanize and automate more and more of their production processes.

The further the advance with mechanization and automation, the greater the skill required of workers who run the machines and, subsequently, the greater the competition for effective workers.

This combination of ever-increasing investment in productive equipment and workers makes it harder and harder for every farmer to own his own machines and keep his individual full-time workers.

The situation, therefore, is forcing an increasing number of farm jobs to be done by commercial hire or automatic equipment.

Such an arrangement can allow many part-time farmers to continue a profitable farm enterprise and allow full-time farmers to concentrate on their main enterprise.

However, the effective use of commercial hire for farm machines cannot happen without replanning of jobs and job requirements by both the farmer and the commercial operator. For such a system cannot be turned off and on like a light switch. All concerned parties must have a working schedule which will permit getting the farm job done at the right time and in the desired way.

If you find your cedar trees covered with a slimy orange substance, they are infected with a fungus disease known

as cedar apple rust. Jerral Johnson, Extension plant pathologist, says the organism is rather unique in that it lives for two years on cedar and one on apple trees. Chemical controls have not proved effective but by removing the galls before they mature, prevention of the jelly-like substance can be achieved. If the substance has formed, it can be washed away with a high pressure stream of water.

Watch Baby Pigs for Signs of Hog Cholera---- Officials of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service say Farmers often may not suspect hog Cholera because of the length of the time between possible exposure to hog cholera and signs of the disease. Because of lengthy "incubation" period, this is a particularly treacherous means of hog cholera spread.

**City Ordinance**

ORDINANCE NO. \_\_\_\_\_

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE LOCATION OF SPECIFIED PLACES WITHIN THE CITY DUMP GROUND FOR THE DUMPING OF WASTE REFUSE, TRASH, RUBBISH AND OTHER SUBSTANCES, AND FOR THE PLACEMENT AND DISPOSAL OF THE CARCASSES OF DEAD ANIMALS; AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO FIX A TIME FOR OPENING AND CLOSING OF SAID DUMP GROUND; PROHIBITING SCAVENGING; PROHIBITING BURNING OF SUBSTANCES WITHIN THE CITY DUMP GROUND; PROVIDING FOR CHARGES FOR THE USE OF THE CITY DUMP GROUND FOR THE DISPOSAL OF TRASH OR RUBBISH NOT ORIGINATING WITHIN THE CITY OF ROTAN; PROVIDING FOR PUNISHMENT BY FINE NOT EXCEEDING \$100.00 FOR VIOLATIONS; REQUIRING PUBLICATION OF A DESCRIPTIVE CAPTION OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE:

Section 1: The mayor of the City of Rotan shall cause a sign or signs to be erected within the city dump ground specifying a place for the dumping of all waste, refuse, trash, rubbish and other substances, and it shall be unlawful for any person to dump such waste, refuse, trash, rubbish and other substances at any place within the city dump ground other than the place designated and specified by such sign or signs.

Section 2: The mayor of the City of Rotan shall cause a sign or signs to be erected within the city dump ground specifying a place for the dumping of the carcasses of dead animals, and it shall be unlawful for any person to dump such carcasses of dead animals at any place within the city dump ground other than the place designated and specified by such sign or signs.

Section 3: The mayor is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to fix a time for closing and opening said city dump ground, which hours may be adjusted from season to season by said mayor, and the mayor shall cause such hours to be posted at the entrance of said city dump ground. It shall be unlawful for any person to enter upon said city dump ground except during the hours specified by said mayor and posted pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 4: It shall be unlawful for any person to enter upon the city dump grounds for the purpose of removing therefrom any object or thing of any kind or character, irrespective of value, and it shall be unlawful for any person to remove any item previously deposited in such dumping ground, or to load the same for the purpose of removing such item from said dumping ground.

Section 5: It shall be unlawful for any person to burn, or cause to be burned, any rubbish, debris, trash, or other deteriorative matter within the limits of the city dump grounds.

