## Roby-Rotan Phone Merge Proposed To Council

Mr. Bud McCasland of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. presented to the Rotan City Council a proposed merger of Rotan and Roby telephone systems. If such merger should come to pass new rates would be as follows: One party residential connection \$6.50 per month and extensions \$1.25 per extension. Two party connections \$5.10 per month and extensions \$1.25 per extension. Business 1 party lines \$14.50 per month and \$1.75 per extension. This being a 24% increase to residential connect-

ions and 50% increase to business connections.

Mr. McCasland stated the construction of lines and equip ther purchase of Christmas ment would be completed in approximately two years after passage by Rotan City Council. The above rates would not begin until construction is completed. Also. Mr. McCasland indicated there would be a rate increase requested by the telephone company sometime in 1970, since there had not been a rate increase since 1959, if this merger proposal did not materialize.





## COUNTY AGENT

Interest in rose gardening often wanes during the hot summer because of the decline in flower quality. But proper care will insure attractive foliage and an abundance of flowers throughout the fall and early Roses are heavy users of plant

nutrients and require regular applications of fertilizer for optimum growth. The first application of a balanced fertilizer should be made in the spring as new growth starts. and at a rate of one and a fourth pounds per 100 square feet. The soil should be moist at the time of application, Spread it over the surface, work it into the soil and then thoroughly water the rose bed. A repeat application should be made at six to eight week in-

For optimum growth and flower production, avoid moisture deficiency of over-watering. Frequency of watering depends upon the soil type, climatic conditions, growth state and development. A soaker hose is suggested because this method keeps the moisture off the leaves. Soak the soil to a depth of 8 to 10

A two-inch layer of mulching material, such as pine straw, cotton burrs, shredded bark, sugar cane pulp, granulated peat moss or other loose organic material, is suggested as an excellent cultural practice. The mulch will conserve moisture, reduces weed growth and insulates the soil against heat.

Disease and insect control are very important, Blackspot and mildew, the two major rose diseases can be prevented, by starting a spray schedule as soon as new growth starts in the spring. The application should be repeated at 7 to 10-day intervals throughout the growing season. A careful check of rose plants will reveal when insect measures are needed.

The spent flowers should be removed from the plants. Otherwise, food and energy are spent on useless seed production. Strong basal shoots arising from the bud union or just above it should be retained. Time spent in the rose garden will paybig dividends later in the year and in following years.

### **Legal Notice**

The increasing dog problem is a constant complaint to the City Office and the Police Department. This problem is getting to ghe point where people cannot walk down the sidewalks without being attacked or threatened with attack by dogs belonging to home owners or stray dogs. Too, trash cans are being overturned and the contents strown in alleys causing an unsightly and unhealthy nuisance.

Most of the citizens of Rotan are aware of a dog ordinance which requires all dogs to be vaccinated and licensed. The ordinance sets the license fee at \$1.00 for male dogs and \$1.50 for female dogs over the age of six months, this fee to be paid to the city tax assessor-collector each year.

Also, the dog ordinance instructs the Police Chief, Health Officer, or Poundmaster to impound all dogs which do not have a dog immunization tag and license. If after three days, the dogs are not reclaimed, they shall be destroyed. To reclaim all impounded dogs, the owner shall pay a fee of \$1.00 per day for each dog and immediately have said dog vaccinated for rabies and licensed. Any person violating the provisions of the dog ordinance shall be fined not exceeding fifty dollars (50.00) provided the dogs are not in transient through the city.

But Jesus said that the sin-conscious publican was justified rather than the self-righteous Pharisee (Lk. 18:9). A dozen disciples in Ephesus were evidently satisfied with their religion adn yet their baptism was not valid and they had to be baptized again (Acts 19:1-5). Heaven's warning is, "There is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the ends thereof are the ways of death" (Pro. 14:12).

It shouldn't be difficult to know if our religion is acceptable with God. He has given us the Divine plan to go by, thus, let us measure our religion by the New Testament. If our religion conforms to Divine specifications then God is satisfied. If not, we should not be satisfied in religion with less that it takes to satisfy God. After all it is to Him that we shall give an account in the judgment (Rom. 14:12).

Dear Reader: Is God satisfied with your religion? Is God satisfied with your manner of life? Let us, with the apostle Paul, "make it our aim-to be well pleasing to Him" (2 Cor. 5:9).






