

Concerned about proving your age when you file for social security benefits? Wayne Baker social security field representative for Fisher County says this is a problem for many people. "Of course, with a birth or baptismal certificate recorded at or within 5 years of your birth, you have no problem as that's all you'll need, " he added.

In the absence of a birth or baptismal cerficicate, other evidence must be used. Some

The Social Security Administration recognizes the occasional difficulty in obtaining adequate proof of age, and will help you as necessary.

In writing about the Secret Service last week, it was indicated the subject this week would be counterfeit money. The Secret Service, which has the responsibility of coping with counterfeiting, has a big job.

Counterfeiting is one of the oldest games in history and is today on the rise. One reason is the fact that large quantities can be produced by improvements in photography and printing equipment. The Secret Service says that the counterfeiter, unlike earlier times,

need not be a master craftsman. Amateurs, working in legitimate print shops, have been able to produce passable currency.

Although our bills are produced from plates made by the finest engravers in the World, counterfeiters are able to fool the unsuspecting. The Teasury Department is now studying ways to make it even more difficult to copy our currency. Counterfeiters usually stick to

producing billis of \$10 and \$20 denominations although \$1 to \$50 bills abve been in circulation.

The producer of bogus bills usually sells them to a dealer for 10ϕ or 15ϕ on the dollar. The dealer then sells them to a distributor for another reduction and finally to the passer who pays from 25¢ to 35¢ on the dollar, depending on the quality. These people are expert and the appearance of genuineness reduces the risk of being caught. The risk is great and counterfeiters are finally apprehended but not before a lot of people have been their victims. It is a very difficult task but the Secret Service is doggedly expert in its work. year extension, "Brack said. Older E Bonds- with original maturities ranging from 7 to 10 years- have been granted one or more 10 year extensions so no E Bond has reached 'final' maturity and they continue to earn interest.

Brack said the current rate is 5 percent, if held to maturity. Yield is 4.01 percent the first year; thereafter, 5.20 percent to maturity. Older bonds earn at the new 5 percent rate, beginning with the first semi-annual interest period starting on or after June 1, 1969, if held to maturity or extended maturity.

"Many holders of older Bonds don't realize how their value has appreciated, " Brack said. "For example, a \$100 bond bought for \$75 in July 1941, is now worth \$191.64.

"A prime feature of Savings Bonds is their tax advantages. Interest is exempt from all state or local income or personal property taxes. It is subject to Federal income tax, but the tax may be deferred until Bonds are cashed, making possible creation of 'Tax-Break' retirement and tax-free education funds.



Color is important. Federal Reserve Notes have a green seal and serial number while United States notes have a red seal. Should colors of the seal and serial number differ, it is an imitation. Unevenly spaced serial numbers should be a warning.

Counterfeiters have a difficult time in imitating the blue silk threads imbedded below the surface in genuine bills. More often the threads in counterfeit are more coarse and the color not true. Some manage to imitate these threads with pen and ink lines but they are detectable on close examination. The thickness of currency

is often a sign of good or bad money. To be profitable, large bat-

ches of bogus money must be produced. Swindlers smuggling counterfeit out of the United States to people in foreign countries run a double risk but it has been done. Right now Ireland is experiencing a wave of fake U. S. bills. Since American money is acceptable most any place around the World, foreigners are likely to be easier prey but Americans, somewhere, are swindled about every day.



can greatly decrease production of tomatoes in the home garden. When spider mites are left uncontrolled tomato plants soon die. Heaviest damage is caused to tomato plants during hot. dry weather. The leaves of damaged tomato plants become blotched with pale yellow spots ranging from small specks to large areas on both the upper and lower surfaces. The underside of the leaves look like they have been lightly dusted with fine white powder. With magnification fine strands of silk and small greenish or reddish mites can be seen.

Several materials may be used to control spider mitcs. The are dicofol (Kelthane), sulfur and malathion. Dicofol will give most effective control but several applications may be required. Sulfur and malathion are not as effective but might be used where dicofol is not available.

When the fish population in a pond becomes unbalanced with small stunted or rough, undesirable fish, it is best to remove all fish and start over with balanced stock. If the pond contains adult fish, pond owners should not stock the pond with fingerlings obtained from state or federal

hatcheries. Certain fish are cannibals as well as predators, and a few of these adults can "eliminate" every added fingerling in short order.

The use ot rotenone is recommended as an easy, safe and practical way to remove fish from private ponds. Increased rates will get even the tough bullhead catfish. Fish killed with rotenone are





Truck Drivers To Aid Holiday Drivers Over 4th

Trained truck and bus indus try safety men will take to the roads July 4th to participate in a unique Holiday Road Patrol.