Section 6: It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit any waste, refuse, trash, rubbish, debris, or any other thing not originating within the city limits of the City of Rotan, Texas, unless the person depositing such rubbish, debris, trash, or other deteriorative matter shall have paid a fee for the use of such city dump grounds as follows:

- 1) Carloads, pickup loads or loads hauled upon a trailer less than nine feet in length, 50¢ per load.
- 2) All other loads \$2.00

Section 7: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any such amount not to exceed \$100.00.

Section 8: The caption of this ordinance shall be published by the city secretary in one issue of the Rotan Advance. Such publication shall be in the first issue after passage of this ordinance.

Section 9: This ordinance shall become effective immediately after publication as provided in Section 8 above.

### As It Looks From Here

Omar Burleson, M. C. 17th District, Texas

The 14th Amendment to our Constitution has been the launching pad for many controversial Supreme Court decisions in recent years. Just a few days ago it entered another dimension unheard of or imagined. It embraced the extraordinary idea that an individual can claim welfare payments as a "property" right even when his eligibility to receive payments from the Government is under question. The 14th Amendment provides that no entity of government can deprive persons of life, liberty and property without due process of law. The Court by a 5 to 3 vote decided that welfare payments were a part of the individual's "property" and they can not be removed from the welfare rolls without a court hearing. There is little doubt that a Government attorney will be furnished to represent the individual, although in other instances it is illegal for those in Government to represent a client having a claim against the Government. The ruling strikes at the heart of the concept that welfare programs are an instrument of charitable support. Instead, the decision portrays the collection of welfare benefits as an established property right. In a dissent, Justice Hugo Black said "Government's promise of charity expressed in our welfare programs considered to be a property right, strains credulity." An immediate consequence of the ruling will not only add to the already staggering cost of welfare but will lead to endless hearings before courts already burdened with overloaded dockets. In the meantime, those found ineligible by those responsible for such a determination will continue to be paid. The elevation of public welfare into an obligation of the Government to support every citizen is in danger of being written even more explicit into our laws when the Nixon Administration's "Family Assistance Plan" is enacted by the Congress. The administration's proposal assures every family that its income, for what ever reason, will not fall below a specified level. Once people are on the welfare rolls, under the Court's ruling it will be extremely difficult for them to be removed, even though it is determined by local welfare administrators that their eligibility has ceased to exist. It will discourage efforts to remove those found to disqualify for whatever reason. It is not a matter of not being responsive to the genuine needs of unfortunate people. The American people have always responded in helping those who can not help themselves. Cities, counties, states, the Federal Government plus countless private agencies, groups and organizations, provided aid to genuinely needy people. True charity is one thing but a Court's decision which says it is guaranteed under the Constitution removes the moral concept of charity and places those who are unwilling to work in a position to claim public money as a property right. It gives the lazy and shiftless a right alongside those in genuine need and who are unable to support themselves. The Court's decision is a violation of the property rights of the American taxpayer who is required to contribute a goodly portion of his earnings to those who have no inclination to better themselves. The decision denies property rights to men and women who get up every morning and go to their jobs. The Court's action has the effect of confiscating property through taxation to be handed out in the name of charity which brings us to the point where there is no charitable duty or obligation except that of the Government where there is no moral concept except that which is set by the Government--no conscience but state convenience. She was a member of Calvary Baptist Church.



### "Ye Shall Know The Truth"

#### Religious, But Wrong!

One of the most forcefully taught truths in all of God's word is that NOT ALL WHO ARE RELIGIOUS ARE RIGHT!

The Apostle Paul wrote to the Romans: "Brethren, my heart's desire and my supplication to God is for Israel, that they may be saved. For I bear them witness that they have a zeal for God, but not according to knowledge. For being ignorant of God's righteousness, and seeking to establish their own, they did not subject themselves to the righteousness of God" (Rom. 10:1-3).

Paul's concern for the Jews was not aroused as a result of their not being religious, but as a result of their being wrong religiously. They were ignorant of God's plan, or way, of justifying man and sought to establish their own. They were RELIGIOUS, but THEY WERE RELIGIOUSLY WRONG, and subsequently LOST.

Men often attempt to justify themselves in some activity or act of worship, not authorized by the word of God, one the basis of being religious and sincerely so. They try to commend themselves to Divine favor by holding to their own traditions rather than by submitting to Divine instruction. In doing so they fall into the same snare as the Jews of Paul's time.

