



Most farm workers in Fisher County and even in the State of Texas will not come under the "Minimum Wage" provisions because most farmers do not have 500 or more mandays of qualified farm labor in any calendar quarter. But competition from those farmers under the minimum wage law and from non-farm jobs has forced wages above the

minimum leve. Keeping good reliable farm workers requires good labor relations, good working conditions and benefits comparable with other job opportunities. Farmers who want to attract and keep good qualified workers may need to review

what is being offered. The relationship between workers and employers may be improved by keeping the worker informed on matters that concern him by providing good buildings and equipment to work with and by assigning jobs they are best qualified

Vacations and time off are important to the workers. Advance planning can reduce much of the need for irregular hours in farming. Adequate and comfortable housing, a pay scale competitive for the area and incentive payment plans will contribute much to maintaining a productive and stable farm work force.

#### Child Care Laws **Explained**

Any person who offers care to unrelated children either inher own home or a facility for a fee is reminded of existing licensing laws. The State Welfare Department is the designated agency to work with any facility where parents leave

Every community is concerned about children in their midst, especially so when some tragedy happens to a child either due to an accident or to negligence on the part of an adult on whom the child depends to protect him.

Parents who must work, or who for other reasons cannot care for their children during any part of a day, need the assurance their children are receiving adequate care. They need the assurace that physical needs are met and a wholesome atmosphere is prevailing. The responsibility of caring for other people's children is great, when one considers the number of hours each day that a child is away from the guidance and care of his own parents.

Licensing of homes, Day Care Centers, Convalescent homes and Institutions resulted because of community concern. The Texas Licensing laws

place the responsibility of obtaining a license on the individual who plans to offer child care. There is no charge for the license or for the services of any worker who helps to interpret the law. This service includes helping the applicant meet minimum standards in all areas of the planned program. Such areas as sufficient staff per number of children, daily activities, suitable equipment for different age levels, health and nutritional protection are considered. There is also assistance from local fire and sanitation departments. Offering counsel in these areas is a continuing responsibility of the licensing service.

When minimum standards are met, a license is issued which remains valid until rescinded or revokes. Once each year a re-evaluation study is made to determine if minimum standards still prevail.

The Licensing worker for your community is Bernice Beaver, PWW I, State Welfare Department, 317 Pecan, Abilene. You may call or write her and request assistance in meeting standards to qualify for a license. Those persons who do quality for a license value it for it represents to any parent, "Here is a safe, satisfactory place for your child. "

#### Biological Clocks

Now and again the fact that our bodies have mysterious but real biological clocks, living processes that deal with time, makes news.

Our moon astronauts, for example, have had to cope with the problem of their bodies' clocks and resetting them to be in time and tune with the long voyage to the moon, the upsets to their biological rhythms of the trip, and the physical needs of the work periods on During a moon shot.

astronauts "reset" largely by shifting around their times for sleeping, resting, and working during the journey. Their normal daily cycles of rest or sleep and being awake are thrown off, of course, just as are those of today's jet-plane travelers when they fly far and fast and change the usual 24-hour rhythm of living.

The timing of events within man's body involves a rhythmic scheduling that appears to be important to mental as well as physical well-being. This is why the National Institute of Mental Health conducts and supports an important body of basic and clinical research investigating a wide range of biological rhythm problems in both animals and humans.

Until not long ago, few instruments were available for detecting rhythmic changes in man or for analyzing the tremendous amounts of data necessary in "time" studies. The computer and electronic data systems help in handling the vast amounts of necessary data.

At Rockland State Hospital in New York and at the University of Minnesota, NIMH grantees have developed instruments and methods that make the study of rhythms in man's blood-chemistry feasible.

Throughout history it has been known that man showed some kind of daily cycle of activity and rest, usually called "circadian rhythm" from the Latin, "circa dies," meaning "about a day." But it is only recently that scientific interest has expanded into what is now a most promising area of mental health research.

It may turn out that the role of timing in health and illness ; is of critical or essential nature and, hopefully, that measures to help our biological clocks can be found. In any case, it is beginning to look as if, as one writer puts it, time is as ; much the stuff we are made of as is the tissue of our bones, blood, and brain. . . . . . . . .

boating enthusiasm is now in full swing. But those enjoyable occasions out at the lake or stream could turn into catastrophe unless a few simple rules are followed. The Texas State Department of Health reminds you that a safe summer of excitement and fun is in your

All fishermen---experts and novices alike --- should know how to seim, should know basic first aid, and have a first aid kit with them. Since fish hooks sometimes "catch" anglers as well as fish, carry needlenose pliers, wire cutters, and pocket knife in your tackle box. Always keep hooks in covered containers. Always look before casting, and make certain you have room to do so without hooking someone else. Use an overhead cast when in a boat with others. It's much safer to fish with a companion, but when fishing alone, always leave word where you will be and when you plan to return. Wear thick-soled boots in densely wooded or marshy areas. Do not wear waders while in a boat, Wade cautiously to avoid slipping on unseen rocks or stepping suddenly into deep water. Stay in open areas. Avoid swimmers, water skiers, and skin and scuba divers. Learn how to hold a fish properly while extracting a hook. Many species have sharp teeth or fins that can cause deep hand wounds.

All water skiers should know it takes a team effort, with at least three people involved--one person to ride behind the boat, one to steer with eyes front, and another to watch the skier and his hand signals. Although skimming 75 feet behind a powerboat doing 30 miles per them all--use common sense.







'Wedding gowns, bridesmaids dresses, grooms clothing, bridal showers, etc., may be the topic of conversation at many a gathering from now through June, " says R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager for the Social Security Administration in Abilene. "Getting married is one of the most important changes- one of the most treasured memories- a bride may have. Planning the wedding may prove exhausting and and time consuming, and even after the flurry of excitement of planning the ceremony, parties, and the ceremony itself, a bride may forget one other important change...she should promptly have her name changed on her social security

To the bride who will remain at home this change is not quite so important as it is to the working bride or even to the student bride. The working bride will want to have her records changed at her place of work or there will be incorrect reporting of her earnings. The student bride will want her school to know of her change of name, but unless she also changes her social security card, this could mean a mix-up one day in her records since many schools use the social security number for identifica-

"Each June," Tuley stated, we remind brides that they should have their social security cards changed to show their new names. We do not restrict this reminder to June alone as we do this all through the year, but it just seems that more girls change their names during this

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
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


