Most taxpayers are required to file an income tax return between January 1 and April 15. Although all the returns have not been processed and all the refunds have not been issued for the 1969 tax year, 1,095,428 refund checks amounting to \$223, 454, 916. 33 have been issued to North Texas taxpayers. 



Chlordane is an effective insecticide. It will quickly kill ants in current infestations and will prevent reinfestations for weeks or months. It may be used as a spray, dust or granules. A spray is

usually preferable in the home It is easy to apply and is safe to use when label instructions are followed. To prevent ants from entering the house, apply a 2-percent chlordand spray to the outside walls, from the ground

to the windows and to the lower part of the window frames and round doors. Treating a band around the house will also give added protection. Several other insecticides, diazion, dieldrin, lindane and malathion can also be used for

ant control. They are available as ready to use sprays or as wettable powders or emulsifiable concentrates for mixing with water to make a spray.

Regardless of the insecticide used, use cautions that container label instructions should be read and followed closely when applications are being made. Storage of the material should also be in a place of safety and out of reach of small children

#### Food for Thought By Mary Lee

Know what is often called the "caviar" of vegetables? Or which vegetable is the most versatile of all? Or which one is grown in darkness yet is highly nutritious?

Of course you guessed mushrooms, but you may not agree that they are a vegetable. Botanists say they're a fungus. But then, they also say that tomatoes are fruits, and most homemakers don't think of them as such.

Mushrooms are a delight for many reasons. They're inexpensive, low in calories-only 66 calories to a whole poundand high in food value. The U.S. Department of Agriculture lists mushrooms in its basic food groups since they're relatively high in phosphorous, rich in riboflavin, niacin, calcium, other B Vitamins, iron and copper.

For some 20 centuries men have looked upon these tiny umbrellas as a gastronomical delight and a botanical mystery. As early as 300 B.C. the historian Theophrastus wrote about Greeks feasting on mushrooms.

The Romans, too, were mad for mushrooms. So much so that in Rome they became a symbol of luxury, and were cooked in a special set of utensils designed just for them. The utensils were called boletaria, and were never used for any "lesser food."

Apparently the first cultivated mushrooms appeared about 400 years ago in limestone caves outside of Paris. \* \* \*