Paul's instruction to the Corinthian was that they "learn not to go beyond the things which are written" (I Cor. 4:6, ADV), and this is the lesson we would impress upon you today. John warned, "Whoever goeth onward and abideth not in the teaching of Christ hath not God" (2 Jn. 9). Jesus did not come into the world to make men religious for men have always been religious, but He came to make them right religiously. He declared, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free" (Jn. 8:32). Would you be so wise and courageous as to forsake that for which there is no authority in God's Word? WILL YOU STRIVE NOT ONLY TO BE RELIGIOUS, BUT ALSO TO BE RIGHT RELIGIOUSLY? Only then can "We know that we know Him" (1 Jn. 2:3).

Due to state regulations, Typhoid will no longer be given. It should still be recommended that it be obtained from the family physician.

Only one immunization will be given at a time and only the one listed. If a pupil is unable to take the vaccine because of illness, he will be allowed to take it on the Friday afternoon following, if accompanied by a note from the principal.

All immunizations are to be given in the basement of the East Wing of the hospital, beginning at 1:30 p. m. A charge of 50¢ per shot will be made which will be collected at the time the shot is given only.



### Tax Man Sam Sez'

WHEN WILL I GET MY REFUND?

It's a pretty good guess that the Taxpayer Service Representatives at the Internal Revenue Service could give you an accurate date even if they had completely lost their calendar. The questions have changed this past week from "How do I get an extension to delay filing my income tax return?" to "When do I get my refund?"

The Taxpayer Service Representatives have a good answer for you on "When do I get my refund?"--As you would guess, the answer is "It depends." If you filed your return before April 1 and made no errors to hold up the processing, the chances are good that you will have to wait about 6 weeks for that refund check if one is due.

If you filed as a member of the 11:59 p. m. April 15 club, your chances for having an error that will delay your refund are real good. If you have an error, you will get your refund about 6 weeks after Internal Revenue has got back the correct information from you and had a chance to correct the errors. How long this will be is probably indefinite. If you did manage to join the 11:59 p.m. April 15 club, and still escape without an error, getting your refund will take a little bit longer than for the taxpayers who filed earlier. Be assured that you can't drop by and pick up the refund on April 16 or 17. IRS hasn't quite got all of the returns out of the mail bag by this time.



### Accent On Health

Extra bonus for prompt action on your part! Yours absolutely free--well, almost free--a premise with no mosquitoes.

You can have this mosquito--free home and yard if you'll spend just a little of your time in a do-it-yourself vector control program, says the Texas State Department of Health.

In addition to eliminating mosquitoes, you also can free your premises of flies and rodents with a little extra precaution. The cost can be just a little effort on your part.

Spring is the time of year when mosquitoes start breeding. So take an inventory of your property. Walk around the outside of the house and take a good look. What do you see? Did you notice whether the gutters were level and not sagging? Mosquitoes like to breed in the water that collects in sagging or stopped up gutters. Just a few minutes time on your part will eliminate this breeding site.

How many bottles, cans, tires, or other water-holding containers are partially hidden under the shrubs? These provide more breeding places for mosquitoes.

You may be surprised to know that most people grow the mosquitoes that bite them. Since most of the water-holding containers are valueless, again it is a simple matter to place them in the garbage pick up.

Should you have a container you want to keep, place it in a shed so it won't collect water. Mosquitoes won't breed on your premise if you don't leave any water standing around. If there's a knothole in one of your trees, it can be plugged with cement mortar, roofing tar, or anything that will keep the water out.

routine of washing the watering bowl a couple of times a week. And while you are at it, you should clean the bird-bath the same number of times. This will also keep the growth of algae down and tend to do away with that ugly green, slimy look.

Since mosquitoes always develop in water, it would be well to stock your fish pond or lily pond with gambusia (top-water minnows) or goldfish. The fish will eat the wiggle-tails.

Anything you can do to eliminate mosquitoes will be to your advantage since the insects are a nuisance and can cause disease.
